DEAN RALPH E. McDONALD AND DR. MELVIN LUND participated in the Fifth Dental Congress in Sao Paulo, Brazil on January 24-28, 1972.

During the previous week, Dr. McDonald presented a paper at the First International Dental Congress in Rio de Janeiro, and met with the faculty of the Dental School of the new State University of Guanabara.

Dean McDonald reports that there are 12 alumni of Indiana University in Brazil and eleven of them have degrees from the School of Dentistry.

MORE ON THE SPORTS BEAT...It looks like another great year for the School of Dentistry basketball team, which won the Medical Center pre-season tournament last fall and at last report was 3-0 in league play. Team members include Roger Miller, former basketball player at the University of Evansville; Steve Ward, who won four letters in basketball at Earlham College and was named to the Indiana College All-Star and the NAIA (National Association of Inter-Collegiate Athletics) All-American squads; Vaughn Wedeking, guard at Jacksonville University for three years and co-captain in 1970-71; Stan Crunk, Rick Blake, Dick Walker, Ron Corley, Bob Holloway, Rich Stackert, Phil Walter, Perry Wainman, and Don Walker, coach.

Steve Ward was a star trackman at Earlham and won the broad jump event in the Big State track meet at Notre Dame. AT THE FACULTY COUNCIL MEETING on February 4, Dennis Bailey, junior dental student, issued an appeal for faculty members willing to help out with supervision of dental care provided by students on Monday and Wednesday evenings at the South Side Community Health Center, 234 W. Morris St. The Center was established three years ago by a group of community residents with the aid of the Medical School. Limited dental services, such as home care instruction, prophylaxes, and emergency care, have been provided since last May. Mr. Bailey, who directs the Dental Clinic, states that faculty volunteers are needed, even if they can spend only one evening a semester at the clinic. Student aid is also needed, especially a student to direct the program next year. Those interested in helping out should see Mr. Bailey or Robert Lindsey.
