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## ALMOST 40 NEW COURSES SLATED FOR FALL CURRICULUM LINE-UP

New course offerings -- ranging from Chicano folklore to English romanticism to Buddhist ethics -- will be on the schedule when classes start August 20 for the fall semester at IUPUI.

There will be 38 new courses added to the IUPUI curricula this year as the state's third largest campus continues its academic expansion.

Three new courses will be offered in journalism: Community journalism, public affairs reporting, and public relations.

Seven new courses have been developed in English and foreign languages, including two new Spanish courses on Cervantes' Don Quixote, a colloquium on women in German literature, a survey of medieval French literature, and romanticism and rebellion in English literature.

The Sociology Department has added nine new courses on such subjects as the family, work, power, health and illness, crime and delinquency, organizations, and social movements.

There will be four new courses in religion, including one on the ethics of equality in the United States and India, one on the Hebrew prophets, and one on Buddhist ethics.

The Philosophy Department has new courses on the concept of woman and on the writings of the American philosophers Peirce, James and Dewey. There are new psychology courses on vocational rehabilitation, counseling, and disability.

Advance registration will be held August 12-14. Admission information is available at the IUPUI Admissions Office on the 38th Street Campus.

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## THE CITY AS A COURSE AND A CAREER

Graduate students will have a chance to study the city and work in it, under a HUD program announced by the city's Department of Metropolitan Development (DMD) and IUPUI's Division of Public and Environmental Affairs.

A limited number of openings for the graduate fellows for the 1975-76 school year are available. The aim is to prepare students from minority backgrounds for positions in urban government planning, policy management and related areas. Fellows will receive a stipend of \$4,200-\$4,600 per year (depending on the number of dependents). All tuition, fees and books will be paid by the program.



Fellows will work full-time in the DMD starting August 1 and enroll as full-time students during the regular school year and will then work 15 to 18 hours a week at the DMD. Applications are available at 1232 West Michigan Street, Ext. 4656. A screening committee will interview applicants July 21.

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#### REHABILITATION COUNSELING OFFERED

The IUPUI Department of Psychology is offering a program in Graduate Study in Rehabilitation Counseling which leads to a master of science degree from Purdue University. Length of the program ranges from 24 to 36 months. Students, who must be graduates of an accredited college or university, will take the 36-credit-hour program which includes course study, an oral examination and half-time internship for nine months. Rehabilitation counselors are employed in state rehabilitation agencies, correctional programs, mental hospitals, clinics, workshops, developmental centers and other rehabilitation-oriented programs.
