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BEERING NAMED PURDUE PRESIDENT

Purdue University has a new president -- Dr. Steven C. Beering, dean of the Indiana University School of Medicine for the past nine years -- it was announced by the Purdue Board of Trustees at a news conference Friday morning (Feb. 4). He will take office July 1 as the ninth president in the university's 114-year history.

"Dr. Beering is one of the finest educators and administrators in the country, and I'm pleased and proud that he has accepted the challenge to lead Purdue," Donald S. Powers, president of the Purdue Board of Trustees, commented.

The news conference was carried by the Indiana Higher Education Telecommunication System at 3:30 p.m. Friday and was seen by IUPUI personnel in the MERP Studio in the University Hospital, Cavanaugh 224, Nursing 112, Dentistry 114, and Room 257 of the Krannert Building on the 38th Street campus.

Dr. Beering came to the medical school as assistant dean for continuing medical education and professor of medicine in 1969. Instrumental in forming the state-wide medical education program, a model for the nation, he soon became associate dean and was named dean in 1974 after Dr. Glenn W. Irwin Jr. left the deanship to head IUPUI.

He left a distinguished medical career with the armed forces when he resigned as chief of internal medicine at Wilford Hall Air Force Medical Center at San Antonio, Texas, to come to I.U. He received his undergraduate and medical degrees from the University of Pittsburgh, completed his internship at Walter Reed Army Medical Center at Washington, D.C., and his residency at Wilford Hall.

From his Indianapolis base, Dr. Beering has given Indiana a strong voice in national health councils. He has served in key posts with the American Medical Association and presently is chairman of the Association of American Medical Colleges which represents 144 medical schools in the United States and Canada and more than 400 teaching hospitals and medical professional societies.

"I hold Dean Beering in highest esteem and I know he will bring to Purdue University the same forceful and courageous leadership he has exercised so effectively for the I.U. School of Medicine," said I.U. President John W. Ryan of Dr. Beering's selection. "He is a superb leader," President Ryan continued, "little wonder that those who were faced with making such an important decision are looking to him for the excellence which the presidency of Purdue University demands.

"Personally, I have mixed emotions, for while I am proud of Steve for the great honor and challenge his selection represents, I am all too aware of the enormous loss we will experience," Ryan concluded.

"Steve Beering has distinguished himself and his university during his years here," Dr. Irwin declared. "Without a doubt, he has been among the very top of health educators in this country. His current chairmanship of the AAMC attests to the esteem with which he is held by his peers.

"Steve should be given credit for very successfully directing the Statewide Medical Education System in Indiana, a model for the nation. He has effectively guided the medical management of Wishard Hospital, a success story that has attracted attention from throughout the country. During his tenure as dean more distinguished researchers have joined the school's faculty and he has established important research centers that have national reputations. He is leaving the affairs of the school in a strong position."

RELATIONS WITH RUSSIA TO BE DISCUSSED

"Soviet-American Relations Under the Andropov Regime" will be the topic of a free public lecture by political science professor Bernard S. Morris at noon Wednesday in the Harrison Room of the Union Building. Co-sponsors are the IUPUI Office of International Programs and the Indiana Council on World Affairs.

Morris is a member of the Russian and East European Institute at I.U. He has published numerous works about Soviet foreign policy, international communism and Soviet-American relations. Those attending the lecture may bring their lunch or purchase lunch in the Union Building.

INDIANAPOLIS ECONOMY STRONG, KIRK SAYS

Indianapolis has withstood the current economic crunch better than most Midwest cities, according to Robert J. Kirk, associate professor of economics at IUPUI.

Only two Midwest cities, Chicago and Columbus, Ohio, have had lower levels of unemployment than Indianapolis during this recession, Kirk says. One of the reasons for the relative economic strength here is the level of new construction. "The public and commercial sectors made important contributions with projects such as buildings on the IUPUI campus, the AUL building downtown, and several office complexes in the suburban areas," he says.

Despite its cyclical nature, durable goods manufacturing will continue to play an important role, but the growth in the service industries will moderate the recession. Overall, Kirk says, "the Indianapolis economy has held up well relative to the depressed multistate region of which it is a part. The cyclical durable goods and residential construction industries should experience a moderate recovery in 1983 if inflation remains under control."

LEARNING RESOURCES SYMPOSIUM FRIDAY

Opportunities and difficulties of teaching in higher education will be the focus of the annual Learning Resources Symposium for all IUPUI faculty members to be held all day Friday in the Lecture Hall and the Education/Social Work Building.

Opening is at 9 a.m. in the Lecture Hall, when Dr. Robert Kegan, lecturer at the Harvard School of Education, will give the keynote address entitled "Emergence and Emergency in Higher Education." He also is a member of the core faculty at the Massachusetts School of Professional Psychology and co-director of the Clinical Development Institute.

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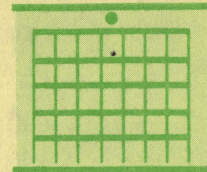
