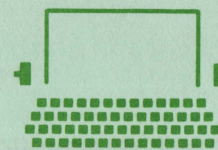


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SOCIAL WORK SETS TIME TO FEED AND FOCUS ON THE STARVING

World food production is at a peak, yet thousands of the world's children and adults starve to death everyday. To help inform us about the issues surrounding starvation, our School of Social Work will join IUB and more than 150 other institutions in the U.S. in observing World Food Day. A live satellite teleconference from George Washington U. in D.C. is set for Oct. 16 in the School of Nursing auditorium. A campus food drive is also planned. Between TV broadcasts at 11 a.m. and 1 p.m., IUPUI will feature a one-hour call-in/answer session with panelists from such organizations as the Gleaners FoodBank, Inc., the Salvation Army and others that will benefit from or help in the project. All are welcome. And for those who want to help feed the hungry, from Oct. 14 to Oct. 18 there will be barrels for your donations of non-perishable food items placed in Education/Social Work, Cavanaugh Hall, University Library, Ball Residence, Mary Cable Building, Student Union, Herron, School of Science, Lecture Hall, Business/SPEA, School of Law, the Natatorium and the Medical Science Building. Food collected on campus will feed the hungry in the Indianapolis area.--SAR
