IUPUI has closed its first intercollegiate basketball season with a 1-1 record. The Normal College team, champion in the seven-team IUPUI undergraduate intramural league, went to Kokomo to play in the I.U. Regional Campus Tournament. The Normals opened the tournament with a 114-75 loss to Kokomo, eventual champion of the tournament, and beat IU-PU Fort Wayne 82-79 in overtime in the consolation round. This gave IUPUI its first intercollegiate athletic trophy, the consolation cup. Two Normal cagers made the tournament all-star team: Ralph Scott, who scored 32 points against Fort Wayne, and Shelton Oakes, who scored 20 against the Kokomoors. A special award went to the IUPUI cheering section, led by a large and athletic delegation from the Normal College. The Normal College team is now playing in the post-season IUPUI intramural tournament.

LEGISLATIVE REPORTS XIII

Legislative Action -- Senate

SB 470 -- Amends law regulating the practice of physical therapy; adds physical therapist assistants to jurisdiction of the law; makes other changes in law. Amended and passed by Senate, 43-1, and sent to House.

Legislative Action -- House

- HB 1719 -- Expands good samaritan law to include nurses, interns, and other qualified persons. Amended and passed by House, 70-25, and sent to Senate.
- HB 1799 -- Establishes a medical center development board of managers to plan a Lake County medical center. Amended and Passed by House, 81-0, and sent to Senate.
- HB 1879 -- Authorizes Vincennes University to participate in statewide telecommunications system. Passed by House, 72-0, and sent to Senate.

Coupon Counters--Mrs. Richard Low, project chairman for the A.B.C. Club of Brandywine Township, reports a total of 469,000 Betty Crocker coupons. The News Bureau collected almost 4,000 more last week, making its total a grand 12,037. The club needs 600,000 to buy a kidney dialysis machine for the Medical Center.
