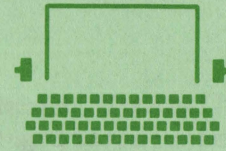


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WATT WATCHERS CITED, AWARDED PRIZE MONEY

The best Watt Watchers at IUPUI have been honored for their role in a three-part energy reduction campaign that could result in an annual electricity savings of more than \$50,000. Students, faculty and staff members were selected as winners in a suggestion program for energy saving. They shared prizes totaling \$500.

Along with the suggestion program, a summer campus-wide effort to reduce electric consumption by the 26,000 students, faculty and staff was pronounced successful by Ralph K. Bennett, IUPUI electrical engineer.

The third phase of the energy saving program now begins as the university lowers winter temperatures to a mandatory 65 degrees in the 40 major buildings at all five IUPUI locations.

Winners in the suggestion program were led by a student. Mrs. Erna Fleming, a sophomore majoring in German, won \$200 for suggesting that banks of incandescent lights were on unnecessarily during the day at the Lecture Hall. The lights were in the glass-walled perimeter corridors. Due to her attentiveness and subsequent installation of photo cells and time clocks, the savings in one year could amount to an estimated \$5,000.

Three other major winners each received \$50 second-place checks: Dr. Robert L. Bogan, associate dean of dentistry, suggested placing a clock control on the central turbine vacuum system connected to each chair. The \$100 device should result in a savings of about \$2,600 a year. Nancy Hocker, a technician in the Clinical Pathology Blood Bank, suggested that 37 four-lamp fixtures in her department be reduced to two-lamp fixtures. The savings may amount to about \$400 a year. Leah M. Ingraham, a research associate in the Pediatric Hematology and Oncology Division of Riley Hospital, submitted a lengthy list of equipment in her department with specific ways that energy could be saved. Savings could possibly exceed \$2,000 a year but there has not been time yet to evaluate each suggestion. Her entry was chosen partly because of the depth and thoroughness of the study of specific conditions.

There were 85 suggestions received in the Watt Watcher campaign, and individuals gave more than 120 ideas on energy saving. Other winners will share another \$150 in cash prizes.

The other winners include E.T. Braun (purchasing), Judy Burr (nuclear medicine), Maureen Dougherty and Sheri Potasnik (Herron), Tom Dunigan, Carol Retz and Ruth Shields (Medical Science Building), David A. Funk (law), Robert W. Hall (business), J. Donald Hubbard (Medical Science Building) and Terri Legg (geology).

Also William L. Marsh (law), Patrick McGeever (political science), R.E. Moll (manufacturing technology), Kathleen Murphy (dentistry), Carol Sue Sproles (Riley), Richard Wallace (physical plant), and Georgia York (Ball Residence).

"There were many outstanding entries in the suggestion program," Bennett said. "It demonstrates that the IUPUI community is fully aware of the need for energy saving and the possibility of saving thousands of dollars by individual and university cooperation."

IUPUI is a substantial user of energy. Costs for electricity and steam total more than \$5 million a year. The awareness campaign and a cooler than usual summer resulted in actual energy savings worth more than \$50,000. If all suggestions are implemented, total energy costs may be reduced by an estimated \$70,000 a year.
