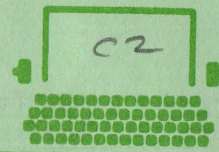
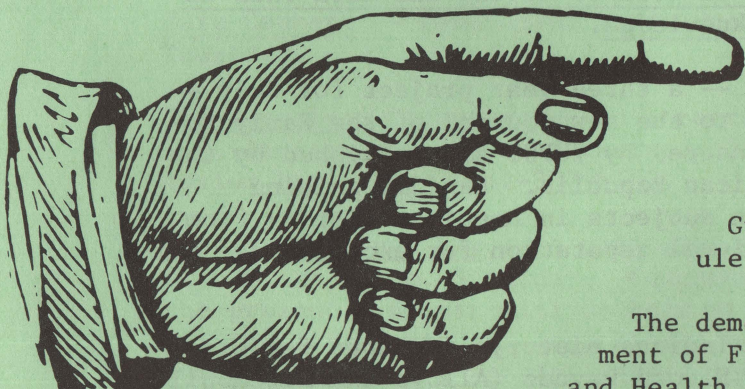

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REMEMBER! ATTEND ONE!

Proper methods of extinguishing fires will be demonstrated at several campus locations from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Thursday of this week. (See Green Sheet of August 30 for detailed schedule.)

The demonstrations, sponsored by the IUPUI Department of Fire Prevention and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration, will be conducted by a member of the Indianapolis Fire Department Fire Prevention Bureau to give university personnel the opportunity to learn the proper use of fire extinguishers to put out fires. The demonstrations also will show the consequences of using the wrong type of extinguisher on a fire and will address HOME FIRE SAFETY as well.

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RECEPTION SET FOR RALPH GRAY, HOOSIER HISTORIAN

Former Indiana Governor Otis R. Bowen called it "a book for the casual reader as well as for scholars and Indiana history buffs . . . excellent for anyone's library."

Former Indiana Senator Birch Bayh says the "volumes put modern Indiana in perspective and help us to understand just how we Hoosiers came to be what we are today."

Such bipartisan support -- plus a raft of endorsements from scholars, historians and editors -- has been elicited by the publication of "The Hoosier State," two volumes of selected readings in Indiana history edited by Ralph D. Gray, professor of history at IUPUI.

From the presses of the William B. Eerdmans Publishing Co. at Grand Rapids, the volumes feature readings from such luminaries as George Ade, Jessamyn West, Ernie Pyle, John Bartlow Martin, Booth Tarkington, Theodore Dreiser, Wilbur Shaw, Irvin Leibowitz, Meredith Nicholson, George Rogers Clark and Dan Wakefield. Former Indiana Governor Matthew E. Welch has written on "The 1964 Primary Election" and chapters span the state's past from B.C. prehistoric cultures through the mid-1970s A.D. Gray himself has contributed a section on one of his specialties, and other IUPUI faculty members also are included (Jan Shippo on "The Riddle of Governor Hanly" and Robert V. Kirch on "Unigov in Marion County").

As it divides the nation's history, the Civil War also provides the breaking point between the two volumes but each includes essays based on primary sources



and covers the gamut from sports to visitors' opinions to firsthand accounts of milestones in Indiana's history.

In its continuing efforts to recognize achievements in American studies, the IUPUI Center for American Studies will sponsor a reception for Gray on Friday (September 18) at 4 p.m. in the fifth-floor faculty lounge at Cavanaugh Hall. All IUPUI faculty and staff are cordially invited to attend and mark this important contribution to Hoosier lore and knowledge.

With the publication of these two volumes -- a three-year project for Gray -- he has turned his attention and expertise to the new Journal of the Early Republic, a quarterly he edits which is sponsored by IUPUI and published by the Society for Historians for the Early American Republic. Rapidly gaining national attention, the journal focuses on subjects in American history from 1789 to 1850 and is rapidly gaining a national reputation for excellence. Number Three will be out in mid-October.

Gray, widely acknowledged as an expert on Indiana history, is known for his definitive and award-winning biography of Elwood Haynes (Alloys and Automobiles: The Life of Elwood Haynes) and his knowledge of Indiana politicians (Gentlemen from Indiana: National Party Candidates, 1836-1940).

OUR HOUSE CORNERSTONE LAYING SCHEDULED

Cornerstone for the Ronald McDonald House, a 24-bedroom facility for outpatient children and families of inpatients at the James Whitcomb Riley Hospital for Children, will be laid at a formal ceremony at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday at the site, the corner of Michigan and Lansing streets.

Our House, Inc., which supports the project, already has more than \$485,000 of the estimated \$1.6 million needed to complete the house and expects to have \$600,000 by the end of the year.

Wednesday's celebration will end with a 6 p.m. old-fashioned Hoosier picnic under a tent on the lawn east of the Union Building. Approximately 6,000 invitations have been issued to persons who have donated material, time or money or who have expressed interest in supporting the project.

James Forslund, president of Our House, will be master of ceremonies for the formal ceremony. I.U. President John W. Ryan, Dr. Steven C. Geering, dean of the School of Medicine, and Dr. Morris Green, chairman of the Department of Pediatrics and physician-in-chief for Riley Hospital, will represent I.U. Patients and some children will help lay the cornerstone.
