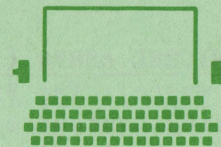

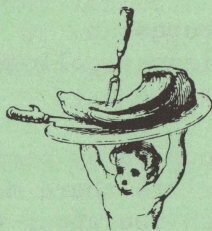

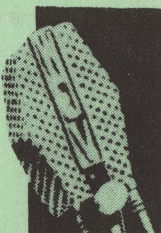

VARGUS TELLS LAWMAKERS HOOSIERS DO NOT WANT MA'S MEASURED SERVICE

Indiana Bell's "local measured service" proposal took a beating last month in a committee hearing of the Indiana Senate. Only hours before the crucial vote to block the widespread use of the billing proposal until 1989, Brian S. Vargus, director of the Public Opinion Laboratory at IUPUI, told Senate committee members that Hoosiers overwhelmingly are against the notion. In a telephone survey of 400 voters across the state, Vargus found that two out of three Hoosiers oppose the Bell plan. Seems most people believe it will cost them more, or will be unfair to some. The Public Service Commission, which regulates the state's utility companies, did not fare much better in the poll and Vargus told lawmakers the group is not well trusted among registered voters. Funding for the poll came from the Indiana Association of Realtors.-JG

ST. MARGARET'S DIAGNOSTIC BREAST CENTER OPENS APRIL 16

Breast cancer affects one in every 11 women in this country; it is increasing. Some women are more prone to cancer than others. Detected early, lives are saved. A new center that will focus on screening for cancer and its treatment, if necessary, is opening Apr. 16 in the Regenstrief Building on campus. The St. Margaret's Diagnostic Breast Center will offer patients low-cost breast diagnostic screening tests and immediate follow-up for those with positive test results. Tests and treatment will involve a team of specialists that include internists, psychologists, gynecologists, surgeons, pathologists and oncologists--specialists in the treatment of cancer.

Before the center opens officially, you can attend a public presentation on breast care presented by medical team members on Apr. 14, noon-1 p.m., in Myers Auditorium at Wishard. After that, tours of the new center will be from 1-3 p.m. St. Margaret's Guild, sponsor of the annual Decorator's Show House, has given the money to renovate and decorate the new center, which features the latest in diagnostic screening equipment such as low-dose x-ray mammography and ultrasound.
