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## FINAL AFFIRMATIVE ACTION WORKSHOPS THIS WEEK

The impact of Federal and state affirmative action directives on faculty and staff employment and fringe benefits is causing a reassessment of many university policies. Practices affecting women and minorities are being reviewed.

The third and final session sponsored by the IUPUI Affirmative Action Advisory Council will be held Thursday from 1:30 p.m. to 5 p.m. in the School of Nursing, Rooms 233 and 232. The workshops are open without charge to all interested persons.

Workshop A, focusing on problems and policies concerning non-instructional personnel, will feature discussions about laws for handicapped and aged, maternity leave, job testing programs, leave programs, retirement and pensions.

Workshop B on instructional personnel will deal with policies governing sabbaticals, promotions, tenure and grooming for administrative positions, plus insurance, pension and programs for the handicapped and aged.

Both workshops will run concurrently, then repeated, so persons may attend both.

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## OSTOMATES INVITE MEDICAL CENTER EXPERTS

The I.U. Medical Center will play an important role in the Spring Regional Conference of the United Ostomy Association scheduled for April 5-6 in Indianapolis at the Weir Cook Airport Hilton Inn.

Dr. Philip A. Christiansen, chief of gastroenterology; Dr. John E. Jessep, chairman of the department of surgery; Dr. Vernon E. Leininger, radiation physicist in the department of radiation therapy; Dr. John P. Donohue, chief urologist, and Chaplain Albert Galloway, associate director of the Chaplain's Office, will lecture and conduct panel discussions for members of the association and members of the medical community at the conference.

The United Ostomy Association was organized by a group of concerned ostomy patients who realized that recent technological and therapeutic advances have allowed them to lead normal and personally rewarding lives.

By the end of 1974, 100,000 ostomy operations had been completed in the United States and Canada and the need for a better understanding of medical progress in this area was recognized by those in medicine as well as the ostomates themselves. Many of the health improvements in this area have also led to public awareness and acceptance of ostomates who desire to return to their jobs or careers.
