MAN WHO BEGAN "JIM CROW'S" DEMISE IS LAW DISTINGUISHED JURIST

The School of Iaw's 1990 Distinguished Jurist in Residence, Robert L. Carter, who argued and won the famous Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka, will give a free public address at the School of Iaw, Mar. 26 at noon, room 102. He calls the talk, "A Jaundiced View of the Constitution and Supreme Court Jurisprudence." Carter, who is senior judge for the U.S. District Court for the southern district of New York, argued the Brown case in 1954 before the U.S. Supreme Court. It is considered the watershed for civil rights in U.S. courts, the landmark case for school desegregation and the abolition of "Jim Crow" segregation laws. His illustrious career in law includes 27 years as legal counsel to the NAACP when he won 21 of 22 cases he argued before the Supreme Court. He holds degrees from Lincoln, Howard, Columbia and Northwestern universities. He has taught at the University of Michigan, Yale University and New York University Iaw School. During his two-day stay, Mar. 26-27, he will address School of Iaw faculty and students.

KOLYER FOCUS IN "BORDER CROSSING: WOMEN AND ART IN INDIANA"

A rtist, teacher and world famous writer Suzi Gablik joins other women artists Apr. 6-7 on campus for a communal tribute to women in art, with special focus on the life and works of the late Silvia Kolyer. Born in Schoenebeck, East German, Kolyer was an Indianapolis artist and graduate of Herron who died in 1987. The two-day gathering entitled "Border Crossing: Women and Art in Indiana" includes a symposium and a series of concurrent workshops and exhibitions of the work of Kolyer and others. Gablik, author of "Has Modernism Failed?," will give the keynote address on Apr. 6 at 7 p.m. in the Conference Center. 

CLASSICAL STUDIES' ALPHA EVENT PRESENTS POMEROY LECTURE

Pomeroy, professor of classics, Hunter College and the graduate school of CUNY, who will present, "Domestic Feminism in Xenophon's 'Oeconomicus'" Mar. 29, 4 p.m., Cavanaugh Hall, room 507. She is an internationally recognized scholar on women and family in ancient Greece and Rome.
