WHAT'S HAPPENING AT FFA

19-year high membership numbers: Today, nearly a half-million young people nationwide, as well as in Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands, are living the legacy of the National FFA Organization. As members of FFA, 464,267 students in 7,194 local chapters are serving their communities and exploring more than 300 careers in agriculture thanks to the opportunities provided by FFA.

Become a trainer: Are you or someone you know interested in becoming an ALD, BLAST-Off, EDGE, MFE or WLC conference trainer? FFA is looking for ambitious and dedicated individuals to serve as conference trainers for FFA Leadership and Personal Growth Series and State Officer Trainings. Information and instructions for applying can be found there. Applications will be accepted through Nov. 1, 2003, for BLAST-Off and through Nov. 30, 2003, for ALD, EDGE, MFE and WLC.

SAE grants available: Sixteen \$1,000 grants, sponsored by Merial, will be awarded to applicants with beef/cattle, dairy or sheep production SAEs. Twenty \$500 grants, sponsored by Akey, will be awarded to swine production SAEs only. In addition, twenty \$150 grants, sponsored by Mr. and Mrs. Charles Conrad, will be awarded to students from the following states: Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, South Dakota or Wisconsin. Each grant will be awarded to an FFA member between the ages of 14 and 17 who demonstrates financial need and an exceptional SAE plan. The postmark due date is Nov. 5, 2003. Judging will be in December and grant winners will be notified by mail immediately following.

The application is formatted in a Microsoft Excel spreadsheet and you must have Microsoft Excel 5.0 or greater in order to work the template. Please note: Microsoft Works is not Microsoft Excel. The 2004 Scholarship guidebook and application are currently being mailed to all FFA advisors and guidance counselor offices. If you have not received a copy of the scholarship book/application by Dec. 1, 2003, please contact the scholarship office to request one. Students will also be able to download the application from ffa.org at http://www.ffa.org/programs/schapp/index.html in December. All scholarship applications must be postmarked by Feb. 15, 2004.

This is the 20th year of the scholarship program, and the National FFA Organization has awarded nearly \$20 million to students since 1984. This year, approximately \$2 million in scholarships is

Enter the 2004 Risk Management Writing Contest! FFA members can win an allexpense paid trip to Washington D.C. when they enter the 2004 Risk Management Writing Contest!

Encourage your members to write a personal essay of no less than 1000 words on the topic of risk management strategies used in a supervised agricultural experience program (SAE) and send it to the National FFA Center. Students should analyze the risks involved in their SAE, describe their risk management strategies and indicate which "tools" were used to minimize risk and how they were applied.

All entries must be postmarked by Jan. 31, 2004. Ten lucky winners and their advisors will receive an all-expense paid trip to Washington, D.C., where they will meet with top U.S. Department of Agriculture officials and tour our nation's capital. A resource guide and contest rules will be mailed to all chapters in December; contest information and last year's winning essays are posted at ffa.org. Questions? 2002 Inservice Registration Information

The National Agricultural Education Inservice will be held in Indianapolis, Indiana at the Downtown Adams Mark Hotel the dates of February 7-9, 2002.

As a part of the longstanding commitment to state leadership in agricultural education the National FFA Organization is again providing financial assistance for participants to attend the National Agricultural Education Inservice. In an effort to clarify who is eligible for reimbursement the following detailed information was put together to assist in determining who will be provided assistance. The objective is to provide flexibility to the state leadership to best determine those that should attend and establish suggested guidelines that allow for managing

The National FFA Organization will provide state participants with airfare (21-day advance/Saturday night stay over) and hotel expenses (based upon double occupancy). The emphasis of this year's Inservice is targeted to building strong Team Ag Ed connections in states using the following suggested participants from each state.

Recommended Participant	Details
State Supervisors, Directors	Selected by the lead State Staff Director or Supervisor.
State Executive Secretary/Directors:	Selected by lead State Staff Supervisor or Director.
Teacher Educators:	Each university with an agricultural education teacher preparation program is encouraged to send one person that actively involved in preservice education. The State Supervisor/Director should work with the department chair(s) to determine the participants.
Teacher Leaders:	Invited by NAAE and will represent the state professional organization as the state president or president-elect. Registration information is being sent directly to the representative designated by NAAE. Coordination with the state supervisor/director is essential.

In an effort to provide every state an equitable opportunity for state representatives to attend, the following breakdown has been established. Each state is responsible for serving different numbers of students and teachers. Determination for the categories is based upon the number of agricultural education students engaged in more than one component of an integral agricultural education program, specifically through their FFA membership.

The additional participants from the larger states must be designated by the lead state staff representative and can represent any of the Team Ag Ed participant groups listed above. In states with more than one teacher education institution: one representative from each different school responsible for preservice teacher education is encouraged.

States wishing to register additional participants to attend the inservice are encouraged to do so. The inservice is open to all who wish to participate and gain valuable insight on current trends and information in agriculture education. Additional participants will be responsible for all costs including the \$100.00 registration fee. All hotel registrations must be completed through the National FFA Organization to ensure rate.

Your hotel registration information is located on the bottom of the registration form. Please include any specific requests for rooming arrangements when registering.

All flights paid for by the National FFA Organization must be booked through the new National FFA Organization travel director. We ask all participants who using FFA funding for air transportation expect a Saturday night stay over to ensure lower costs for transportation. The Saturday night stay will schedule a departure on Sunday, February 10, 2002.

Please use the Excel template flight request form with the registration form to provide the needed information for booking your flight. For prompt efficient service send the registration form and flight form electronically or by fax to the addresses listed on the forms. Please pay close attention to the due date (**December 14, 2001**). You will receive your flight itinerary along with all pre-inservice information soon after the reservations are complete.
