

SUMMER ENROLLMENT INCREASES

Summer sessions at IUPUI have enrolled 5,664 students, an increase of about 3 per cent from the 1970 summer session.

IUPUI registration officials report that more students are taking more courses this summer. The number of credit hours taken this summer rose substantially more than the enrollment rose.

Summer programs are offered at the IUPUI 38th Street and Downtown campuses, by the School of Nursing, Herron School of Art and the Normal College of the American Gymnastic Union.

Additional summer session students are enrolled in the two-year associate of arts degree nursing programs offered by IUPUI at Methodist Hospital and Marion County General Hospital.

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BAD NEWS....AND GOOD NEWS

From Lynne L. Merritt Jr., vice-president and dean for research, comes the following message:

In view of the drastic reduction in funding of the Midwest Universities Consortium for International Activities, Inc. by the Ford Foundation during the next three years, the Executive Board of the Consortium has declared a three-month moratorium on all grant applications for faculty and graduate student support. During this period the Executive Board will be reordering its priorities and establishing new guidelines. There is a very strong possibility that the graduate student internship category may be dropped entirely.

The situation for MUCIA is not entirely bleak, however. The Agency for International Development has provided a 211d grant to the Consortium for the Technical Assistance and Institution Building program. The grant is for one million dollars to be spent over a five-year period.

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WESTSIDERS, REJOICE!

As reported in The Indianapolis Star last week, the Indianapolis Department of Transportation will decide late this month whether to reconstruct the New York Street Bridge over White River or build a new one. All but one lane of the bridge have been closed for the last year due to the deteriorating condition of the structure, according to Transportation Director Richard B. Wetzel.

Wetzel said the department "is leaning toward building a completely new bridge" because it would cost no more than to repair the present one.

Wetzel said that if a new bridge is built, it may not be at the present site. He said there is a "serious" possibility that the bridge would be built next to the present Michigan Street Bridge to accommodate the flow of traffic to and from IUPUI. The new bridge, if constructed, would be built next year, he said.

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BASIC RATES UP

Basic rates for room, board and nursing services in the Indiana University Hospitals have been increased an average of \$8.15 to keep pace with the growing costs of the patient care and education programs assigned to the University Hospitals.

The average daily charge for beds in the University Hospitals has gone from \$68.26 to \$76.41. The new rates are about average for Midwestern university medical center hospitals, according to various national surveys.

Neil E. Matthew, assistant professor of fine arts at the Downtown Campus, has had a photograph, "Overpass, Riley Center," accepted in the Artist-Photographer in Indiana Exhibit at Ball State University. TRAVELLERS

Dr. Warren A. Andrew, chairman and professor of anatomy, has been invited to attend and participate in a special seminar called "The Control of Human Aging," which will be held at Green Meadow near Zurich, Switzerland, September 2-4. The seminar will consider methods now available for the prolongation of the human life span and will attempt to forecast progress in this field for the coming years. It will be chaired by Professor Fritz Verzar, head of the Institute for Experimental Gerontology in Basle. Participants from Great Britain, Finland, Italy and other countries will be present. The meeting is sponsored by the Gottlieb Duttweiler Institute for Economic and Social Studies. Dr. Andrew is the author of a recent book, The Anatomy of Aging in Men and Animals, published by Grune and Stratton, Inc., New York and London.
