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AFFIRMATIVE ACTION SETS THREE-DAY FALL CONFERENCE



While the current presidential policy appears to be toward a weaker stand on affirmative action, the philosophy at IUPUI remains the same—equal treatment is not a matter of law, but a matter of fairness. Faculty and staff are invited to a three—day seminar Sept. 25-27 that is designed to help staff and faculty find ways to fulfill affirmative action on campus. Officers from the state and city (which is defying federal orders in regard to affirmative action) will speak about local issues and national trends and court issues. Sexual harassment in the classroom, affirmative action in higher ed, goal setting and grievances procedures are among the many topics to be covered. Interested persons can attend all or any of the

ICLU and LAW SCHOOL SET SEMINAR— Should a prisoner be able to sue someone because a jail cell has an average temperature of 68 degrees—close to the same temperature we all live in? If that average temperature is figured on a range from 105 degrees in summer to 35 degrees in winter, lawyers from the Indiana Civil Liberties Union think yes. In a seminar on Sept. 27 at the School of Law, co-sponsor, they will tell other lawyers how to take cases like this one and others that deal with sub-standard, and sometimes sub-human, jail conditions in the state. A panel of cooperating attorneys from the ICLU, including William Marsh, professor of law, and Alvin J. Bronstein, executive director of the American Civil Liberties Union National Prison Project, will lead the "Jail and Prison Conditions Litigation Seminar" sessions from 8:30 a.m.-12:45 p.m. and from 2:15 p.m.-4 p.m.


