DENTISTRY SEALING PITS AND FISSURES OF 700 KIDS

This week it was kids from the Gorman Boys Club; next week they will come from other places in the city and, before it is over, 700 children ages 6-16 will enter the School of Dentistry and receive care and a protective sealant for their teeth that will last several years. The project is made possible through a two-year \$27,500 grant from the Indianapolis Foundation, and it focuses on children who have limited access to dental services. The "pit and fissure sealant" is a resin coating that is applied to the biting surface of permanent molars and it makes teeth more resistant to cavities by shielding tooth surfaces from plaque and acid. Second-year dental hygiene students apply the sealant under the guidance of pediatric dentistry faculty. Elizabeth Hatcher, special projects coordinator in the Dept. of Pediatric Dentistry, said that about a third of the children who will be in the program have never been to a dentist and without the painless treatment, are at higher risk for dental decay. While they are visiting dentistry, the children also will receive dental exams, x-rays, oral hygiene instructions and a dental health report for their parents. With the information they get and with good care and the sealants, the program can help a child establish oral health habits that will last a lifetime.

EDUCATION STUDENTS HELP PARTNERSHIP THRIVE

When more students than could be handled became interested in an At-Risk Grant program at North Central High School, the School of Education was asked and agreed to help. That was three years ago and already more than 65 students in education at IUPUI have been involved in helping hundreds of young people. When the program in the Metropolitan School District of Washington Township began it was intended to give a boost to high school freshman who were considered at-risk in their education. However, there came a great demand for assistance for students in grades 10, 11 and 12. Lynn Slivka, coordinator of the learning center at North Central, said the demand was overwhelming, so she asked IUPUI for help. This semester alone, 21 of our education majors spent 14 hours each semester as aides in study halls or in the learning center helping high schoolers learn. The At-Risk project is a low-budget operation that is showing good results. "There is no question," Slivka said, "that the IUPUI students helped us achieve the good results by their work with individual students, their role modeling and by bridging the generation gap." "Everyone around the block benefits," said Jill D. Shedd, director of student teaching and field experience in education. "Our students are getting a better understanding of what is involved in teaching."--M. Hopper

MCBRIDE GETS HONOR, DIRECTS NEW GRANT PROGRAM

Angela Barron McBride, who was recently recognized for her contribution to psychiatric nursing, will direct a new program developed from a five-year institutional research training grant from the National Center for Nursing Research in Washington, D.C. McBride, executive associate dean for research at the School of Nursing and adjunct professor of psychiatry at the School of Medicine, was recognized by the Coalition of Psychiatric Nursing Organizations (COPNO) for her "outstanding contribution to the psychiatric nursing community." The new program in the School of Nursing that she is directing supports students who will contribute to advances of health behaviors which promote wellbeing, facilitate early detection of disorder and encourage coping in illness situations. The grant for the program totals more than \$360,000. She will have the assistance of an interdisciplinary advisory committee that includes Joan K. Austin, Jan Beckstand, Victoria Champion and Beverly Flynn, all nursing faculty, Deborah Freund from the School of Public and Environmental Affairs and C. Conrad Johnston Jr. from the School of Medicine.
