Harper Hall dedication — March 8

A dedication ceremony for Harper Hall, the new home of the Mike and Josie Harper Cancer Research Institute, a novel collaboration between the University of Notre Dame and the Indiana University School of Medicine, will be held at 2 p.m. Tuesday, March 8.

Harper Hall contains 55,000 square feet of office and research laboratory space and is located adjacent to Raclin-Carmichael Hall, home of the IU School of Medicine-South Bend, on the corner of Angela Boulevard and Notre Dame Avenue.

The Mike and Josie Harper Cancer Research Institute will include Notre Dame and IUSM faculty, and faculty with cancer research programs housed in other research buildings on the Notre Dame campus and in Raclin-Carmichael Hall. Scientists from both institutions will collaborate on research in cancer biology, with an emphasis on such areas as genomics and proteomics, and breast, prostate and colon cancers.

Director sought for State Toxicology Department

The Indiana State Department of Toxicology, the agency responsible for alcohol and drug testing for the State of Indiana housed within the IUSM Department of Pharmacology and Toxicology in Indianapolis, is seeking a director.

This position will be filled as a clinical track faculty position or senior professional staff position in the IUSM, depending upon the successful candidate's education and experience. This recruitment is part of a major expansion of State Department of Toxicology. Ample laboratory space and resources for hiring additional personnel are available.

The director will be responsible for the growth of the State Department of Toxicology and for supervision of its functions, which include the alcohol Breath Testing Program for the State of Indiana and activities of the forensic toxicology laboratory. The director will be expected to offer expert testimony in court cases related to the activities of the State Department of Toxicology. A PhD and/or MD degree and at least 5 years of experience in forensic toxicology or a closely related field are required. MD candidates should be board eligible or board certified in Forensic Toxicology.

The successful candidate will be expected to develop strong collaborative relationships with other state agencies and with appropriate departments in the university and teaching programs in forensic toxicology. 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Medical malpractice mock trial

The IU School of Law-Indianapolis Trial Advocacy group will present "Damages: A Simulated Interdisciplinary Learning Experience for Attorneys, Doctors, Dentists, and Social Workers" from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, March 8, in the Wynne Courtroom at the IU School of Law-Indianapolis. A reception will follow at 6:30 p.m. in the Conour Atrium.

This mock trial will re-create a real-life medical malpractice trial involving a patient whose routine foot surgery resulted in amputation of her toes, and a podiatrist who admits his negligence. The event will consist of expert testimony, evidence and a discussion regarding the extent of extra compensation the patient or plaintiff is entitled to, over and above the medical carrier's malpractice insurance.

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This Week on Sound Medicine

This week on *Sound Medicine*, the FDA raps acetaminophen for toxicity and sheds light on a melanoma drug that shows promise. *Sound Medicine* airs on WFYI, 90.1FM, and on <u>many other public radio stations</u>, this weekend, March 5 and 6.

The Food and Drug Administration is urging drug makers to limit the amount of acetaminophen put in prescription drugs. Too much of this pain reliever, which is commonly found in both prescription and over-the-counter drugs, can cause liver damage. Sandra Kweder, MD, deputy director in the FDA's Center for Drug Evaluation and Research, will explain the problem to *Sound Medicine* host Barbara Lewis.

A new drug for melanoma is making its way through the approval process. The drug targets a mutation in melanoma tumors called B-RAF. Oncologist Paul Chapman, MD, of Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center in New York, is leading the clinical trial. Dr. Chapman will talk with *Sound Medicine's* David Crabb, MD, about the B-RAF clinical trial and about the difficulties of treating melanoma, a disease known to metastasize readily.

Currently there is no way to know how many different babies have been born from the same sperm donor; as a result, there's no way to identify children who might inherit a genetic disease from one of those donors. Barbara Lewis will talk with Randi Hutter Epstein, MD, a medical journalist and author who writes on the subject of infertility, childbirth and sperm banks. Dr. Hutter Epstein will explain why it's time to start a national registry for sperm donors that would allow children of donors to discover if they're liable to inherit genetically linked diseases.

Being a rural physician today is very different than it was a generation ago. As a family physician in rural Minnesota, Therese Zink, MD, knows the territory well. Dr. Zink will join Barbara Lewis to discuss a new collection of essays, poetry, and fiction written by doctors and other healthcare professionals who practice rural medicine. The book is called *The Country Doctor Revisited: A 21st Century Reader*. Dr. Zink edited and contributed to the book.

Also, in this week's *Sound Medicine* Checkup, Jeremy Shere will explain why sleeping with your pet makes for strange, and potentially unsafe, bedfellows.

Professionalism Award — Request for applications

The Edward D. Harris Professionalism Award provides up to \$50,000 to initiate a program that provokes teaching faculty to create appropriate learning environments for professionalism, or a new project designed to ingrain professionalism in medical students and resident physicians.

A maximum of three grants will be awarded. Applicants must have demonstrated evidence of a personal interest in teaching or research in aspects of professionalism.
