FIRST 'DELI MAN' SCHOLARSHIP AWARDED

A scholarship to honor Max M. Shapiro, the "deli man" who in 1940 created the nation's first cafeteria-style delicatessen, has been started by the Department of Restaurant, Hotel and Institutional Management at IUPUI. Shipiro came with his parents and seven brothers and sisters to the U.S. from Russia in 1905 when they opened a grocery here. According to Raymond A. Dault, chairman and professor in the department, Shapiro's success is attributed to his business philosophy: "Cook good, serve generously, price modestly and people will come." Max died last year, but his philosophy lives on in the family-run business that is in its original location in Indy. The first \$1,000 Max M. Shapiro Restaurant Excellance Scholarship went to John D. Christianson, a student in the department.-JG

A FINE DECISION



The administration has approved increases in fines for parking violations and parking rates for permits and meters. For example, fines can cost you from \$5 for meter violations, parking in the wrong lot or line straddling; \$10 for parking in a handicapped space, yellow zone or other marked areas, and a hefty \$25 for using a permit after employment termination, using a counterfeit permit, or that other trick of using a parking ticket on the windshield.

It's time to renew your parking permits and they will cost a little more this year. "A" permits are \$10.75 a month, "B" permits are \$5, and evening permits are \$2 a month. Monthly garage card rates are \$17.50 for "A" and \$16.75 for "B." Meter rates are five cents for 7.5 minutes, 10 cents for 15 minutes and 40 cents for an hour. Meters take nickels, dimes and quarters.
