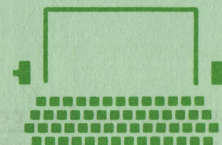

HEARING IS BELIEVING

A unique acoustic sculpture called "Happen-Stance" will be the next attraction opening this week in the Gallery at the Herron School of Art. Los Angeles sculptor Michael Brewster will install the work during a six-day residency sponsored by a grant from the Visual Arts Program of the National Endowment for the Arts.

An acoustic sculpture defines space by means of electronically produced sound within the restricted space of the gallery rooms. The low-lighted gallery will look empty but the area will be highly activated by live sound, a standing wave generated electronically by a sound oscillator within the gallery. The viewer listener will then experience "Happen-Stance" by walking through the gallery and listening to the sound wave respond to moving people, as well as the architectural details of the space.

Trained as a sculptor at Pomona College and Claremont Graduate School, Brewster has been working with the audio media since 1970 and has installed more than 25 acoustic works in six countries. His work is particularly radical because he subordinates sight to hearing. The only visual aspect of the piece is electronic equipment which operates the standing wave.

Intrigued? Learn more by attending a free slide discussion (Brewster presiding) Wednesday at 8 p.m. in the Herron auditorium. Brewster also will be on hand for the exhibition opening Friday from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. in the Gallery.

"Happen-Stance" will be on "display" through January 15. Gallery hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday (closed December 22-January 1).
