

# POLYMERS BRING RESEARCHERS FROM CHINA

our research scientists from the People's Republic of China will visit our campus mid-March to Mid-April in the first scientific cooperative venture between the Purdue U. School of Science and the nation. The four are Zhang Jin-Hau, director of the Synthetic Materials Research Institute in the industrial city of Tianjin; two of his senior scientists at SMRI, Xu Jian-Ming and Zhang Zitong, and Quan Nan, an interpreter. Xu and Zhang Zitong will remain on campus for two years as visiting research scientists in polymer chemistry with the Dept. of Chemistry, studying significant academic and industrial projects. "This first cooperative enrichment program between the School of Science and the People's Republic of China lays the groundwork for future interactions," said Martel Zeldin, professor and chairman of chemistry, and one of three faculty members who will supervise work with the Chinese scientists on fundamental studies of polymeric materials. (Polymer means "many linked parts" and research in the area has yielded some well-known products that include Lucite, Dacron, Rayon, Polyvinyl and more.) Other core chemistry faculty in the project are Assistant Professor Paul L. Dubin and Professor Wilmer K. Fife. Support for the research comes from the Dow-Corning Corporation of Midland, Mich., Reilly Tar & Chemical Company here, the Petroleum Research Fund of the American Chemical Society and the National Science Foundation.-SAR

#### NEW FORUM FOR BETTER CAMPUS COMMUNICATIONS

Forum on Campus Inter-Relations (FOCI) is the name of a new committee on campus that will provide an opportunity to focus on a variety of matters that bear on interrelations in everyday campus life. The FOCI committee was appointed last summer by Howard G. Schaller, executive dean of faculties. (This is the group that planned the successful Martin Luther King celebration last month.) "We can expect a heightened sense of awareness through this mechanism in how we treat each other at IUPUI. I believe this is an intervention that can make a difference," said Dean Schaller. Following is the FOCI statement of purpose.

IUPUI serves a diverse population comprised of individuals who come from various racial, ethnic and cultural backgrounds, as well as from urban and rural areas. The University recognizes the need for improving and monitoring the level of communication across our campus community and, therefore, encourages efforts to promote an understanding and caring atmosphere. To this end, a committee has been established to serve as a forum for discussing problems and opportunities arising from our varied interactions and interpersonal relations. It is expected that through these discussions the committee will develop programs and projects that will promote respect.

# FILMS, REPORTS, TALKS FOCUS ON WOMEN'S HISTORY

Women's History Week is March 4-7. The library and the Women's Studies Program are celebrating with special presentations. The library is sponsoring a book review of <u>Fanny Wright: Rebel in America</u> by Janet Huettner on March 5, and on March 6, Ethel Kersey and Jeannette Mathew will present "Significant Women in the History of IUPUI." The Women's Studies Program is offering five sessions, each featuring a 30-minute film on "Great Grand Mother," an award-winning story of the courageous women who settled our Western Plains. Discussions and other films are also scheduled. On March 6 there are three presentations on the topic of social change. The first is from 9-10 a.m. and focuses on the American woman. The second is from 1-4 p.m. and features a second short film about the lives of women activists and outstanding career women--both are in CA 537. #### DEPRESSION SUFFERERS NEEDED FOR STUDY

Men and women, ages 18-70, who suffer from moderate to severe depression are needed in a seven-week outpatient study of an investigational antidepressant called Fluvoxamine. All psychiatric and physical exams, as well as medication, are free. Participants will be given the new drug or a placebo. # NEW PROGRAM WILL HELP BRIDGE CULTURAL GAPS

If you are eating dinner at 10 o'clock at night and the fork is on the right--you could be in Spain--hungry and confused. If you are seated around a conference table, where there are only certain (unmarked) people to whom you are supposed to speak directly--you are probably in Japan and making a fool of yourself with your friendly American manner of talking to everyone. The savvyist people can make blunders when faced with a culture different than their own. To help people here, in sports, in politics and business learn statesmanship and ease in handling new situations, IUPUI has formed an Intercultural Studies Program. One of its first missions will be to instruct staff and volunteers in the cultural nuances of people we expect for the Pan American Games in two years. <u>Richard Hope</u>, professor and chairman of sociology, who designed the intercultural program currently being used by the U.S. Dept. of Defense, is directing the early works of the program.
