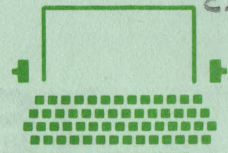

FROM THE VICE PRESIDENT...

To Our University Family:

I am pleased to announce a year long energy conservation campaign for our campus.

We estimate that our energy bill for 1983-84 will total more than \$9-million. It is our hope that we can reduce that amount by five percent through a series of actions. These involve Physical Plant modifications of current energy systems where feasible and practical, as well as changes in energy use practices, where possible, by each of us.

Beginning June 1, faculty and staff members and students are encouraged to make suggestions that would result in energy savings for the campus. After the close of entries September 30, a panel will determine the best suggestions with prizes as follows; \$500, \$250, and \$100, with three \$50 honorable mention awards.

Throughout the summer months, electrical usage in our buildings will be compared with last summer. The building which reduces its consumption the most will be awarded a plaque.

The campus will be kept aware of our progress throughout the summer as we attempt to reduce our energy bill. Building coordinators have been named to aid in this awareness campaign. Thank you for your help and good luck with your suggestions.

LADY METROS WIN

The Metro women's softball team won its first two games in the NAIA National Softball Tournament at Kearney, Neb. last Tuesday. It is the first IUPUI intercollegiate team to compete at the national level. The 16-college tourney was scheduled to run through Thursday, May 26.

In the first game Tuesday afternoon against Westminster College of New Wilmington, Pa., Truday Bernath, a junior from Indianapolis, pitched a no-hitter, with a final score of 4-0. The Metros won the second game that night 3-1 against the University of Southern Maine.

The Metros, coached by Nick Kellum, NAIA District 21 Coach of the Year, have compiled a 34-8-2 record over the season, including an undefeated NAIA record of 17-0.

RUN FOR RILEY



A 10 kilometer run (6.2 miles) will be held beginning at 8:30 a.m. Saturday, June 18 at Eagle Creek. The event, planned to be held annually, is open to participants of all ages and will benefit Riley Hospital for Children.

The event is coordinated by a not-for-profit corporation, Riley Run for Children, Inc. The pre-registration entry fee (deadline next Saturday, June 4) is \$8; raceday registration, from 6:45 to 7:45 a.m., will cost \$10. Entry blanks are available at Indianapolis EmRoe Sporting Goods locations or by writing P.O. Box 1386, Indianapolis 46206.

The out and back course will start and finish at Eagle Creek Apartments, located on the west side of Eagle Creek Reservoir, and will proceed north on Raceway Road from 42nd Street. Non-runners who wish to contribute to Riley Hospital may do so by either returning a check with an entry form or by mailing a check payable to Riley Run for Children to the above address.

FEE COURTESY PROCEDURE CHANGED

Because of the new computerized registration system, the procedure for claiming fee courtesy for classes will be changed this fall. Both eligible full-time appointed or retired staff or faculty members and their dependent children who wish to claim a fee waiver must secure the proper forms from the Personnel Division and return them at least three weeks in advance of the start of the semester. Position Available--An internal search is being conducted for a director of affirmative action for Indiana University to fill the place left by Dr. Frances Rhome who will become the director of the Institute for Research in Humanities at IUPUI sometime after July 1. The position reports directly to the Vice President for Administration, and serves the Office of the President on the University's Affirmative Action program and its implementation. Primarily responsible for administering the University Affirmative Action Plan and must be familiar with appropriate federal and state laws and regulations. Full-time position with priority given to those with strong academic backgrounds. Salary negotiable. Forum on Academic Excellence--Percy Clark, superintendent of the Lawrence Town-Schools, will head a forum to be held at 5:30 p.m. Thursday in Room 4095 of the Business/SPEA Building to address issues from the recently released report criticizing public education. Open to the public, the forum is sponsored by the Center for Urban and Multicultural Education of the School of Education.

Diving Pool Open--Beginning Monday, June 6, the diving pool at the I.U. Natatorium will be open for public use, along with the competition pool. The diving pool will be open from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays. Fee is \$2 per person. Only the one and three meter springboards may be used. The

diving tower will be closed due to liability restrictions.

Electronic Message Boards Available--Electronic message boards are being installed throughout the campus to help disseminate up-to-the-minute information. Three are in operation, two in the basement Hiway in the University Library Building, and one in the student activities room in the basement of the Krannert Building on 38th Street. Others will be installed in the Union Building and in the basement of Cavanaugh Hall. A smaller one will be located at the Herron School of Art. Requests for announcements of campus events should be submitted to the Director of Student Publications at least 10 days before the events.

Dr. Robert L. Baehner, Hugh McK. Kandon Professor of Pediatrics and professor of clinical pathology at the I.U. School of Medicine and director of Pediatric Hematology/Oncology at the James Whitcomb Riley Hospital for Children, has been appointed to the National Board of Medical Examiners as a member of the board's Part II Pediatrics Test Committee.

Bruce E. Turner, associate director of Computing Services, presented a paper entitled "Public Service Computing: Can It Help You?" at the 1983 College and University Machine Records Conference (CUMREC) in Waco, Texas on May 3. 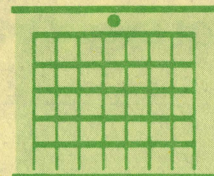
