

LOT 57 TO CLOSE FOR CONSTRUCTION

Construction for the expansion of the south parking garage at the southwest corner of West Michigan and Patterson streets will cause some disruption in parking and traffic flow beginning Aug. 19. The garage will stay open during construction of the new four-level facility that will be built on parking lot No. 57, which will be closed. Drivers who use lot No. 57 can use "B" spaces in lots No. 58 and No. 80, whose main entrances are on Agnes and Patterson streets. During part of the construction, Vermont Street will be closed from Barnhill Drive to the west corner of the exit gates of the south garage. The area will be used for construction equipment. Willard E. Hanshew, director of Parking, Transportation and Special Services, asks that we all cooperate and have patience during this improvement.

DR. LEHMAN TALKS ABOUT COLON CANCER

While it's one of the most common types of cancer in men and women, colon cancer has come to popular attention only in the last few weeks since President Reagan joined the approximately one in 20 Americans with the disease. The diagnosis and subsequent surgery to remove his tumor--though frightening to the nation--might have a good effect in terms of curing the disease in a number of other people. Detected early, the cancer is considered to be more than 90% curable, said Dr. Glen Lehman, gastroenterologist and associate professor of medicine at the Medical Center. In later stages however, it is more likely to be fatal.

Some people have a greater risk than others--particularly four groups:

Those who have ulcerative colitis

Those who have suffered from another form of cancer

Those who have had a polyps, a growth not necessarily cancerous, in the colon

Those over the age of 40

The American Cancer Society recommends that people 40-50 years old have an annual digital rectal exam and a stool test to check for hidden blood. Those over 50 should continue annual screening exams and should also have an exam by sigmoidoscopy every three years, which involves examining about the last quarter of the colon, where 75% of the polyps and cancers occur, Dr. Lehman said.

President Reagan's tumor was discovered by a more thorough procedure, a colonoscopy, which examines the entire colon. As in the President's case, this procedure is recommended when there is any type of growth in the lower colon or symptoms such as blood in the stool that cannot be explained by the sigmoidoscopy.

Common symptoms of colon cancer include finding visible blood in the stool, rectal pain, unusually narrow or pencil--like stools, or a change in bowel habits such as more constipation or diarrhea than normal. Any of these signs that persists for more than a few days should be discussed with a physician--regardless of one's age.

Persons in the high-risk groups may have screening tests done at several locations on campus, including the University Hospital G.I. Lab (Ext. 4781), the Family Practice Center (Ext. 2167) and the surgery outpatient clinic in Long Hospital (Ext. 8917).--TW

PROFESSOR KERR'S AGENCY GETS NATIONAL LAURELS

Two related agencies that educate and train court personnel and provide orientation to new judges and continuing education for all judges in the state have received national recognition.

The Indiana Judicial Center and the Judicial Conference of Indiana received the "Outstanding Education Award" from the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges during the council's recent annual meeting at Mobile, Ala.

The Indiana Judicial Center is a state agency which serves as the staff agency of the Judicial Conference, an organization that includes all the state's full-time trial and appellate court judges. William A. (Andy) Kerr, professor at the School of Law, is the center's executive director, and Chief Justice Richard M. Givan is chairman of the Judicial Conference.

VA GETS NEW PSYCHIATRY CHIEF, ELECTS OFFICERS

John L. Sullivan, M.D., has become the new chief of Psychiatry Service at the VA Medical Center. And, Frederick P. Rauscher, M.D., was elected secretary and Kenneth E. Klotz, M.D., was elected secretary-elect of the medical staff during a recent bi-annual meeting. Dr. Sullivan is transferring here from the VA's central office in Washington, D.C., where he was serving as special assistant to the director of Mental Health and Behavioral Science Service and clinical professor of psychiatry at the George Washington University. He will be offered a faculty position as professor of psychiatry in the Dept. of Psychiatry at the School of Medicine. His office is at the Cold Springs Road Division. Dr. Rauscher is a staff psychiatrist and Dr. Klotz is a staff physician in Ambulatory Care Service--both at the VA Medical Center.

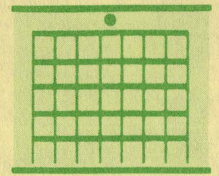
