CONTINUING STUDIES GETS NEW DIRECTOR

Scott E. Evenbeck, associate director of administrative affairs at IUPUI, has been named director of the Div. of Continuing Studies and associate dean of the School of Continuing Studies. His appointment, effective July 1, was confirmed during a recent I.U. trustees meeting at IU-East. Scott's been with us since 1972 when he became a faculty member and later associate dean of the School of Science where he remains an associate professor of psychology. He is a native of Fosteria, Ohio, and is president of the American Lung Association of Central Indiana. His wife Betty is also an IUPUI faculty member and they have a son, Benjamin.

Tempel, whose office is in the Administration Building on campus, has been a fund raiser for a long time, and he will continue with leadership of The Campaign for Indiana and the annual fund drive in the Indianapolis area. Formerly director of Vincennes University's Jasper Center, Gene is an IU grad with a master's and a doctoral degree.

NOD GIVEN TO RENOVATION AND CONSTRUCTION CONTRACTS

At a recent meeting at IU-East, the IU trustees approved the bid of Summit Construction Company, Inc. of Indianapolis, for the new, \$1.2 million telecommunication center to be located in the west wing basement area of the Education/Social Work Building. Construction manager contracts for the new \$12 million Conference Center and the \$12 million National Institute for Fitness and Sport were also awarded. Guepel-Demars, Inc. won the bid for the conference center and Huber, Hunt and Nichols, Inc. got the nod for the Fitness Center. Also, \$1 million in contracts for renovation of the fifth floor surgical research area and reroofing of the 66-year-old Emerson Hall was awarded. Bledsoe and Associates, Inc. won the \$785,900 renovation contract and Blackmore and Buckner Roofing Company will do the \$97,500 roofing job.



Check cashing on campus is changing. Beginning Aug. 1 the Bursar Office will cash checks for students, staff and faculty at a window on the first floor of Cavanaugh Hall, Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. The check cashing window at the Union Building closes July 31. There are some rules. Staff and faculty must have I.D.--a check cashing card which you can apply for after July 31 and a valid driver's license. The check limit is \$50, with a 35-cent service charge. Counter and two-party checks are not accepted, and you can cash only one check a day. The Bursar will not cash checks for you if you write two or more bad checks in a year; if you have a past due account with the university or if you don't have the proper I.D.
