IU and Regenstrief to host inaugural delirium conference

Researchers, clinicians, and administrators from across the United States will meet in Indianapolis, June 5-7, for "Advancing Delirium Care through Research," the inaugural conference of the American Delirium Society.

The scientific conference will provide the first opportunity to share information on delirium as a threat to the health and independence of older adults, as well as discuss current and future research and therapy.

"Having delirium prolongs the length of a hospital stay, increases the risk of post-hospitalization transfer to a nursing home, doubles the risk of death, and increases the vulnerability to Alzheimer's disease," said Malaz Boustani, MD, MPH, associate professor of medicine and a Regenstrief Institute investigator. "We as a scientific community need to commit our research effort to protect the brains of older adults from the burden of delirium and set a goal of reducing the delirium burden by half within the next two decades."

Dr. Boustani is president-elect of the ADS and assumes presidency of the organization at the inaugural meeting. The meeting is hosted by IUSM and the Regenstrief Institute. Conference sponsors include the Regenstrief Institute, IU Center for Aging Research, Indiana Clinical and Translational Sciences Institute and Wishard Health Services.

> Smith named to professorship

Roger P. Smith, MD, has been named the first holder of the Robert A. Munsick Professorship in Obstetrics and Gynecology.

His faculty title will be Robert A. Munsick Professor of Clinical Obstetrics and Gynecology. Dr. Smith was appointed Feb. 1 to the position of division director of the Department of General Obstetrics and Gynecology.

Dr. Munsick was a professor of pharmacology at IUSM from 1974 to 1995, who died in 1999. The Robert A. Munsick Professorship in Obstetrics and Gynecology was aestablished by residents, students, faculty and friends of Dr. Munsick in 2000 in honor of his memory. It is the intent of the donors that the holder of the fellowship be a full-time faculty member working in the field of obstetrics and gynecology.

Students to visit Honduras for alternative spring break

Participants in the Alternative Spring Break — Honduras program, sponsored by the IUSM Office of Medical Service-Learning, will make their third annual medical service trip to Trujillo, Honduras March 12-19.

While in Honduras, trip participants will set up a week-long medical clinic in the town of Rigores, near the northern coast, where they will provide basic medical care, hospital referrals and much-needed medications to more than 800 people in the area.

Patients from the surrounding resource-poor villages face extreme barriers to accessing health care. A major goal of the trip, beyond acute care, will be to provide patients with information and resources to get tied into the local health-care system. Trip volunteers will also be involved in preventive medicine by offering blood pressure and glucose screenings, as well as conducting public health education sessions on topics such as diabetes, hypertension and dental hygiene for the children.

Project leaders Jeannette McIntyre, Neha Patel, Prerna Raj and Benjamin Rejowski, all second-year medical students, have invested many months in fundraising, recruiting, planning, coordinating in-country logistics, acquiring donations of medications and supplies, and expanding this project from the excellent standard of care set by last year's trip.

This trip is a collaborative effort that seeks to build upon the existing relationships with Honduran partners established by the IUSM Department of Family Medicine through their summer immersion, third-year clerkship and fourth-year international elective programs.

Spring Mill Outpatient Center - phone number changes

The IU Department of Medicine Multi-Disciplinary Clinic, located at the IU Health Spring Mill Outpatient Center, 200 W. 103rd Street, is changing phone numbers from the "278" to "948" prefix in order to align with the IU Health phone system.

The phone prefix transition impacts the main number 317-278-5000 (now 317-948-5000), and all phones in the IU Department of Medicine Multi-Disciplinary Clinic at IU Heath Spring Mill Outpatient Center. This prefix transition includes phones in the nurse's station, front office, physician work room, practice administrator's, and individual staff phones. IU Department of Medicine specialties included in this prefix transition at Spring Mill are IU Hematology/Oncology, Endocrinology, Gastroenterology, Pulmonology and Allergy.

Only phone numbers 278-5000, 278-5036, 278-5955 and 278-5980 will be directly forwarded to the new 948 numbers until August 2011 and then will play an intercept message until October 2011. The remaining phone numbers in the clinic currently have an intercept message that directs callers to dial the new 948 prefix. These 278 numbers will be disconnected in **April 2011**.

IU Dermatology, IU Health Physicians Facial Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery and IU Ophthalmology clinics located at Spring Mill are not included in this first phase transition, but are expected to follow suit later this year. Please make note of these new numbers in your phone lists.

Jane E. Schultz, a professor of English, School of Liberal Arts, IUPUI, has edited and published *This Birth of Souls: The Civil War Diary of Harriet Eaton*, an uncensored nursing diary by a female relief worker—a rarity among medical accounts of the war.

The edition contains an extensive introduction by Schultz, as well as transcriptions of relevant letters and newspaper articles and a comprehensive biographical dictionary of the people mentioned in the diary. The diary provides a rare, vivid account of caring for wounded 150 years ago.

Schultz teaches courses in 19th-century literature and culture and in medical humanities and has published extensively on social interaction in American Civil War military hospitals.

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This week on Sound Medicine

This week on *Sound Medicine*, learn how Indiana University medical students honor individuals who donate their bodies to science. *Sound Medicine* airs on WFYI, 90.1FM, and on many other public radio stations, this weekend, Feb. 26 and 27.

At IUSM-Northwest, medical students hold an annual memorial service in honor of the people who donated their bodies to the anatomical education program and as a way to thank their families. The donations enable first-year medical students to begin their education in human anatomy. *Sound Medicine's* Colleen Iudice reports from Gary, Indiana.

When direct-to-consumer genetic testing kits first came to market, experts feared the products would create anxiety in patients and lead to unnecessary treatments. Nevertheless, according to a recent survey conducted by the Scripps Translational Science Institute (STSI), these fears were greatly exaggerated. STSI assistant professor and neuropsychologist Cinnamon Bloss, PhD, will explain the survey results.

Complicated questions swirl around the use of personal genetic information to improve public health. Recently a group of international experts, including *Sound Medicine's* resident bioethicist Eric Meslin, PhD, convened to discuss the issues. Dr. Meslin will explain how geneticists and public health experts find common ground. Meslin directs the IU Center for Bioethics.

Physician and author Yvonne Thornton, MD, MPH, will discuss her book, *Something to Prove: A Daughter's Journey to Fulfill a Father's Legacy*, which details her struggle to overcome racism and sexism to become the first African-American woman to be board certified in maternal-fetal medicine. Dr. Thornton is a Fellow of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists and the American College of Surgeons.

What it's like to have the most important person in the world as your patient? Physician and author Connie Mariano, MD, will chat about her book, which answers that question. Dr. Mariano treated three U.S. presidents: George H.W. Bush, Bill Clinton and George W. Bush. Mariano also is the first Filipino-American to rise to the rank of Navy rear admiral.

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Professionalism Award — Request for applications
