### Dear Dean Agho:

I am writing to express my enthusiastic support for the proposed Master of Science in Physician Assistant Studies program, in the Indiana University School of Health and Rehabilitation Sciences.

As the pre-physician assistant advisor in IU Bloomington's Health Professions and Prelaw Center (HPPLC) these past four years, I have seen the need for such a program first hand. HPPLC serves the entire Indiana University Bloomington community, freshmen through seniors, and alumni, as well as departmental academic advisors, by offering preprofessional advising and consultation for twenty health fields. For certain programs, HPPLC offers advising simply because IU offers these programs; for instance, occupational therapy, physical therapy, and medical school. For some fields, however, even if the related degree is not offered at IU, we feel compelled to offer advising and additional resources because the need becomes so great. These students then go on to apply to programs outside of Indiana University. Physician Assistant is one such field. In spite of the fact that IU does not offer a physician assistant program, I nonetheless work with dozens of pre-PA students. In fact, the number of pre-PA students with whom I meet has grown exponentially, tripling or quadrupling over the past four years. This increase is undoubtedly due in part to increased student awareness of HPPLC's preprofessional advising services, but it is also clear from talking with these students that the increase is largely due to a growing awareness of the PA profession itself.

While it is not possible to perfectly track the total number of pre-physician assistant students currently enrolled at IU Bloomington, there is ample evidence of a dramatic increase in their

numbers. The number of students who subscribe to HPPLC's pre-PA email list has increased 72% since October 2006. Similarly, the number of IUB students declaring a formal interest in pursuing PA increased 168% between August 2008 and August 2009, according to Summer Orientation Program statistics. In addition, attendance of my pre-PA group advising sessions increased 60% between fall 2008 and fall 2009, and attendance of an information session by the Butler University PA program increased by over 300% from last year. Most dramatically, the number of pre-PA advising appointments on my calendar increased by over 500% from spring 2008 to spring 2009; and during the first three weeks of the current semester, I held as many pre-PA appointments as during the entire fall 2008 semester. As a further sign of the times, I have also been collaborating with the newly-formed IU Bloomington PA Club, which recently held a successful inaugural meeting. The formation of this club obviously reflects the growing interest in the field as borne out by the figures above. A conservative educated guess would put the number of pre-physician assistant students currently enrolled at IUB at two hundred, perhaps more. One wonders how many pre-PA students must be present at other Indiana colleges and universities.

Furthermore, nearly all of the pre-PA students I talk with express disappointment that Indiana University offers no physician assistant program, and they are dismayed to learn that the IU School of Medicine once offered a PA program, but discontinued it. This sentiment holds true for both Indiana and non-Indiana residents already on the pre-PA path at IUB, as well as prospective students and parents with whom I meet, many of whom are still in the process of deciding whether or not they wish to attend Indiana University. Some prospectives have expressed disappointment when they learn that they cannot continue on to earn a physician assistant degree within the Indiana University system. Such conversations hint at the recruitment potential of an IU PA program.

A pool of highly qualified students already exists at IUB (and surely elsewhere throughout the state), many of whom have already expressed eager interest in a possible Indiana University physician assistant program. Our pre-PA students tend to be extremely mature and devoted, as well as intellectually, academically, and interpersonally talented. It seems clear that IU Bloomington would be a major feeder campus for a physician assistant program housed within the School of Health and Rehabilitation Sciences. Stated bluntly, until Indiana University offers a physician assistant program, we will continue to lose these excellent students to other schools.

There are only two PA programs in Indiana, both at private colleges, yet the number of pre-PA students continues to increase dramatically. The addition of a PA program to Indiana University's repertoire of graduate-level health science programs – a PA program affiliated with an excellent School of Medicine, no less – would result in more IU graduates staying within the IU system to earn their graduate degree, instead of having no choice but to leave for other schools, with Indiana residents often having to go out of state. Similarly, because there are

always many more qualified applicants to PA programs than can currently be offered seats, the formation of another program would offer benefits beyond the university, given that there would simply be more PAs providing healthcare. In fact, my conversations with pre-PA students indicates that a good many Hoosiers who earn a PA degree from IU would subsequently seek employment within Indiana, and thus become members of our own healthcare community. At the same time, the addition of a Physician Assistant Studies program correlates with Indiana's muchdiscussed Life Sciences Initiative.

This is a letter of support for the proposed Physician Assistant program in the School of Rehabilitation Sciences. I believe that the case has been made for the need for such a program, both in respect to student demand and capacity for such a workforce, to help meet the demand for health care professionals to care for Indiana citizens in the future.

I am aware that there will be issues related to saturation of the clinical sites currently used by nurse practitioner students, as well as medical students and residents, but believe that Dean Agho is aware of this challenge and has developed a plan to address the challenges. As he developed this plan he has worked with an advisory group, one member of which is Dr. Melinda Swenson, full professor, who runs our Family Nurse Practitioner Program. I think there is some ability to expand the use of the Interdisciplinary Simulation facility in Fairbanks Hall and I would welcome the PA students, their faculty and the School of Rehabilitation Sciences as a partner. The cost of the program related to space, faculty, etc. seems somewhat formidable and hopefully these issues will be able to be addressed by the campus without cost to the existing health professions schools, such as nursing. In conversations with Dean Agho, he assured me this would not be the case.

It is a pleasure to write a letter of support as you seek approval to establish a master's level physician assistant program (PA) within the School of Health and Rehabilitation Sciences at Indiana University. As Executive Director of the Indiana Area Health Education Centers Program (IN-AHEC), I am acutely aware of the problems linked to insufficient numbers of healthcare providers, particularly in underserved rural and urban communities. With the interest in Primary Care Medicine at an all time low and with 39 of 92 Indiana counties (42%) officially designated Primary Care Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSA), the need to expand the healthcare workforce utilizing mid-level providers is quite apparent. Additionally, with current Healthcare Reform initiatives evolving, more and more patients will have insurance coverage; thus it is imperative that we develop a workforce that is willing and able to serve all the people no matter where they live in Indiana.

Having served on the task force to develop this Physicians Assistant Program, I know the two current PA programs in Indiana cannot keep-up with the anticipated demand. Employment opportunities for physician assistants is expected to grow 27 percent from 2006 to 2016, particularly as health care organizations increasingly use PA's to meet the health workforce needs of rural and urban clinics and to contain costs. It is clear the development of this new program is not only timely, but essential. The location of this PA program at Indiana University Purdue University Indianapolis (IUPUI) is ideal and well aligned with the research mission of the campus and IUPUI's goal to attract high quality faculty and graduate students.

Analysis of the academic and clinical resources at Indiana University has demonstrated an ability to develop a top-notch PA educational offering. IUPUI is the home of the School of Medicine, IU School of Nursing, IU School of Science, IU School of Social Work, IN-AHEC, Clarian Health System and is closely aligned with Community Health Network, Purdue School of Pharmacy and St. Vincent Health System. The close proximity of these clinical resources also allows for immersion experiences in InterProfessional education; now touted as the future healthcare training model for this country. Students enrolled in this proposed program will also benefit by having access to library holdings in the School of Medicine and the Ruth Lilly Medical Library; the latter being the only academic health sciences library in the state.

Certainly, as with any new program, barriers to development and implementation of this PA program will arise. The members of the task force have anticipated these problems and believe that each is surmountable. IUPUI has a history of tackling new academic programs with both vigor and quality; I see no reason this new Physician Assistant Program will not follow in the same foot-steps of other highly successful health professions training programs. I give my complete endorsement to proceed with development of the new IU program Master of Science in Physician Assistant Studies.
