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Match Day-March 15

"March Madness" is upon us which only means one thing to fourth-year IUSM students. It's time for Match Day 2007. This year's activities will begin with a brunch at 11 a.m., Thursday, March 15, in the atrium of the VanNuys Medical Sciences Building. Envelopes will be opened at noon.

The National Residency Matching Program, with the results released each year during the third week of March, is the main pathway by which most medical school graduates enter their residency training under the supervision of veteran physicians.

There are an estimated 260 IUSM students expected to match to residencies nationwide.

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Indiana issues first hospital adverse event report

The Indiana State Department of Health issued its first public report of adverse events committed at Indiana hospitals on Tuesday, March 6. The report on serious medical errors in the state listed 77 events reported last year by 287 hospitals and health-care facilities.

The report is the result of a 2005 executive order by Gov. Mitch Daniels and is based on guidelines of 27 preventable or adverse events established by the National Quality Forum, a non-profit organization designed to improve health care quality measurement and reporting.

The intent of the executive order is to increase transparency, increase sharing of information among health-care providers, and ultimately elevate the level of patient care. Prior to this order, many central Indiana hospitals had been active in error reduction processes, including work with the Indianapolis Patient Safety Coalition. The coalition is an organization of medical and clinical leaders from central Indiana hospitals who regularly meet, share information and work together to improve patient safety, enhance clinical outcomes and work to ensure that each hospital has the best clinical practices in place. The goal is to achieve zero errors at all hospitals.

The ISDH report includes ten adverse events at Methodist Hospital, three at Indiana University Hospital, and two at Riley Hospital for Children. Each of these incidents has since been carefully analyzed by clinical staff and leadership as well as outside organizations to minimize any chance of recurrence.

The IU School of Medicine and Clarian Health have been supportive of the state's effort and believe the report will enhance patient safety practices and quality of care at hospitals across Indiana.

Under the new rule, hospitals must report to the Department of Health the occurrence of any of 27 serious adverse events. Most of the 27 reportable events are preventable medical errors that result in death, serious disability or significant injury.

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Tobacco tax increase rally at the Statehouse

IUSM health-care providers and students are encouraged to participate in the Monday, March 12, rally at the Indiana Statehouse to support an increase in the cigarette tax.

Beginning at 2:30 p.m., several hundred supporters of the cigarette tax intend to make their voices heard. At 3 p.m., several Hoosiers most impacted by the effects of cigarette smoking and the lack of immunizations and health-care insurance will share their personal stories. They'll be joined at the event by Gov. Mitch Daniels.

According to Karla Sneegas, executive director, Indiana Tobacco Prevention Cessation, the rally is open to the public and anyone concerned about health care for the 850,000 people in Indiana who are uninsured, are encouraged to come out and show their support. The Healthy Indiana Plan is also focused on providing support for early childhood immunizations and programs to help Hoosiers stop smoking.

A \$1 increase in Indiana's cigarette tax will generate approximately \$339.3 million in revenues to fund tobacco cessation programs, health care for the uninsured and childhood immunizations. Supporters are hopeful that the General Assembly will revive legislation for increasing Indiana's cigarette tax,

already one of the lowest in the country at 55.5 cents.

A native of Haileybury, Ontario, Dr. Grignon received his medical degree from the University of Western Ontario, London, Ontario, and completed his residency at the university there. He completed a fellowship in surgical pathology at the University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center.

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This week on Sound Medicine

Tune in at 4 p.m. Sunday, March 11, to *Sound Medicine*, the weekly radio program co-produced by IUSM and WFYI Public Radio (90.1 FM) in Indianapolis. The program is hosted by Barb Lewis. Co-host of this week's program is Kathy Miller, MD.

On this week's program, James Colgrove, PhD, MPH, assistant professor of sociomedical studies at the Mailman School of Public Health at Columbia University, will discuss the human papilloma virus (HPV) vaccine debate and whether the vaccine should be added to the list of vaccine requirements for schools.

Darron Brown, M.D., IU professor of medicine, was a member of the research team that helped to develop the HPV vaccine and coordinated the clinical trials which eventually led to FDA approval. He discusses the infection and why it is so important for young adolescent women to receive the vaccine.

A recent study of breast cancer patients in Northern Ireland found that more than one in five stopped taking their prescribed tomoxifen, an oral drug used to reduce the recurrence of cancer in the breast, within the first year of treatment. After following 2,800 women, researchers discovered compliance with doctors' orders was much lower than expected. IUSM breast cancer specialist Kathy Miller, M.D., reviews the findings and discusses how it relates to some of her own patients.

Science writer Eric Metcalf ponders the issue of compliance and shares his personal story in his essay, "Compliance with the Appliance."

The American Diabetes Association will sponsor its annual one-day call to action on March 27 for individuals to find out whether they are at-risk for diabetes, the fifth deadliest disease in the United States. Linda DiMeglio, MD, IU associate professor of pediatrics, will talk about treating children with Type 1 and Type 2 diabetes and the possibility of a cure.

An old Alaskan law requires bodies to be embalmed before they are shipped to the lower 48 states. Alaska Public Radio reporter Rebecca Sheir investigates and discovers the law was changed Dec. 29 to no longer enforce that requirement.
