BLOOMINGTON HAPPENING

Donald C. Danielson, New Castle businessman and member of the Indiana University
Board of Trustees since 1959, was re-elected to a three-year term on the board by vote
of I.U. alumni on June 12.

Danielson, who served as president of the board in 1970 and 1971, received 9,885 votes out of a total of 22,205 cast.

The seven other candidates to represent alumni on the board were:

William L. Garrett, director of continuing education, Indiana Vocational and Technical College, Indianapolis, 4,899 votes; Nathaniel C. Hamilton III, 5264 N. Illinois Street, Indianapolis, a law student at Bloomington, 2,647; Mrs. William G. Spannuth, Bloomington, 1,418; John E. Fancher, civic affairs editor of the Bloomington Herald-Telephone, 1,414; Philip G. Harrison, director of the University Division and student activities at I.U. Kokomo, 785; Timothy B. Alexander, an I.U. junior from 2320 N. Stockwell Road, Evansville, 688, and James L. Boyd, teacher at Blackford High School, Hartford City, 469.

The I.U. Board of trustees consists of eight members, five appointed by the governor and three elected by alumni. All terms are for three years. The terms of the alumnielected members are staggered so that only one is up for election each year.

Other alumni-elected members of the board are Robert H. Menke, Huntingburg, whose term expires in 1972, and Donald R. Lash, Marshall, who will serve until 1973.
