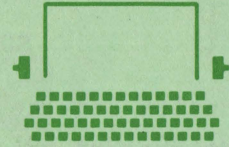

LAW, STUDENT AFFAIRS GET NEW DEANS

Norman Lefstein, professor of law at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, will begin Jan. 1, 1988 as the new dean of the School of Law. **Timothy L. Langston**, former director of sponsored research at Florida A&M University in Tallahassee, will begin July 20 as new dean for student affairs at IUPUI. Lefstein has an expansive career in law, research and writing, including several years as director of the Public Defender Service for the District of Columbia where he directed legal representation for people unable to afford counsel in criminal, juvenile and mental illness cases. He has served in teaching positions at the Hebrew University Law School in Jerusalem, Duke University Law School, Georgetown University Law Center and the Northwestern University School of Law. Vice President Gerald L. Bepko, whose job Lefstein fills, said we are most fortunate to have as dean a man with Lefstein's character and credentials. Langston's 30 years in higher education have been closely related to student affairs. Langston went to A&M as vice president for student affairs in 1978 and before that he served in administrative positions at Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond, Pennsylvania State University, Kentucky State University and I.U. Bloomington, where he also received master's and doctoral degrees. Langston fills the post occupied by Patricia A. Boaz, who will be the director of our new Adult Education Coordinating Center. The appointments of both men were approved by the I.U. trustees during their June 20 meeting at South Bend.

GEODETICALLY MARKED Mapmakers, landscapers, architects and lost faculty and staff now have a particular point of reference on campus from which to mark their way. Ceremonies last Tuesday noted the installation of a yard-high granite geodetic marker that is installed on the grassy quadrant directly south of University Library. The marker is the first of its kind in this region and it marks horizontal and vertical measurements. It is donated by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration in honor of Charles S. Peirce (pronounced "purse"), famous American philosopher-logician, whose life work is being documented and published by the Peirce Project on campus. Christian Kloesel directs the project. Max Fisch, specialist on Peirce, is senior editor of the project which is located in Cavanaugh Hall.

TRUSTEES OK CHAIRMEN, CHANCELLORS AND BARLOW AS ACTING DEAN

Among many agenda items approved by the I.U. trustees at their June 20 meeting in South Bend, the members approved the appointment of **John D. Barlow**, associate dean of liberal arts, professor of German and adjunct professor of women's studies, as acting dean of the School of Liberal Arts. He fills in for William M. Plater who became dean of the faculties at IUPUI on July 1. Also, **Dr. Richard Takashi Miyamoto** was appointed chairman of the Department of Otolaryngology, School of Medicine, effective July 1. An associate professor and the Arilla DeVault Distinguished Investigator of Otolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery, he has been at IU since 1978. The trustees also approved the appointment of **Dr. Robert D. Yee**, professor of ophthalmology, as chairman of the ophthalmology department, School of Medicine, effective July 1. And, the two new chancellors approved by the trustees are **H. Daniel Cohen**, executive vice president and vice president for academic affairs at the University of Redlands in Redlands, Calif, for South Bend, and **Charlie Nelms**, vice president for student services at Sinclair Community College, Dayton, Ohio, for IU East in Richmond.

TEENS "FINE-TUNING" SPANISH HERE

Two hundred teen-agers are on campus this week (July 6-10) to hone their Spanish-speaking skills at the Summer Intensive Language Session, sponsored by the IUPUI Office of Pan American Events and Language Programs (PANAMELP). Nominated by their high school teachers, the teens are coming from as far away as Evansville and Madison, Gary and Warsaw and, yes, Brazil (Ind.). Mornings will be spent in Lecture Hall classrooms going over "situational Spanish," or using the language to deal with real situations. The afternoons will be spent field-tripping to Pan Am venues on campus, downtown sites -- always using their language skills. All this is important, says PANAMELP coordinator Mary Carr, because their next stop next month will be as volunteers at the Athletes Village at Fort Harrison -- where they will get to use their Spanish up-close-and-personal with the athletes themselves.

PAX/I CLEARS UP CARD SECTION CONFUSION The last issue of the Green Sheet included a plea for volunteers from the people handling the card section for opening ceremonies of the Pan American Games. They are still very much needed, except the story talked about two different kinds of "volunteers." EDUCATORS TRAIN AT IUPUI TO PROMOTE SEX EQUITY IN SCIENCES

Representatives from school districts in Indianapolis, Elkhart, Evansville and Marion, and others from the Indiana School for the Blind came to campus last week for a five-day training workshop connected with Project TEAMS (Training for Equitable Attributes in Mathematics and the Sciences). TEAMS is a project of the Center for Urban and Multicultural Education at the School of Education. It emphasizes sex-equity throughout the science and mathematics curriculum. Involved were consultants from local and state business and industry, sex-equity experts and advisory board members, and trainees from schools.

UNION POOL CLOSES

Economics and the availability of the excellent swimming pools at the natatorium are the reasons for permanently closing the pool at the Union Building, effective July 1. Ed Erotas, director at the Union Building, said that the pool, filter and other equipment are getting old and continued use and conforming to more rigid safety codes would require considerable expense. The building space where the pool is will be renovated for other uses. Faculty and staff are invited to test the waters in the two terrific pools at the natatorium.

NEW CENTER GETS LARGEST LAW SCHOOL GRANT

The newly established Center for Law and Health at the law school will conduct a comprehensive three-year study of the impact of the Indiana Medical Malpractice Act on health care in Indiana following the award of a \$260,000 grant from The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation of Princeton, N.J. The grant, the largest the law school has received, will support research to investigate the causes of negligent medical care and the effectiveness of various legal, insurance and medical practice reforms. The Center is one of 14 projects that received a total of \$3.2 million to study medical malpractice. More than 300 groups across the nation submitted proposals for the award which is part of the Foundation's Medical Malpractice Program. The Center will develop a data base of all medical malpractice claims filed in the state since 1973 and will conduct three studies to determine if the Medical Malpractice Act as amended has accomplished its intended purposes. The purposes include assuring the continued availability of health care services while adequately compensating claimants for injuries caused by the negligence of health care providers. Eleanor D. Kinney, assistant professor of law, is the Center's director and will be the principal investigator on the project. Morris Weinberger, Ph.D., of the Regenstrief Institute for Health Care is co-investigator. Assistant director at the Center Barbara McCarthy Green is the project coordinator. Consultants include Geoffrey Segar, J.D., of Ice Miller Donadio & Ryan, and Randall R. Bovbjerg, J.D., of The Urban Institute. Since becoming a national philanthropy in 1972 The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation has awarded more than \$750 million in grants to improve medical care in the United States.

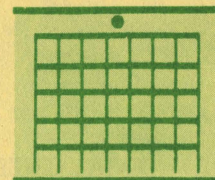
