Clapp named chair of Department of Pediatrics

D. Wade Clapp, MD, Freida and Albrecht Kipp Professor of Pediatrics and a professor of microbiology and immunology at IUSM, has been appointed chair of the Department of Pediatrics, Dean D. Craig Brater, MD, announced. The appointment is effective Sept. 15.

Dr. Clapp joined the school in 1991 as an assistant professor of pediatrics and a physician and researcher at the Herman B Wells Center for Pediatric Research. As a physician, he has practiced in the neonatal intensive care units at Riley Hospital for Children and Wishard Health Services, where he served as director of the unit for five years.

He is director of developmental hematology-immunology at the Wells Center, director of the Tumor Microenvironment Program at the IU Simon Cancer Center and director of the Medical Scientist Training Program. Dr. Clapp, a cum laude graduate of Hanover College, received his medical degree from IU in 1982. He was a pediatrics resident at IUSM from 1982 to 1986 and then served fellowships at Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland before returning to Indianapolis.

Dr. Clapp will succeed Richard L. Schreiner, MD, who is retiring after serving more than 21 years as chair of the Department of Pediatrics.

Learn about Rappture Toolkit for HUBZero at IUPUI workshop

The Indiana University Advanced IT Core will be offering a free one-day workshop on the HUBZero Rappture toolkit on Aug. 21 at IUPUI.

HUBZero is a software platform developed by Purdue University to create scientific hubs, or domain-specific web sites. It is currently being used to host the Indiana Clinical and Translational Sciences Institute (CTSI) hub at indianactsi.org. The HubZero platform contains a powerful simulation and modeling tool of value to life science researchers. This tool is currently being used by a number of successful hubs including <u>nanoHUB.org</u>, <u>thermalHUB.org</u> and <u>pharmaHUB.org</u>.

Using this tool, simulation codes, as well as any desktop tool using Linux/X11, can be deployed within hours. By using the Rappture Toolkit within Hubzero, researchers can create a sophisticated graphical interface for tools that lack one.

The one-day, hands-on workshop will teach the following:

- How to create scientific tools using the Rappture toolkit.
- How to deploy the tools on a site powered by HUBZero.

The workshop will be from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the Informatics and Communications Technology Complex (ICTC), room 407, with a satellite location on the IU-Bloomington campus via Polycom in the Wrubel Computing Center, Room 110. The instructor will be Michael McLennan, HUBZero team leader, Purdue University. Participants will need a laptop with a modern web browser (Firefox, IE8, Safari) and Java, and familiarity with programming in MATLAB, C or Fortran.

This week on Sound Medicine

Tune in at 2 p.m. Sunday, Aug. 2, or 8 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 4, to *Sound Medicine*, the award-winning weekly radio program co-produced by IUSM and WFYI Public Radio (90.1FM) in Indianapolis. The program is hosted by Barb Lewis.

This week, co-host Eric Meslin, PhD, a bioethicist will discuss a variety of medical ethics issues in this week's rebroadcast. Dr. Meslin, who is director of the Indiana University Center for Bioethics, will discuss the ethical entanglement of the recent births of the California octuplets and what has been revealed about the lack of regulation of fertility clinics.

Michael Olinger, MD, medical director of emergency medical services at Wishard Health Services and professor of clinical emergency medicine at IUSM, will discuss the medical and ethical aspects of a clinical trial of two devices that are designed to increase blood flow during CPR. The subjects in the trial are not usually able to give consent to participate in the trial.

Fellow bioethicist Margaret Gaffney, MD, associate clinic professor of internal medicine and geriatrics at IUSM, will join *Sound Medicine* to discuss the implications of the suspension of "conscience rule" for medical professionals.

Gary Schwitzer, director of graduate studies in Health Journalism and Communication at the University of Minnesota School of Journalism, will explain the practicalities and ethics of good health-care reporting. His website – <u>healthnewsreview.org</u> – reviews medical journalism and offers practical suggestions for consumers.
