The 200th Anniversary Celebration of the Treaty of Paris

THE ROUSING STRAINS of the Indiana University Marching Hundred, the Purdue University Marching Band and six Marion County high school bands on the mall of the American Legion headquarters at 2 p.m. Sept. 3 will culminate a three-day celebration of the signing of the Treaty of Paris. Signed on Sept. 3, 1783 in Paris, the treaty formally

ended the American Revolutionary War, established the boundaries of the Northwest Territory and paved the way for the eventual creation of the State of Indiana.

The free, public band concert will be followed at 3 p.m. by a ceremonial re-enact-ment of the signing of the treaty.

The celebration starts Sept. 1 in Bloomington and will continue on Sept. 2 with a series of seminars which have attracted leading French, American and Revolutionary War scholars. Students and teachers from secondary schools in Indiana will attend a series of workshops on the morning of Sept. 3 in the Lecture Hall at IUPUI.

Gordon Wood, professor of history at Brown University and a well-known Revolutionary War scholar will present a lecture on "Benjamin Franklin and the Treaty of Paris" at 11:15 a.m. Sept. 3 in the I.U. School of Physical Education/Natatorium Building. IUPUI faculty members who will lead workshops will be historians Bernard Friedman and Justin Libby.

HERRON GALLERY SHOWS "MIKE'S HOUSE"

THE HERRON GALLERY, showplace of IUPUI's Herron School of Art at the corner of 16th and Pennsylvania streets, is becoming the focal point in Central Indiana for the display of new directions the avant garde artist is taking.

Under the leadership of Martha Winans, who took over as curator slightly more than a year ago, the gallery <u>has increasingly been showing the work of important newcomers</u> who have been bringing intuitive insights and new ideas to the national art scene. Other shows, sometimes in justaposition to the imported exhibits, highlight the best work of Herron students and faculty members.

"Mike's House," an installation <u>created for a solo exhibition at the Whitney Museum of American Art</u> in New York City by Michael Smith, significant contemporary video and performance artist, is the gallery's present offering. This is the <u>first place it has been seen since the Whitney show</u> and is the <u>first video exhibition to take place in Indianapolis</u>. It will be on from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Mondays through Fridays and from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturdays through Sept. 17.

National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Stipends Program—-Provides \$3,000 for full-time study or research in the humanities for two consecutive summer months in 1984. IUPUI may nominate up to three applicants; institutional nominees will be selected by a campus review committee. Preliminary applications must be received by Research and Sponsored Programs (RSP) no later than Sept. 7. For information call W. S. Johnson, ext. 8285.

Searle Scholars Programs—Supports (\$52,500 a year for three years) the establishment of independent research programs for outstanding individuals who recently have received tenure—track appointments at the assistant professor level. Candidates will be pursuing research careers in pharmacology, molecular biology, genetics, medicinal chemistry, biochemistry, or related areas. IUPUI may submit only one application so screening may be necessary. Interested applicants must inform their dean prior to Aug. 31 of their intention to apply. Applications for the initial review must be received by RSP on Sept. 14.

Grant Update: IUPUI Summer Faculty Fellowship and Grant-In-Aid of Research and Creative Activity— RSP will conduct a seminar for those (faculty in early stages of career development) who will be submitting applications for the Oct. 14 dead-line. It will be held in Room 318, University Library, from 3 to 5 p.m. Friday, Sept. 9. Application materials will be available. Opportunity for informal discussion centering on questions raised by those in attendance will be afforded.

Fellowship Update: The Lilly Faculty Open Fellowship—RSP will conduct a seminar for those who will submit applications for the 1984-85 competition (Deadline: Nov. 1) in Room 318 University Library from 3 to 5 p.m. Sept. 7. The program will be devoted to assisting faculty members in determining if they are eligible for the competition, explaining the application process and assisting applicants. Informal discussion will respond to questions of those present.

Kellog National Fellowship Program--Offers outstanding young professionals interested in developing interdisciplinary and cross-cultural perspectives on contemporary human and social problems the opportunity to carry out non-degree, self-directed activities to expand their personal horizons. A basic aim is to assist future leaders in developing skills transcending traditional disciplinary and professional methods of addressing problems. Awards up to \$35,000 for three years. 
