SUCCESS STORY

Thanks to Goodwill Industries, United Way, and IUPUI, Rebecca Wardwell feels that she has caught hold of the promise of life.

Born with cataracts, she is visually impaired. Her grade and high school education was acquired at the Indiana School for the Blind. Since the completion of her schooling she has desired to attain victory over her disability, to secure employment and make her own way.

"I was determined and constantly looked for opportunities to improve myself," she said. "I worked at a number of jobs from babysitting and housework to word processing, but my goal remained elusive until I went to Goodwill."

That was last October when Mrs. Wardwell began receiving instruction at Goodwill in micrographics technology, the transfer of business records from paper to film. After six months training, she was referred to Karen Duncan in Goodwill's personnel placement department and they teamed to find a job for her.

"We called many companies that had micrographics departments, but the answers were the same: 'Sorry, no applications accepted;' 'Maybe in six months;' or 'We have no openings.' I became discouraged, but Mrs. Duncan kept plugging for me and kept me trying, and soon I had two opportunities to go to work," she said.

Mrs. Wardwell now is employed at IUPUI. "I love my job and wish to make a career for myself in micrographics technology, she said, "and I'll always be grateful to Goodwill Industries and United Way for their help."
