## Did you know that...

Eighty-six of Indiana's 92 counties are represented in the 5,195 new undergraduate students who enrolled in IUPUI programs last fall. Most of them (3,166) came from Marion County, even though that is 133 fewer than enrolled in the fall of 1977. Actually, among Marion and its seven surrounding counties, new student enrollment went up only in Hamilton and Hendricks counties.

### POET STEPHEN SPENDER TO VISIT IUPUI

Stephen Spender, the distinguished poet, critic and essayist, will make two public appearances at IUPUI's Lecture Hall next month. Spender will give readings of his own works and those of other poets April 8 at 3 p.m. The next evening, April 9 at 8 p.m., he will give an autobiographical lecture which will include reminiscences of the 1930s, Virginia Woolfe, Christopher Isherwood and other writers, and his friend, poet W.H. Auden.

Rufus Reiberg, professor and chairman of the English department, described Spender as one of the few persons living who was present at a part of the great literary, artistic and political movements of the 1930s and 1940s. Reiberg said Spender's friends and associates are almost legendary. Spender himself has said: "Autobiography provides the line of continuity in my work. I am not someone who can shed or disclaim his past."

The past, and those he knew, figure heavily in Spender's work today. Born in England, Spender was educated at Oxford, then lived in Germany for a period and later wrote propaganda for the Republican side during the Spanish Civil War. Since the 1950s he has spent a part of each year in the United States, lecturing and continuing to meet with persons involved in literary and other events.



Spender's active career spans nearly five decades. A list of his friends reads like a roster of important English writers of the century. Besides those mentioned, the names of Cyril Connolly, Lewis MacNeice and Cecil Day Lewis are included. His most recent book, "The Thirties and After," contains new information about the work and lives of William Butler Yeats, D.H. Lawrence and T.S. Eliot.

Spender also will meet with students and faculty during his day at IUPUI. His appearance is sponsored by the Department of English with support from the IUPUI Lectures and Convocations Committee. Both lectures are free and open to the public, as well as to the university community.

IUPUI Spotlight -- Those who attended the Spring Faculty/Staff Meeting in Emerson Hall this month heard remarks from I.U. Vice President Glenn W. Irwin, Jr. and I.U. Board of Trustees President Donald C. Danielson. After reviewing activities and commending the group for its accomplishments, Irwin turned to the concerns of student recruitment and retention. He reminded the faculty and staff to "recognize the great diversity among our students and to do our best to individualize our approach." In his address, Danielson emphasized the high importance with which the I.U. trustees regard the Indianapolis campus, as shown by their continuing support in the legislature for Indianapolis campus requests -- and by the fact that, of the six highest construction priorities for the entire I.U. system, three are at Indianapolis. (Those are the Education/Social Work/Physical Education building, an addition to the Medical Science Building, and a computer facility for the lower floor of the Engineering and Technology Building.) Both officials stressed the strenuous effort I.U. is making to get legislative approval for higher faculty salaries.

The American College of Physicians, meeting in San Francisco this week, is the latest association of health care professionals to experiment with satellites to reach a large national membership by television. About 6,000 of the college's 41,000 members are attending the meeting.
