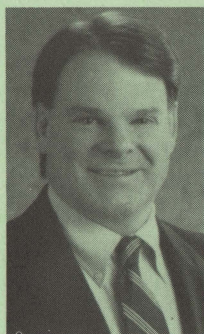


RILEY HOSPITAL TO BUILD NEW CANCER PATIENT UNIT

Young cancer patients being treated at James Whitcomb Riley Hospital will some day receive that care in a new \$7.1 million special care unit, thanks to plans announced last month by the James Whitcomb Riley Memorial Association and the Medical Center. The building project will receive a \$5 million grant from the Association and the remaining \$2.1 million from the Medical Center. The 29-bed facility will be a fifth-floor addition to Riley's newest wing and is scheduled to open in 1994. The special care unit is a key element in a long-term program to establish the Medical Center as a national center of excellence in cancer care and research for both adults and children. The unit is the second part of a three-part program to develop major new resources in cancer research and patient care. The Association already has invested \$13 million in developing the Herman B Wells Center for Pediatric Research at Riley Hospital. The major focus in the center is childhood cancers, including leukemia, and the formation of blood cells.

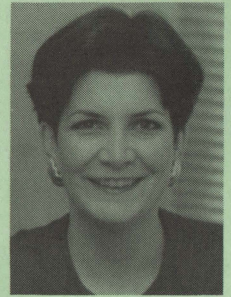
URBAN AGENDA TO FOCUS ON PHILANTHROPY'S ROLE IN INDIANAPOLIS HISTORY

Philanthropy's key role in the remarkable transformation and development of Indianapolis during the past two decades will be the focus of the next "Urban Agenda" brown-bag luncheon Dec. 16. Patricia Dean of the Center on Philanthropy will lead the discussion on "Philanthropy and Community Development: The Indianapolis Model." She will focus on philanthropy's long and honorable tradition in the city's history. Dean also will discuss the criticism of the community's philanthropic sector, often called the 'third sector,' for its role in the use of the public-private partnerships which have been an integral part of the city's culture. Dean's presentation runs from noon-1 p.m. in conference room A of the Associated Group headquarters, 120 Monument Circle. Brown-bag lunches are encouraged and beverages will be provided. FAMILY MEDICINE CHAIR EARNS NATIONAL AWARD

Department of Family Medicine chair Deborah Allen has received the 1993 Thomas W. Johnson Award for outstanding contributions to family practice education. The award was presented to Allen this fall by the American Academy of Family Physicians for her work in continuing the tradition of training medical students for a family practice. Among Allen's accomplishments were establishing a required rotation in family medicine for all third-year medical students, curriculum changes to increase exposure to family medicine and her part in helping establish the Otis B. Bowen Research Center, thought to be the first endowed research center housed within a university department of family medicine.

Visiting scholar and consultant Ida Mukenge of Morehouse College is winding up her stay on the campus, preparing to leave IUPUI Dec. 15. OUTSTANDING PAPER—Eugene Levitt of the Department of Psychiatry has won the Division 30 prize as the "outstanding clinical paper" at the 1992 Annual Convention of the American Psychological Association. He won for his work on "Hypnosis in the Treatment of Obesity."

ANNUAL JANUS BALL TO BENEFIT HERRON SCHOOL OF ART

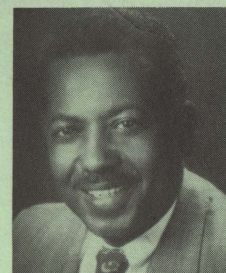

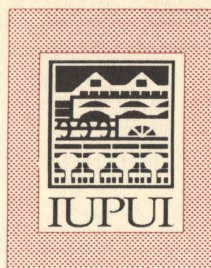
