


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GIVE THE UNITED WAY. . .

The United Way campaign at IUPUI begins Monday with goals of obtaining contributions from every employee and increasing the percentage of persons who give through payroll deduction.



CIRCLE CITY CIRCUIT IS COMING

Canoe races, food, golf and volleyball tourneys, runs for senior citizens and others, children's games, a flea market, gurney race and a roller derby are planned for the fourth annual Circle City Circuit fall festival at IUPUI. The festival begins Wednesday with the roller derby and gurney race from 2 to 4 p.m. at the Krannert Science Building, 1123 E. 38th St.

TRUSTEES APPROVE CONSTRUCTION CONTRACTS

The main lobby of the University Hospital will be remodeled and windows will be replaced in the Rotary Building and Ball Residence, according to action taken Sept. 12 by the I.U. Board of Trustees. Building Contractors, Inc., of Indianapolis will refurbish the hospital lobby for \$93,260; Scott Contracting Co. of Mooresville will replace windows in Ball Residence for \$147,430, and Clark Engineering Co. of Indianapolis will replace all the wooden window units in the Rotary Building for \$142,514. All were low bidders.

The Trustees also awarded contracts totaling more than \$6.2 million to 14 different companies to work toward completion of the I.U. School of Physical Education/Natatorium Building, essentially completing construction of the \$19.6 million building which will house all the swimming and diving competitions for the 1982 National Sports Festival next July.

In the second of three bid packages for the track and field stadium and outdoor athletic fields at IUPUI, the trustees awarded more than \$2 million in contracts to five companies, providing for about 55 percent of the total project. The trustees also approved increasing the total project cost of \$3.4 million to \$5.9 million. These also will be prime sites during the 1982 National Sports Festival.

In further action the trustees gave the go-ahead to the Purdue University School of Engineering and Technology at IUPUI to purchase hardware, software and related installation to develop training programs in Computer Assisted Design and Manufacturing. The General Assembly already has granted bonding authority for the program in the amount of \$710,000.

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OPEN HOUSE PLANNED FOR NEW KIDNEY UNIT

One of the largest kidney transplant programs in the country, which has been split physically between the Veterans Administration Hospital and the Indiana University Hospital, will move into unified new quarters at the University Hospital on Oct. 12. The new 20-bed unit, built and equipped with the latest technology for care of renal transplant patients and preservation of transplant organs at a cost of approximately \$1.9 million, will hold an open house Thursday beginning with a ribbon-cutting ceremony at 2 p.m.

The Renal Transplant Center, complete with its own intensive care unit, has been built in unfinished space on the fourth floor of the hospital. The center's outpatient clinic will be housed in Long Hospital. Fifty to 60 transplants a year have been made utilizing the 16-bed unit at the VA hospital, which has been operating at 105 percent capacity, according to Dr. Ronald S. Filo, associate professor of surgery and director of the Transplantation Section. This number will be increased in the new facility.

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CELEBRATIONS TO DEDICATE BUSINESS/SPEA BUILDING

Official dedication of the new \$8,050,000 Business/SPEA Building will begin at 9 a.m. Thursday in Room 2000 with a Chief Executive Colloquy that will provide

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panels of experts to speak about Indiana economics and industry featuring Indiana Lt. Gov. John Mutz and Stephen Fuller, vice president of General Motors. The program continues most of the day, ending with a tour of the new building.

An academic ceremony (formal with robes and caps) will be held at 11 a.m. Oct. 1 at the foot of the stairs leading to the building. Participants will include I.U. President John Ryan; I.U. Vice President Glenn W. Irwin Jr.; Dean Charles Bonser, I.U. School of Public and Environmental Affairs; Dean Schuyler Otteson, I.U. School of Business; Indianapolis Mayor William Hudnut, and Gov. Robert Orr. Also participating will be Edward L. Barnes, architect for the building, and campus master planner.

Third segment of the program will be the SPEA four-day housewarming, Oct. 5-8. It will feature a major address by President Ryan at 4 p.m. Oct. 5 in Room 4088, and will be highlighted by a five-governor conference moderated by York Willbern, political science professor, to be held at 3:15 p.m. Oct. 6 in the same room. The governors will be Gov. Robert D. Orr and former governors Otis R. Bowen, George M. Craig, Matthew E. Welsh and Edgar D. Whitcomb. Special seminars will be held Oct. 7 and 8 when speakers will include U.S. Sen. Dan Quayle, U.S. Sen. Richard G. Lugar, Robert Cowie, vice president of the Dana Corporation, Toledo, and VIPs from Lilly Endowment, Cummins Engine and state government.

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NAMED OPHTHALMOLOGY HEAD

Dr. Eugene M. Helveston, director of pediatric ophthalmology since 1967, was named Coleman Professor and chairman of the Department of Ophthalmology of the I.U. School of Medicine at the Sept. 12 meeting of the Board of Trustees. Dr. Helveston will assume his new duties immediately.

He succeeds Dr. J. Terry Ernest, who resigned last year. Dr. Merrill Grayson, a long-time member of the department and professor emeritus, has been serving as acting chairman.
