"LEARN & SHOP" GIVES NEW MEANING TO THE "ACADEMIC MARKETPLACE"

The diversity of goods and services offered by your friendly shopping center will take on a new dimension this month when IUPUI's "Learn and Shop" program begins at four major shopping areas in Marion County. This latest non-traditional approach to higher education means that you can attend college (for credit) within a few miles of your home.

Twenty-six credit courses will be offered in the Learn and Shop classes which start Jan. 19. The IUPUI offices of the Division of Continuing Studies and the Weekend College will jointly sponsor Learn and Shop. Courses will include such subjects as "English Composition," "Introduction to American Politics," "Business and Professional Speaking," "Algebra," Social Problems," and "English Grammar Review."

Dr. James R. East, director of the new program, said: "It seems natural that a university, particularly in a large metropolitan area, should reach out to citizens by making college credit courses as available as possible. The use of space in shopping centers is a logical location, and students there will receive the same quality of instruction in each course as they would get on the main campus."

The program will permit residents to be enrolled and to buy books for their courses without traveling to the main IUPUI campus. Courses will be offered Monday through Saturday in the training rooms of Ayres at Lafayette Square, Block's at Glendale, Lazarus at Castleton Square, and Penney's at Washington Square.

Regular IUPUI fees apply to all Learn and Shop courses: \$24 per credit hour (\$55 out-of-state) for the spring semester.

A variety of opportunities for academic counseling and registration has been scheduled. For more information on specific times and places, just call Ext. 4887.

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SPEAKERS SERVICE BOOKLET AVAILABLE

IUPUI has a New Year's gift for club and organization program chairmen: The new edition of the IUPUI Speakers Service, a handy helper for those who must plan programs for their groups.

More than 300 topics are listed in the new booklet, offered by 100 faculty and staff members at IUPUI. It is the largest single source for program topics in central Indiana. All speakers are volunteers who will travel throughout central Indiana for presentations before groups; most will appear free of charge to nonprofit groups.

A new feature of this year's Speakers Service booklet is a list of <u>four</u> special programs that can be arranged. The Indiana Lions <u>Eye Bank</u>, headquartered at IUPUI, will provide speakers about eye care and the eye bank program. The <u>Occupational Therapy Association</u>, also headquartered at IUPUI, will provide a list of speakers on a wide variety of topics related to the rehabilitation of individuals, topics such as cerebral palsy, hand rehabilitation, geriatrics and arthritis.

The booklet also offers <u>IUPUI</u> students who will debate the national debate topic: "Resolved, that the federal government should implement a program which guarantees employment opportunities for all U.S. citizens in the labor force."

Planners may also have programs presented by the IUPUI musical organizations, the New York Street Singers or the IUPUI Chamber Singers.

Not listed in the booklet, but a new offering of IUPUI to club and group program planners is a <u>selection of films or videotapes about IUPUI</u>. These can be arranged by calling the IUPUI Publications and Information Services Office at Ext. 2101. That office also handles all requests for speaking arrangements which are not covered in the Speakers Service booklet directives.

Among subject areas offered this year are: Business and industry, current affairs, dentistry, education, family living, the future, health sciences, history, international topics, literature, management, personal living, political science, religion, science, sports, and women's interests.


