ProtoCall to offer 24/7 crisis mental health support for trainees

Medical trainees who become acutely distressed now have access to crisis mental health treatment, thanks to a new service offered by IU School of Medicine.

ProtoCall is a new, 24-hour dedicated phone line--317-278-HELP (4357)--available for emergencies or urgent needs of medical trainees from all nine campuses. A trained mental health clinician will answer the call and provide step-by-step assistance to the caller.

"It's not possible to predict or schedule the moment that a medical trainee will need emergency assistance," said Samia Hasan, MD, director of IU School of Medicine's mental health services. "We want to ensure that learners in crisis get the help they need when they need it."

In situations that are not urgent, medical trainees should call 317-278-2381 to make an appointment for treatment by the staff psychiatrist, psychologist or social worker.

The emergency phone line is the school's latest response to students' concerns about the availability of an array of mental health services. Other recent service enhancements include:

The hiring late last year of Dr. Hasan, a board-certified psychiatrist, to provide psychiatric services.

The recent hiring of Jessica Fultz, MSW, LCSW, a licensed social worker, to provide therapy and manage the mental health program. This hiring expands the therapy services already provided by Suzanne Kunkle, PhD, a licensed psychologist.

Creation of the ombuds program to resolve conflicts.

Expansion of wellness programming.

Filling of lead advisor positions with professionals who are trained to recognize distress and refer students for help.

Mirmira named director of Herman B Wells Center for Pediatric Research

IU School of Medicine will continue its nationally recognized work in the scientific discovery of innovative medical treatments and care for children with the appointment of Raghu G. Mirmira, MD, PhD, as director of the school's Herman B Wells Center for Pediatric Research, which is associated with Riley Hospital for Children at IU Health.

Dr. Mirmira is an international leader in Type 1 diabetes research--specifically the biology of islet cells, which include the beta cells that produce insulin in the pancreases of healthy people, but are attacked by one's own immune system in people who develop Type 1 diabetes. Among his many achievements, Dr. Mirmira's research studies have led to the discovery and characterization of fast-acting insulin analogues, which are widely used by patients with diabetes today.

As director of the Wells Center, Dr. Mirmira will lead efforts to increase research collaboration among scientists and physicians to accelerate the development of new approaches to the diagnosis and treatment of childhood diseases, as well as providing an outstanding training environment for students, residents and fellows. Seven interdisciplinary working groups within the center focus on research related to asthma and allergic diseases, basic diabetes research, cardiovascular genetics, developmental cardiology, hematologic malignancies and stem cells, infectious diseases and global health, and molecular oncology and experimental therapeutics.

Research News

Scheel awarded grants to protect U.S. troops against mosquitoborne illness

Molly Duman Scheel, PhD, associate professor of medical and molecular genetics, IU School of Medicine-South Bend, was awarded two multi-year grants from the Department of Defense (DOD) to aid her work in abating mosquito-borne illnesses and keep field troops safe from diseases, such as Zika and dengue.

Dr. Scheel received a \$1.1 million, three-year Investigator Initiated Research award from DOD to address mosquito proliferation through larvicides. She shares the grant with University of Notre Dame research associate professor Nicole Achee of the Department of Biological Sciences.

Dr. Scheel received \$750,000 from the Deployed War Fighter Protection (DWFP) Program to address adult mosquito abatement. Partners on the project include David Severson of Notre Dame, the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research in Maryland and the Armed Forces Research Institute of Medicine Sciences in Thailand.

Snyder named IUPUI Staff Council member of the year

Kurt Snyder, director of Continuing Medical Education at IU School of Medicine, was recognized as the IUPUI Staff Council Member of the Year in honor of exemplary dedication to the school's mission, values and goals.

Snyder was recognized for his advocacy for maternity/paternity rights on behalf of staff at IUPUI. When a member of his staff shared news of her pregnancy, Snyder learned that IUPUI did not provide parental leave, and he immediately started to advocate for change.

Additionally, Snyder was instrumental in advocating for a change to the rules related to the taxation of fee courtesy benefits on behalf of all IU employees taking graduate courses. After taking a class at IU, he noticed that he was being taxed on the benefit when he suspected that was not necessary. He immediately started a campaign to change the rule, which was adopted this spring. As a result, IU employees taking graduate-level courses are no longer taxed on the first \$5,200 in fee courtesy benefits each year, saving individuals hundreds of dollars per class and thousands of dollars per degree.

With helpful advice for underserved high school students, several IU School of Medicine-Northwest-Gary students participated in a recent panel discussion about what it takes to succeed in college and get accepted to medical school. The discussion was part of the Health Professions Enrichment Program, designed to introduce local, underserved high school students to careers in medicine, dentistry, advanced nursing and other healthcare careers.

Now in its third year, the program is an initiative of Project Outreach and Prevention (POP) on Teen Violence, a nonprofit organization founded by Michael McGee, adjunct faculty member at IU School of Medicine-Northwest-Gary and medical director of the emergency department at The Methodist Hospitals.
