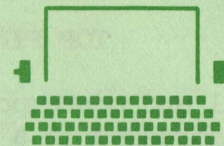


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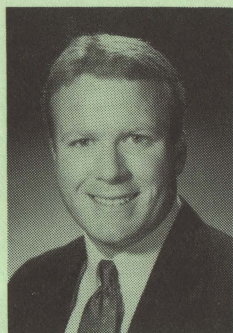

SHIRLEY NEW ALUMNI DIRECTOR; SMITH MOVES TO ASSOCIATE

Janet C. Shirley, newly appointed director of Alumni Affairs at IUPUI, is already hard at work in her offices in University Place. She reports that she likes the "frontier" spirit and energy of this campus and is happy to be part of the exciting times. She comes to us from Bloomington where she was director of administration for the Alumni Association, and secretary to the Board of Trustees. An alumnae of IU and Butler University, she is completing a doctorate in education from IU, where she has also worked since 1978. She has been an elementary school teacher, is married to David Shirley and they have four grown children. Her associate director at IUPUI is Barry Smith, who has been assistant director here since 1987. Among a range of responsibilities, Barry has managed the fine details of Commencement and has been liaison with alumni associations in the schools of Education, Nursing, Physical Education, Engineering & Technology, Science and Social Work. In his new position, he also will manage office operations, the Alumni publications department and personnel. Also an alumnus, Smith holds a bachelor's degree from the School of Business. We hope to involve these alumni in substantive ways that can affect the future of this institution and the community," she said. POLICE TO GIVE "STREETWISE" A THANKS AND MORE

To help protect pedestrians from harm and to promote better traffic safety habits on campus, officers of the IU Police Department (IUPUI) will be closely watching for drivers and pedestrians, and those who are obeying traffic rules and regulations regarding pedestrian safety will be rewarded. The program will focus on Michigan Street and University Boulevard, where "streetwise" people already stopped at intersections will be detained just long enough to get a thank you from police and free or reduced price coupons for goods and services by participating vendors and departments on campus. More than \$3,000 in coupons and merchandise are expected to be distributed, and when the program ends in two or three months, a student, faculty and staff member whose names are drawn from among the streetwise will each be awarded a free parking permit. Sponsors are the IUPUI police, IUPUI Parking Services and IUPUI Food Service Administration. SCHAUF USED COMPUTER TO SPAN DISTANCE IN WRITING TEXTBOOK

More than 100 institutions are already using the textbook, "Human Physiology: Foundations and Frontiers," written by Charles L. Schauf, chairman of the department of biology, School of Science, and adjunct professor of neurobiology, physiology and biophysics, School of Medicine, and a husband and wife team, David F. and Stacia A. Moffett, assistant professors at Washington State University. Long-distance collaborative writing by computers enabled the trio to fuse more than 50 years of combined teaching and research to write the lively and up-to-date undergraduate textbook published in December by Mosby. Genesis for the book was a human physiology course Schauf designed for nursing students at Rush Medical College where he taught before coming to IUPUI four years ago.--M. Hopper
