
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ATTENTION MEDICAL SCHOOL FACULTY: CHANGE IN MEETING PLACE

<u>Dr. Edwin L. Gresham</u>, associate professor of pediatrics, was in Elkhart early this month to address a seminar on the "Detection and Management of High-Risk Pregnancy and Neonate," sponsored by the Indiana Section of the Nurses Association of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists.

Edmund F. Byrne, associate professor of philosophy, was at the State University of New York at Geneseo recently to participate in a multi-disciplinary conference on the values of integrative knowledge.

At the recent Fourth Annual Meeting of the American Society for Neurochemistry in Columbus, Ohio, three papers covering research done at the Institute of Psychiatric Research were presented by <u>Drs. W.J. McBride</u>, J.A. Richter and S.F. Pong. Dr. Pong's paper was done in collaboration with <u>Dr. L.T. Graham Jr.</u>, Dr. McBride's in collaboration with <u>Dr. J.N. Hingtgen</u> and <u>Dr. M.H. Aprison</u>. Dr. Aprison chaired one of the scientific sessions on GABA and Amino Acids.

<u>Dr. Wm. Hugh Headlee</u>, professor of parasitic diseases, was in St. Louis recently for meetings of the American Association of University Professors. He was a delegate to the Assembly of State Conferences of the AAUP, representing the State Federation of Indiana Chapters of the AAUP, of which he is the incumbent secretary-treasurer. He also was a delegate of the IUPUI chapter to the 59th Annual Meeting of the national AAUP.

Jan B. Shipps, associate faculty member in history, presented a paper at the annual meeting of the Organization of American Historians in Chicago last month. Her paper was called "From Satyr to Saint: American Attitudes Toward the Mormons, 1860-1960." (Mrs. Shipps also has been elected to the governing council of the Mormon History Association for a three-year term.) Other faculty members at the Chicago meeting were Bernard Friedman, Ralph Gray, Gerald Hartdagen, Donald Kinzer, Justin Libby, Keith Winsell and David Crain.

### COMMENCEMENT SUNDAY

More than 2,600 students will be awarded degrees in the fourth annual commencement ceremonies of IUPUI at 3 p.m. Sunday (May 20) in the Indianapolis Convention-Exposition Center.

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The procession of graduates will include 240 new physicians, graduates of I.U. School of Medicine. This is the largest single graduating class of physicians in the United States. Another large delegation will be 243 new lawyers, graduating from Indiana's largest law school, the Indianapolis Law School.

The procession also represents the most diverse range of academic accomplishment to be found in any Indiana commencement ceremony this year. The degrees range from two-year associates in the engineering and industrial technology programs to graduate degrees in dentistry and law, from bachelors in fine arts to masters in social work to doctors in biological sciences.

The commencement ceremony also represents substantial growth for IUPUI. At the first commencement for IUPUI, held in 1970 in the State Fairgrounds Coliseum, 1,551 degrees were awarded by 11 schools.

This year, 2,636 degrees will be awarded by 17 schools and divisions: 267 by the Division of Education, 200 by the Division of Business, 145 by the School of Liberal Arts, 243 by the Indianapolis Law School, 22 by the Normal College of the American Gymnastic Union, 47 by the Herron School of Art, 356 by the School of Nursing, 383 by the School of Engineering and Technology, 195 by the School of Dentistry, 150 by the Division of Allied Health, 64 by the Division of General and Technical Studies, 74 by the School of Social Service, 45 by the School of Public and Environmental Affairs, 135 by the School of Science, 31 by Purdue University for special programs, 39 by the Indiana University Graduate School, and 240 by the School of Medicine.

Nearly 500 alumni of the I.U. School of Medicine are expected to attend the school's 26th Annual Alumni Day program Wednesday on the Medical Center Campus.

Highlights of the day will include a state-of-the-school message from Dr. Glenn W. Irwin Jr., dean, and presentation of a portrait of Dr. James O. Ritchey, distinguished professor emeritus of medicine, in recognition of his long service to the Hoosier medical school. The portrait was painted by Donald M. Mattison, professor of painting and former dean of the Herron School of Art.

A noon luncheon (with that delicious strawberry shortcake) will be served under the traditional circus tent on the lawn of James Whitcomb Riley Hospital for Children.

Registration will begin at 9 a.m. in the School of Medicine library, followed by a bus tour of the rapidly expanding campus. Election of alumni officers is on the agenda for the annual meeting to be held at 11 a.m. in the Medical Science Building. After lunch and Dean Irwin's address, class pictures will be taken.

Class reunions for the classes of 1923, 1928, 1933, 1938, 1943, 1948, 1953, 1958, 1963 and 1968 are planned during the week.

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## GREAT MOMENTS IN FACULTY CONSTITUTIONAL HISTORY (PART I)

Dean Peak moved (and it was seconded) TO AMEND THE MOTION BY TRANSPOSING (B) AND (A) AND TO RENUMBER THEM (A) AND (B). Chancellor Bogle again raised the issue of giving the faculty authority that it may or may not have. The amendment was called for, and it was carried with only one no.

Professor Wolf moved (and it was seconded) TO AMEND THE MOTION BY STRIKING THE WORD "GENERAL" FROM BETWEEN "ESTABLISHED" AND "POLICIES" IN WHAT IS NOW PARAGRAPH (A). The amendment was unanimously carried. Chancellor Wolfson asked if item 13 in what is now (a), "Such other authority as may be subsequently delegated by the Trustees," implies that all of these other items under (a) have been delegated by the Trustees.
