## SOCIOLOGY EXPLORES NEW TREND

A new trend in the field of sociology will be explored Friday when the Department of Sociology acts as host for a "Symposium on Applied Sociology."

The symposium will bring together sociology scholars and practitioners and will feature two nationally prominent leaders in the field of sociology research. There is a \$25 registration fee for the program, which begins at 8:30 a.m. with registration. The program will be held in various rooms in the SPEA Building and the Lecture Hall.

Irwin Deutscher, past president of the Society for the Study of Social Problems and author of several books, will address the symposium in the morning. In the afternoon, William Foote Whyte, a professor of industrial relations at Cornell University, past president of the American Sociological Association, and author of numerous papers in the field of sociology, will speak.

Whyte has been studying failing industrial concerns in the United States and is knowledgeable about the recent revival of interest in employee ownership of business.

Applied sociology brings sociological knowledge to bear on practical community affairs, according to Richard Hope, chairman of the IUPUI Department of Sociology. Symposium organizers say that both government agencies and the private sector increasingly recognize the special contribution applied sociologists have to make.

# COMPUTERIZED REGISTRATION SYSTEM IN PLACE

A "new and improved" computerized registration system will begin Monday for next fall's classes. Information once kept on more than a quarter of a million bulky cards is neatly stored in the new system and for the first time students will schedule all their classes, register, and be billed by mail on an automated system that has taken four years to streamline.

"While this may at first seem foreign to students, except for new forms and saving time, the automated systems closely follow the old process," said Richard Slocum, IUPUI registrar. "Unlike the old manual system where information moved slowly, students will know while they are still in school that their classes are confirmed for next fall."

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Class schedules of the more than 1,700 courses offered to IUPUI's 23,000-plus students are in the computer. Some particulars regarding financial aid and scholarship programs will be worked in for the next go-round in 1984.

### FAMILIES AGAIN NEEDED TO HOST FOREIGN VISITORS

For the fifth year families are needed to host 14 participants in a 15-week professional and cultural exchange program co-sponsored by the I.U. School of Social Work at IUPUI and the Council of International Programs. Host families are an integral part of the exchange, providing a vital link with American culture and life style through family and community participation, while themselves benefiting from this cross-cultural exchange.

The foreign visitors will arrive in America with a variety of educational and work backgrounds. They will represent 12 countries.

Families may volunteer for one or both of the last periods by applying directly to the host family committee. Families must be able to provide a private room, daily morning and evening meals and weekend meals for their guests.
