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

Paul Barton, professor emeritus of journalism and community dentistry, came to IU in 1968 from Ohio State University. A native of New Haven, Connecticut, Professor Barton holds degrees from DePauw University and the University of Washington. He served in the U.S. Marine Corps during World War II.

Professor Barton's teaching experience includes faculty appointments at the U.S. Naval Academy and the University of Washington, in addition to IU and Ohio State. He is a former reporter for the Waterbury (Connecticut) *Republican;* copy editor of the Washington (D.C.) *Star*; writer and editor for the U.S. Naval Institute *Proceedings;* writer for *Changing Times* magazine; and writing coach for the *Baltimore Sunpapers*.

To be chosen as president of the Indiana University School of Dentistry Alumni Association is a distinct honor. I wish to thank you all for the pleasure of serving you through the coming year.

At IU Professor Barton has worked closely with graduate students in the development of their master's theses and has taught classes in scientific writing. He also assisted faculty members in preparation of scholarly manuscripts. He formerly served as secretary of the dental school's graduate committee and faculty council, associate editor of the IUSD Alumni Bulletin, and chairman of the teaching committee. He was for many years an editorial consultant for the Journal of Periodontology and the Journal of Prosthetic Dentistry.

Professor Barton is an honorary alumnus of IUSD and a member of Omicron Kappa Upsilon national honorary society. He has been the recipient of a distinguished service award from the American Association of Dental Editors and an all-university distinguished teaching award from IU. He retired from his full-time position with the school in 1986.

Dr. Malcolm E. Boone, professor of prosthodontics, was a private practitioner in Terre Haute before moving to Indianapolis in the 1960s. After several years of instructing part-time in the complete denture department, Dr. Boone was

appointed to the full-time faculty in 1966. In 1969 he established a prosthodontic practice in Indianapolis.

Dr. Boone was born in St. Louis, Missouri. He attended Butler University and holds two degrees from the IU School of Dentistry (DDS '46, MSD '62). He served in the U.S. Navy. His promotion to professor came in 1977.

Dr. Boone headed the complete denture graduate program for many years and directed the department's research efforts. He was involved with several research projects, funded with corporate grants.

Dr. Boone has an extensive record of service throughout the state and elsewhere for his continuing education presentations, table clinics, and participation on other professional programs. He is a diplomate of the American Board of Prosthodontics, a fellow of the American College of Dentists and the International College of Dentists, and a member of OKU. He has been a national president of the Psi Omega dental fraternity and of the IUSD Alumni Association, and is a former editor of the American Equilibration Society's Compendium. He currently serves as president-elect of the American Prosthodontic Society.

Dr. Robert H. Derry, professor emeritus of prosthodontics and longtime director of continuing education and chairman of the complete denture department, has served the University and dental school for 45 years. He is a native of New London, Connecticut, and a dental graduate of the Medical College of Virginia.

Dr. Derry joined the IU faculty as an assistant professor in 1943 and established a part-time dental practice in 1947.

He was named the School's first director of dental continuing education in 1968, a position he held for nearly 20 years. Under Association's President's Recognition Dr. Derry's direction IUSD presented award-winning continuing education exhibits at the ADA annual session for several years. Dr. Derry also coordinated a number of highly successful continuing education programs presented abroad.

In 1970 Dr. Derry was promoted to professor of complete denture and three years later he was appointed chairman of the department.

Dr. Derry was made a Sagamore of the Wabash by then Governor Otis R. Bowen. Dr. Derry is a fellow of the American College of Dentists and the International College of Dentists, and a

member of the Pierre Fauchard Academy. He has received the Indiana Public Health Award; the Alpha Omega Award for Excellence in Continuing Education; the Faithful Service Award from the Indianapolis District Dental Society; and a certificate of appreciation from the IUSD Alumni Association. He retired from his full-time position with the School in 1984.

Dr. Roland W. Dykema, professor of prosthodontics, stayed on with the IU dental school after graduating from here in 1947. Except for a two-year tour of duty with the U.S. Air Force in the early '50s, Dr. Dykema has spent the past 40 years in service at the dental school. He was promoted to professor in 1962 and chaired the department of crown and bridge for almost 20 years.

Dr. Dykema was born in Willmar, Minnesota. He attended Wheaton College in Wheaton, Illinois, and Tufts University in Medford, Massachusetts, before enrolling in dental school at Indiana. He holds an MSD degree ('61) in addition to the DDS.

Dr. Dykema is a diplomate of the American Board of Prosthodontics. A worldwide lecturer, he is also the co-author of three textbooks, including Modern Practice in Crown and Bridge Prosthodontics, which he wrote with Dr. John F. Johnston.

Dr. Dykema is a member of OKU and a fellow of the American College of Dentists. He has served as president of the American Academy of Crown and Bridge Prosthodontics and of the American Board of Prosthodontics. Last year the John F. Johnston Society and the IU dental school honored Dr. Dykema by dedicating the newly remodeled graduate prosthodontics laboratory in his name.

We are pleased to announce that Dr. Roland Dykema has returned as a full-time Associate Professor in Crown and Bridge, after helping the **United States Armed Forces** for the last two years.

Dr. Timothy J. O'Leary, professor of periodontics and chairman of the department for 16 years, joined the IU faculty after more than 20 years of service in the Dental Corps of the U.S. Air Force. Dr. O'Leary was born in Ann Arbor, Michigan. He attended Syracuse University before entering the dental program at Tufts University. He graduated cum laude in 1946, and completed postgraduate training in periodontics at New York University in 1955.

Dr. O'Leary became professor and chairman of the department of periodontics in 1973, after serving as chairman of graduate periodontics for several years. He was made an honorary alumnus of the IUSD Alumni Association in 1973.

The author of numerous scientific articles, Dr. O'Leary was editor of the Journal of Periodontology for 18 years. He is a diplomate of the American Board of Periodontology; a fellow of the American College of Dentists and the American Academy of Periodontology; and a past president of Theta Theta Chapter of OKU. Among his many honors are the William A. Gies Award for Periodontology, and the Gold Medal Award from the American Academy of Periodontology. He served as president of the Academy in 1976 and as chairman of the

Three Indiana University periodontists were in the spotlight at the recent annual meeting of the American Academy of Periodontology in San Francisco. Dr. Timothy J. O'Leary, Chairman of the Department of Periodontics and a Fellow of the Academy, delivered the Presidential Address as outgoing head of the organization. He is the only person ever to serve concurrently as President, Chairman of the American Board of Periodontology, and Editor of the Journal of Periodontology.

Dr. O'Leary has made hundreds of scientific and clinical presentations at local, state, national and international meetings.

After retirement from the fulltime faculty this summer Dr. O'Leary will remain with the dental school as a consultant on a part-time basis. He will also continue to be engaged in writing and research projects, and in his periodontic practice.

Dr. Ralph G. Schimmele, professor of dental auxiliary education and associate dean for program development and extramural programs, has served IUSD in various capacities for most of the years since he graduated from the dental school in 1952.

Dr. Schimmele is a native of Fort Wayne. A U.S. Army veteran of World War II, he maintained a private practice in Fort Wayne from 1952-65.

In the early years of his career at IU Dr. Schimmele lectured in practice management and oral anatomy. In 1963 he was named first director of dental hygiene/dental assisting at the Fort Wayne campus. Two years later he became director of dental auxiliary education on all regional campuses and in 1972 he was appointed assistant dean for program development and extramural programs. The title of associate dean was given in 1980.

During his tenure the extramural program expanded to include hundreds of practitioners who help students of dentistry and dental hygiene gain valuable "in the field" experience by permitting them to observe and assist in dental offices throughout the state. Also, Dr. Schimmele's contributions to the associateship program have assisted many young graduates in their search for associateship opportunities in Indiana.

Dr. Schimmele is a member of OKU and the Pierre Fauchard Academy and a fellow of the International College of Dentists. He has received distinguished teaching awards from IU at Fort Wayne

and from the Isaac Knapp District Dental Society; Distinguished Eagle Scout and Silver Antelope awards from the Boy Scouts of America; and a distinguished alumnus award from the IUSD Alumni Association.

Dr. James C. Shanks, Jr., professor of speech pathology and clinical director of speech service in the department of oto-laryngology—head and neck surgery (School of Medicine), and professor of orthodontics (School of Dentistry), plans to remain on as a part-time consultant to the dental school after his retirement this summer.

Dr. Shanks was born in Detroit, Michigan, and earned degrees from Michigan State (B.A.), University of Denver (M.A.) and Northwestern University (Ph.D.). He held teaching positions at the Iowa State Teachers College and at

Syracuse University before coming to the IU School of Medicine in 1955. He received his dental school appointment in 1970 and was promoted to professor in 1977. He worked closely with graduate students at the dental school who chose speech pathology as their minor for the master's degree.

Dr. Shanks played a key role on the University's cleft palate and craniofacial anomalies teams. In the past two decades he has traveled worldwide to participate in more than 150 seminars and workshops on laryngectomee rehabilitation.

He is a fellow of the American Speech and Hearing Association and was on the Indiana Board of Examiners in Speech Pathology and Audiology from 1974-77. He has received a distinguished service award from the Governor's Commission for the Handicapped, and several awards from the International Association of Laryngectomees and the Indiana Speech and Hearing Association.

Dr. S. Miles Standish, professor of oral pathology, chairman of the oral diagnosis/oral medicine division of dental diagnos-

tic sciences, and associate dean of graduate and postgraduate education, retired this summer after more than 40 years of service to the University.

Dr. Standish was born in Campbellsburg and graduated from Salem High School. His dental degrees from IU were earned in 1945 (DDS) and 1956 (MS). He served in the U.S. Navy Dental Corps.

At Indiana University Dr. Standish originally taught in oral diagnosis and periodontics and then in oral pathology; he joined the faculty full-time in 1958. Dr. Standish held key administrative positions during his career at the dental school in the areas of graduate education, oral pathology and oral diagnosis/oral medicine. He achieved the rank of professor in 1967 and became chairman of OD/OM in 1976 (that department has since become a division of dental diagnostic sciences).

Dr. Standish is highly regarded in the nation for his work as a forensic odontologist. During the trial of an accused murderer in the 1970s, Dr. Standish participated as an expert witness, giving testimony as an authority on bite marks. The suspect was convicted, largely on the basis of Dr. Standish's testimony regarding bite mark analysis. That trial established a precedent in Indiana for admission of bite mark evidence into a court of law and is cited as a landmark case in this state.

Dr. Standish is a diplomate of the American Board of Pathology and the American Board of Forensic Odontology; a fellow of the American Academy of Oral Pathology and the American Academy of Forensic Sciences. He has served as a president of the American Academy of Oral Pathology, the American Board of Oral Pathology, and Theta Theta chapter of OKU.

Dr. Standish has written many articles, co-written several textbooks and contributed chapters to several others. He has presented many courses around the country. He was appointed an Honorary Lieutenant Colonel by the Indiana State Police for his work in forensic dentistry.

Shortly before his retirement Dr. Standish received the Glenn W. Irwin, Jr., MD, Experience Excellence Award on the IUPUI campus.

S.M. Standish, '45, Lt. (j.g.), writes from Germany that he expects to be discharged from the Navy by August 10. He says "In general, I find the services have helped me considerably. The opportunity to compare and exchange ideas with dentists from all parts of the States, to observe the type of dentistry performed on the great number of Allied Personnel from England, France, Denmark and Belgium is unparalleled."

Identifying Victims After A.F. Jet Crashes Into Airport Hotel

At 10 am on October 20, 1987, I was treating a patient in the Department of Prosthodontics at the Indiana University School of Dentistry. Suddenly my patient, who was listening to a small portable radio, looked quite concerned. I stopped my work to ask him what was wrong. He said a plane had just crashed into the Indianapolis Airport Ramada Inn. The hotel was on fire and there were casualties. So began my first experience in forensic dentistry.

Forensic odontology is defined as the "branch of dentistry that deals with proper handling and examination of dental evidence and the proper evaluation and presentation of dental findings in the interest of justice." The forensic dentist is involved in five general areas: routine identification, bite-mark evidence, child abuse, civil litigation, and mass disasters.


Dental findings used in forensics can be found as far back as the First Century A.D. Much later, Cuban dentist Oscar Amoedo in 1897 identified most of the 126 victims of a fire in Paris at the Bazaar de la Charite. On the basis of this experience, Dr. Amoedo wrote the first forensic dental text in 1898. Forensic dentistry has since been used to identify victims of other mass disasters, including floods and airplane crashes.

To better understand the process by which individuals are identified, certain terms should be defined in the context of forensic medicine/dentistry:

Antemortem (before death). Antemortem materials consist of finger-prints and the medical or dental records of a known individual, including routine radiographs, dental charts, study models, dentures, etc.



- Postmortem (after death). Postmortem records include a victim's fingerprints, dentition, individual teeth. They also include radiographs, the charting of a corpse's dentition, or a denture.
- Point of concordance (a single item which appears in both antemortem and postmortem records in exactly the same configuration and location). In the context of forensic dentistry, it may be considered to be a single restoration or a portion of a restoration. A single characteristic restoration may have several areas which may be considered points of concordance.



October 20, 1987, turned out to be a memorable day for me, and for the city of Indianapolis. Shortly after 9 am, a United States Air Force A-7D Corsair II attack jet en route from Pittsburgh to Nellis Air Force Base, Nevada, lost power at 31,000 feet, 15 miles south of Indianapolis. When the pilot's attempt at a "dead stick landing" at Indianapolis International Airport failed, he ejected. At 9:15, the powerless jet clipped the roof of a bank and then slammed into the lobby of the Ramada Inn.² Nine people were killed and six were injured. (One of the injured later died.)

The dead were transported to the morgue at the Marion County Sheriff's Department. Five victims were identified

visually; the other four were burned beyond recognition.

During the day I learned that three IU School of Dentistry faculty members, Dr. S. Miles Standish, Dr. Donnell Marlin, and Dr. Cecil Brown, had been asked to go to the morgue to identify the remaining four victims. Having participated in Dr. Standish's intramural course on forensic dentistry, I expressed my interest in the event and was told that I could go with them to the morgue at 5 pm. Dr. Standish is professor of oral pathology and chairman of the oral diagnosis/oral medicine division of dental diagnostic sciences. He is a diplomate of the American Board of Forensic Odontology and has made more than 200 forensic identifications. Dr. Marlin, assistant professor of dental diagnostic sciences, is also a diplomate of the board and has made more than 80 identifications. Dr. Brown is an associate professor of endodontics whose previous career in the Air Force involved him in the identification of victims of several well-known disasters, including the Jonestown, Guyana, massacre/suicide; the Tenerife Aircraft disaster, and the

flood at Big Thompson, Colorado. He has made more than 500 identifications.

When we arrived at the morgue we were met by Dean Hawley, MD, John Pless, MD, and Michael Clark, MD, deputy coroners from the Pathology Department at Indiana University School of Medicine. Also present were personnel from the Marion County Sheriff's Department and Coroner's office, including Mike Beatty, a second year dental student employed part-time at the morgue.

Our job was to collect postmortem evidence from the remains and make comparisons. For each of the four examinations, the dentition was charted for number and condition of teeth, restorations, malpositions, etc. Lateral headplate radiographs were also taken of the remains. While such radiographs do not show sharp images of the teeth or restorations, they can be used to compare with antemortem films. If lateral headplates are of questionable value in a particular case, the jaws may be dissected and films may be taken of the individual teeth.

The postmortem examination is best conducted by a team of three individuals one to examine the remains, one to assist, and one to record. The examination should then be repeated, with the examining dentist and recording dentist switching roles. Postmortem radiographs are obtained and compared with films from the antemortem record. All of the Ramada Inn examinations were conducted in this manner.

The team I participated on processed case #87-1049 (code indicates the year and the number of bodies brought to the Marion County morgue during that year). I did the initial examinations, Mike Beatty assisted me, and Dr. Marlin recorded. Then Dr. Marlin examined the remains while I recorded. We noted eight amalgam restorations and several malposed teeth. A lateral headplate was also taken of the body.

Earlier in the day, the probable identity of the victim had been established and dental records had been obtained from his dentist and brought to the morgue. The records included charts and bitewing radiographs and showed eight amalgam restorations. The radiographs showed the characteristic outlines and positions of these amalgam restora-

tions. A comparison of antemortem and postmortem materials established many points of concordance and we were able to positively identify case #87-1049.

Each of the identifications was carried out in this way. (Identification of the last victim was delayed due to the difficulty of finding next of kin and subsequent problems in locating her dental records. She was positively identified the following morning.)

I was given the assignment of writing the report for case #87-1049. Assisting in the identification of this victim was an unforgettable experience for me, not only because it was my first forensic identification, but also because of what I heard later that night. After completing the identification process, I went home and watched television reports of the accident. One report included an interview with the parents of a young man who had worked at the front desk of the Ramada Inn. They claimed that their son had phoned them just after the accident to say he was OK. During the conversation they were disconnected. The parents had come to the crash site to see their son, but he was nowhere to be found. I knew where he was. He was case #87-1049.



Notes from the Dean's Desk

The Indiana University system is experiencing much growth and change, and faculty members of the School of Dentistry are key players in the planning. In his inaugural paper, "IU: One University—Indiana University at Its Best," our new president, Thomas Ehrlich, established new goals for Indiana University. A planning strategy for the future is being devised and documented by the administration through various working groups, with representation from all schools. A parallel master plan that is being developed for the IUPUI campus will include extended consideration of facilities and academic matters. The new administration of Indiana University is striving for renewed excellence in education and research, and our School of Dentistry must be prepared to face the challenges and needs of the public during the next decade.

With these goals in mind, our School of Dentistry faculty members have recommended and are implementing a number of modifications in the dental school facility. Proposals from the longrange planning committee center on the need to enhance patient care and, as a result, predoctoral clinical training will focus on the diagnostic and periodontic clinics. A centralized, computerized appointment system will help us better utilize available staff and clinic space, while also helping our "facilitators" better monitor student activities and patient flow. Increased service to our patients and added clinical productivity are the expected benefits of this new approach in which designated faculty members guide the progress of both patient and student through the total clinical experience.

Closing our TEAM clinic was not an easy decision. The TEAM program, directed by Dr. Donald R. Tharp, offered an excellent method of teaching expanded duties and the management of

dental auxiliaries. For many years the expert staff offered our fourth year students valuable clinical experience with expanded functions hygienists and assistants. However, prohibitive cost of the program, along with budget constraints, dictated the closing of the facility. On a brighter note, we will now be able to fund the establishment of our undergraduate orthodontic program (that is required for continued accreditation) and for the expansion of the undergraduate periodontal surgery experience. The clinic space itself will host a much needed faculty research area, as well as an expanded special care clinic. We are happy that it has been possible to assign TEAM personnel to other departments in need of their services and that experience in auxiliary utilization will continue in other departments. Much appreciation goes to Dr. Tharp and the TEAM staff for their many years of devoted service and excellence in patient care.

Our faculty is placing much more emphasis on research, in addition to seeking more effective ways of transferring the knowledge gained to their students and to practicing dentists. Under the direction of Associate Dean George K. Stookey, the research committee has applied for \$10,000,000 in research support during the last year. Dental practice in the future will depend on the quality of today's research. Faculty research and investigations by our students in graduate programs are the key elements in development of the new dental care services that will become available to patients. Innovative research will be especially imporant in Indiana, where prevention has been highly successful during the last 40 years.

Funds have been awarded to the School of Dentistry to establish a bone research laboratory and also to remodel the biomaterials laboratory. The bone research facility will support the multi-disciplinary research program directed by the new chairman of orthodontics, Dr. W. Eugene Roberts. Many new studies in the basic sciences are planned for these new facilities and will be coordinated with our new research initiative.

My deep appreciation goes to the alumni and friends who have supported the School of Dentistry through their donations to the IU Foundation. Our director of development, Mr. Danny R. Dean, finished the year with the most successful campaign in the University system. Funds received enabled us to purchase fiberoptic attachments for the air turbine handpieces, and to undertake remodeling of many areas of the dental school. The support provided us is essential . . . and it is especially appreciated in this challenging time for all of higher education. Our faculty will continue to excel and build upon the pride that we feel in our institution and in the quality services provided to the people of Indiana.

Dr. Robert V. Elia MSD Class of 1990

He is far from home. And, like every other graduate student in prosthodontics, he has spent most of his first year in Indiana tucked away in a windowless laboratory on the third floor of the dental school.

But Dr. Robert V. Elia, of Toronto, Canada, isn't complaining. With a self-described "penchant for exactness," Robert chose the IU program in part because of its reputation for placing rigorous demands on its students. He came here prepared to devote 100% of his attention and energy to the intensive master's program.

"You shouldn't live like this for a lifetime," he says. "But there is so much to learn in such a small period of time. I don't mind being confined for three years."

During his dental school years at the University of Toronto Robert had no intention of specializing. "And, of the specialties, prosthodontics would have been my very *last* choice," he says with a laugh. As a high school senior Robert thought he was gearing up for a career in engineering and was actually accepted into engineering programs at three universities. There was just one drawback. "I had always liked biology and working with my hands," he recalls. "I knew both would be lost in engineering." After working part-time as a dental assistant in a neighbor's dental office and having long discussions with a friend who was applying to dental school, Robert began to rethink his future.

"It seemed more and more as if dentistry was a perfect combination of engineering and medicine," he says. Robert made a last-minute switch to general sciences before heading off to the University of Toronto.

In dental school he enjoyed performing oral and periodontal surgeries,

because of the precision and finesse required. Between the third and fourth years of study he completed an externship in Boston, where he worked under Drs. Gerald M. Kramer and Myron Nevins, co-editors of the *International Journal of Periodontics and Restorative Dentistry*.

After graduating in 1985 Robert spent a year as an intern at St. Michael's Hospital in Toronto. During that period he enrolled in a prosthodontics grad course at the University of Toronto. "My interest began to build from there, especially with implants," he says. "Dr. George Zarb, of the University of Toronto, was carrying out a lot of research with Branemark implants. It began to dawn on me that prosthodontics—with maybe the exception of orthopaedics—came as close as anything to engineering in the medical field. I probably would have loved orthopaedics!"

While Robert associated in private practice the following year he looked into graduate studies at five U.S. and Canadian schools. He soon had his hopes

set on coming to Indiana. IU came highly recommended by Dr. Zarb; Dr. Phil Watson, a well respected Toronto dentist and IU alumnus (operative dentistry, MSD '70), influenced Robert as well. When he interviewed here he was impressed by the faculty, the facilities and IU's many resources. "Also, the grad students I met praised the program in areas that were important to me. So I waited. And phoned. And bugged Dr. Dykema!" Robert was delighted when a position in the class was offered.

He takes the prosthodontics department's well known demand for perfection in stride. "If you've made a decision to be the best you can be in a defined field, the feeling that you are going to dedicate yourself to that goal should be a prerequisite."

Although Robert's father moved to Canada from southern Italy in the 1950s, the family has maintained strong ties to the homeland. Robert first visited the small mountain town in the Providence of Calabria, where his grandparents still live, when he was five. He has returned several times. "In Calabria there are stone houses with beautiful masonry," he says. "The doors of the homes open right onto the narrow streets, which are cobblestone. Lumber trucks coming down from the mountains pass through, scraping the walls along the way."

On that first childhood visit Robert stayed long enough to forget the English language. "When I got back to Toronto and started first grade," he says, "I was put in a class for slow learners. Mum was furious! She insisted that I be put into the regular class. Within two weeks I was speaking English again."

Another pleasant journey to Italy—this time to Siena—came after high school, when Robert enrolled with a

small group of students in a language class sponsored by the University of Toronto. They arrived in Italy during the "Palio delle Contrade," a horse race popular in the Middle Ages that is reenacted twice a year in Siena. "The town is completely transformed for the race," he says. "Siena is made up of neighborhoods, and each is represented by a horse and jockey. Each has its own festivities and its own flag. When I came to Indiana and walked into the Clowes Pavilion at the Indianapolis Museum of Art, I was surprised and impressed to see hanging from the ceiling of the atrium all of the colorful flags reprepresenting the different 'contrade' (neighborhoods) of Siena."

Robert's mother's family came to Canada from England. "My grandfather was originally from the Ukraine," he says. "As a scientist, he was involved in the development of radar in England. During World War II one of his jobs was to diffuse bombs that hadn't gone off in the much bombed city of Coventry. After the family moved to Canada, my grandmother and the five children lived for a time in Ottawa while grandpa did scientific work in Resolute Bay in the Artic."

Robert's father, Virgilio, is a businessman, and his mother, Olga, has worked in land developing and real estate. They encouraged Robert, his sister, Julia,

and brother Richard, to become exposed culturally to as much as possible as they grew up. Robert's love of classical music developed early, thanks to family trips to Saturday matinees featuring the symphony. He began to play the violin in iunior high and a few years later was accepted into the school's prestigious chamber orchestra, composed of 15 string players, including Robert's sister. Although he hasn't played publicly in recent years, he still gets "an incredible amout of pleasure from it. Music is a reflection of your character and how you feel at the time. It's very much a release of emotion for me, and very personal. I love classical music for its relaxing quality—I can even go to sleep listening to the 1812 Overture." Robert has recently found a violin practicing partner in Mrs. Julie Metcalf, the dental school's graduate recorder who is also a member of the Bloomington Symphony Orchestra.

After he completes the program at IU Robert looks forward to reestablish-

ing patient rapport, something he has missed since leaving his associateship. "I loved the dentist/patient interaction that I had in Toronto," he says. "I guess you can view patients as mounted models, but they are not. I hope to offer my patients treatment that is unique to them."

Robert has made no definite plans, but he says that he will probably return home after graduating from Indiana University. He emphasizes the important role that location plays on a dentist's mental and physical health.

"I function very well in an environment such as that offered in Toronto," he says. "I think one thing that makes Dr. Dykema an exceptional prosthodontist is his interest in other subjects. He and I talk about many non-dental subjects, and you can tell in his responses that he has given a fair amount of thought to many things. That is a key to professional development. You think of specializing as a narrowing of your field, and in fact it is a broadening—it's learning to appreciate where you fit into the larger picture."

Dr. Elia's campus apartment is a brief walk from the dental school. Occasionally he and Mrs. Julie Metcalf, the dental school's graduate recorder, take a few minutes of the lunch hour to practice together. Julie plays for the Bloomington Symphony Orchestra in the first violin section. Here they are shown brushing up on their Bach.

Alumnus Close-Up

Dr. Richard L. Lasbury DDS Class of 1965

One hot morning last June, it took Dr. Richard L. Lasbury three hours to make the 50-mile trip from his home in Kokomo to Indianapolis. Dick Lasbury is not a poky driver—he's an amateur cyclist who cruised into town on his Plantenga 10-speed, arriving at the Indiana University Medical Center in just 2 hours, 58 minutes, and 21 seconds.

The bike ride to Indy, like so many of Dick's other athletic pursuits, was part fun, part challenge. Remarkably, the reason Dick had come to the med center on that morning was to keep his first post-operative followup appointment with Dr. William Capello, an orthopaedic surgeon who six weeks earlier had replaced Dick's arthritic left hip. It is entirely possible that neither Dr. Capello nor his patient look upon Dick's peddling 100 miles (roundtrip) with a new artificial hip as an especially noteworthy feat. They have, after all, been through this before. Three years ago Dr. Capello replaced Dick's right hip, also because of osteoarthritis.

Since that first surgery in 1985 Dick has often kept his appointments with Dr. Capello by cycling to the med center instead of driving. Obviously pleased that he was still able to complete the journey, even with two artificial hips, Dick chalked up one more victory in a long list of athletic adventures that have kept the Kokomo dentist looking on the positive side.

After growing up in Hammond and serving in the Army, Dick enrolled at IU-Bloomington with a business degree in mind. In his sophomore year he observed a friend (in pre-dent) studying chicken embryos through a microscope. Deciding that peering into a scope was more exciting than what his business classes offered, he changed his major to pre-dent. "I signed up for chemistry and started all over again," Dick says.

He managed to stay on schedule, completing all of the requirements for a degree in zoology except for physics. He took a job teaching science to junior high

Two years later, with requirements completed, Dick was accepted into dental school in 1961; that same year he married Betty Jean Converse, whom he had met at IU.

After graduation in 1965 the Lasburys noticed during a visit to Kokomo that IU had a regional campus there—a good sign of a healthy, growing community. They decided to put down stakes, a choice they have never regretted. For the past 10 years Dick has practiced on Southland Avenue in an office sporting an early American decor and furnished in part with special gifts from Dick's patients. Wall hangings donated by patients, such as an Indiana teacher's certificate from the 1880s and a letter written during the Civil War, are featured in each operatory. Dick is very proud of the relationships that have been fostered with patients over the years. "I see my patients as members of an extended family at this point," he says.

Dick Lasbury's love of sports—especially cycling, running, and racquetball—came relatively late in life. By the age of 40 he was overweight and leading a life that was not physically challenging. "I concentrated on building my practice from 1965 to the mid-1970's," Dick says. But he was jolted out of his sedentary ways when his brother suffered a heart attack. Luckily, his brother survived, but the Lasburys' father had died from a heart attack. Dick decided to make some changes.

Dick had already started to dabble in racquetball ("purely the 'hit and giggle' variety"), but after his brother's health problems he began to pursue racquetball and running in earnest. He credits his wife, Betty, for helping with his running regimen and supporting his efforts at creating a new lifestyle. "We had a three-quarter mile loop and I'd run early each morning before sun up," he says. "I'd clap my hands at a certain point on the loop so that Betty could check my times and keep track of me in the dark."

As Dick shed his extra pounds, he gained enough confidence to run in a one-mile race, held in Twelve Mile, Indiana. There he won a ribbon for accurately predicting how well he would do.

Then sons Mark and David began to get involved. "The boys ran because they saw their dad running," Betty says. "And Dick kept running to keep them interested." The 13-mile races (such as Indy's Mini-Marathon) began to replace 5 and 6-milers, and before long the family was casting an eye toward marathons. Dick has competed in 26-mile races in Terre Haute, Bloomington, Crawfordsville and Carmel. "In the beginning the children added an extra incentive for Dick," Betty says, "and then he began to see many other benefits of the sport."

"One unexpected side benefit of my running," Dick says, "is that it has been tremendous for the practice. I have much more than dentistry to talk about with my patients. They are extremely interested in where I run, how I do, and where I'm going next."

Racquetball also turned out to be a sport in which Dick excelled. In 1981 and 1983 he and his doubles partner, Jay Reed, won the state championship for their age group. Dick has also made it to the state finals in the singles category. During the years that the American Dental Association held its national dental athletics program at the annual sessions, Dick often came away with certificates and trophies in racquetball competitions. One year in Kansas City, he played son Mark in the racquetball finals. (Mark won.)

It was amidst all of these activities several years ago that Dick became aware of a soreness in his hip that wouldn't go away. He attributed the pain to his running. When he finally consulted a doctor, the diagnosis of osteoarthritis left him stunned. "I couldn't believe it," he says. "It was a heck of a blow."

Dick was told to change his lifestyle and give up running, but he refused to accept what seemed at the time to be a "death sentence." He continued to run,



cycle, and play racquetball, only with difficulty. "I won one of my state racquetball championships during this period," he says. He put the surgery off as long as possible.

After successfully undergoing surgery to replace his right hip, Dick celebrated (in typical Lasbury fashion) by heading down to Indy for a game of racquetball with his orthopaedic surgeon!

For several years Dick has kicked off the IU football season by cycling from Kokomo to Bloomington for the opening game (and then back). Other activities have included scuba diving, which he hoped would help him learn to like water (it didn't); and parachuting, which he tried once.

"He sets a very good example for other people with arthritis," Betty says. (The most recent hip surgery went as smoothly as the first.) "Every time an article has appeared in the newspaper about Dick, we are inundated by phone calls from arthritis sufferers."

And what does Dick Lasbury get out of all this strenuous recreation? "Everything!" he responds enthusiastically. "I feel good all of the time and love the way it has brought the family together."

Mark Lasbury is currently entering his third year in dental school at Indiana. His roommate in Indianapolis is brother David, a junior at IUPUI. David is planning to participate in the internationally known Iron Man competition in Hawaii, a brutally difficult three-part race involving swimming, running, and biking.

Daughter Cheryl is married and living in Indianapolis with her husband, Tim Underhill. He often joins the Lasbury men in cycling, and each October even Cheryl goes along to participate in Bloomington's "Hilly Hundred."

The family enjoys many other forms of entertainment, in addition to the sports. They love attending musicals together and have traveled as far as Canada to see a performance.

In the Kokomo Rose Society's recent competition, Dick scooped up a couple of awards in the novice division for his floribunda Europeana. He is proud to have participated as a volunteer dentist for the Pan American games, hosted last summer in Indianapolis. He is also proud to have gained fellowship status in the Academy of General Dentistry and is currently working on the mastership.

Last year Dick fabricated a mouth guard for Mr. Marvin Johnson, light heavyweight champion of the world, and then took the family to Trinidad to watch Johnson defend his title—and perhaps to see how the guard would hold up. (The mouth guard did just fine, but Johnson lost the bout, and his world title, to Leslie Stewart.)

Last year Dick fabricated a mouth guard for Mr. Marvin Johnson, light heavyweight champion of the world . . .

Looking to further conquests, Dick hopes eventually to fly airplanes and get involved in canoe racing. There are two other dreams:

"It would really be great if, with my two phony hips, I could place in the state racquetball tournament again," he says wistfully. "Also, my son David has to run in a marathon in order to qualify for the Iron Man. I'd love to run one more marathon with him."

With characteristic optimism, Dr. Lasbury adds: "The best part of my life has been from age 40 on. It gets better every year."

The Class of 1935's gift now hangs in the foyer of the main patient entrance, near the department of dental diagnostic sciences. With it hang two plaques, one describing Apollonia's rise to sainthood and another listing the names of the Class of 1935's 46 members.

C.E. Programs for '88-'89 Cover Wide Range of Topics

DR. DONALD E. ARENS

Last year when I accepted the directorship of Continuing Education at Indiana University School of Dentistry, I vowed to respond to the needs of the dental alumni by offering high quality programs. In keeping with that pledge, I believe the programs contracted for the 1988-89 season represent new horizons in continuing education that will meet those needs. As of this writing (June 1), many of our plans have been finalized. I'd like to share with you a sample of what you can expect from Indiana University School of Dentistry during the academic year.

On tap for the 1988-89 season is a mini-residency on personal and professional management, to be offered in four parts during the year. The opening session on Friday, December 2, is designed for the dentist and his or her spouse. Ms. Barbara Naylor will present a program on financial planning with special focus on family needs. Ms. Naylor is a hygienist, as well as president and owner of a certified financial planning company in Atlanta, Georgia. When Ms. Naylor's husband, a dentist, died suddenly a few years ago, she found that in addition to dealing with a tragic personal loss, she was faced with difficult financial decisions. With no knowledge of financial management, she was left to administer an estate, including a dental practice that she knew nothing about. Ms. Naylor will draw on her own background to tell others how they can use financial planning for the family to avoid such a devastating experience.

Saturday, December 3, features Mr. Roger Hill, a highly respected expert on practice valuation and administration of all practice profiles, be they solo, partnerships, associateships or corporations. This course will be held at the Downtown Union Station Holiday Inn the opening weekend of the beautiful holiday season (a limited number of rooms has been reserved).

Part two offers Dr. James Jackson, noted author and lecturer on office financial planning. This session will be conducted at the University Conference Center on Saturday, February 25, 1989. His presentation, "Understanding Risk, Reward and Relativity" has been acclaimed by many financial experts.

No practice administration course would be complete without information on how to approach marketing. Our third session on Saturday, March 18, 1989, features Ms. Paula Perich, who has achieved national prominence because of her unique ideas and methods for marketing the dentist, the staff, and the office.

The fourth and final session on Saturday, May 20, brings Dr. Arlen Lackey to the University Conference Center for a presentation on managing staff, patients, inventory and personal time. Dr. Lackey's concepts have been put to practical use with great success in offices from coast to coast.

Indiana University School of Dentistry and the American Society of Clinical Hypnosis will co-sponsor a fourday practical workshop at the Adam's Mark Hotel in Indianapolis (August 18-21, 1988). This will be a 20-hour Academy of General Dentistry master's accreditation program open to dentists, physicians and psychologists.

Continuing with the mini-course concept, Dr. George Willis, IU associate professor of operative dentistry, and Dr. Charles E. Smith, IU associate professor of pediatric dentistry, will again offer "Expanded Functions for Dental Auxiliaries" to begin on September 9 and 10, 1988. As a limited-attendance workshop that meets for seven sessions, this course is always in great demand and fills up early.

In addition to these mini-residencies, a host of stimulating programs will be offered throughout the year by many

outstanding members of the Indiana University faculty and by other highly regarded guest presenters. Courses that have dates as of this writing include:

- Dr. Myron J. Kasle, Howard Riley Raper professor of radiology and chairman of the radiology division of dental diagnostic sciences at IU, and Ms. Gail Williamson, IU assistant professor of dental auxiliary education, will offer a specialized radiology course to prepare assistants for certification (Wednesday, October 12, 1988). Dr. Kasle is the author of a widely used radiology test that has been translated into several languages.
- Dr. Gerald Barrack, a well known New York City prosthodontist, will conduct a workshop on "Current Concepts of Bonded Bridges" (Saturday, October 22, 1988).
- In joint venture with the Academy of General Dentistry, IUSD offers a three-day program on prosthodontic management of occlusion (October 22-24, 1988). IU faculty will include Dr. Charles J. Goodacre, associate professor and chairman of prosthodontics; Dr. David T. Brown, assistant professor of prosthodontics; Dr. Steven L. Bricker, associate professor and chairman of dental diagnostic sciences; and Dr. Jack E. Schaaf, associate professor of dental diagnostic sciences.
- Indiana University Dental Alumni Fall Conference in Bloomington, Indiana (October 27-29, 1988) will feature Indiana University School of Dentistry Current Topics. Focusing on the theme "Communication and Success are Synonymous," we have been fortunate to secure Mr. Toby Malichi for Friday, October 28, 1988. Mr. Malichi is an inspirational motivator of the stature of Paul Harvey and Ziggy Zigler. This is a must weekend!

- Dr. D. Chester Swimley, IU associate professor of oral and maxillofacial surgery, and other faculty members of that department will present a program on "Emergency Care in the Dental Office" (Wednesday, November 2, 1988).
- Dr. C. Richard Bennett, a protege of the famous dental anesthetist Dr. Leonard Monheim, will present a course on pain control (Wednesday, November 9, 1988).
- A cardiopulmonary resuscitation certification course for dentists and staff members will be offered by Dr. James Dirlam, IU professor emeritus of oral and maxillofacial surgery, and Ms.
 Roberta Hilderbrand, IU associate professor of community dentistry (Saturday, November 12, 1988).
- The Indiana University School of Dentistry Department of Oral Pathology, considered to be one of the best in the world, will conduct a practical course for dental auxiliaries on the recognition, treatment, and prevention of commonly encountered lesions of the oral cavity, many of which are extremely serious (Wednesday, November 16, 1988).
- Dr. William McGrannahan, designer of the most accepted electrosurgical unit, will present a workshop entitled "Introduction to Electro-surgery" (Wednesday, January 14, 1989).
- Dr. Chris H. Miller, IU professor and chairman of oral microbiology, and Dr. Jack Schaaf will team up to present a barrier control lecture for dentists and their staff. Dr. Schaaf is director of the school's special care clinic, where patients with infectious diseases, including AIDS, are treated (Saturday, January 21, 1989).
- Dr. K. William Mopper, a pioneer in the field of bonding, will offer a workshop in "Current Concepts and Practical Application of Resins and Laminates" (Saturday, January 28, 1989).
- Dr. Jerome Mahalick of Marquette University, who is a diplomate of the American Board of Prosthodontics, will present his noted lecture, "More Success and Less Stress in Prosthodontics" (Saturday, March 11, 1989).
- Dr. Robert Schallhorn, internationally recognized author, lecturer and researcher, will present "Current Periodontic Techniques for the General Practitioner" (Saturday, March 25, 1989).

- In joint venture with the Academy of General Dentistry, IUSD will present a three-day program on removable partial prosthodontics. Dr. Charles Goodacre is course presenter (April 8-10, 1989).
- Dr. Lloyd Miller, president of the American Academy of Esthetic Dentistry, and Dr. Ralph W. Phillips, of the IUSD faculty, will present a combined program in ceramic management. Dr. Miller, a porcelain color specialist, has a highly regarded practice in prosthodontics in Boston and is the owner and president of the most noted crown and bridge laboratory on the East Coast (Wednesday, April 12, 1989).
- Dr. David Garber, a periodontist/prosthodontist of world acclaim from South Africa (now practicing with Dr. Ronald Goldstein in Atlanta, Georgia), will discuss problems and solutions for tissue management when using bonding and laminate techniques (Friday, May 12, 1989).
- Dr. Kasle and Prof. Williamson will repeat their dental radiology certification course presentation (Wednesday, May 24, 1989).
- Dr. Kasle and Prof. Williamson will offer a comprehensive, three-day workshop to auxiliaries who desire advanced training (July 17-20, 1989). Attendance is limited.

And, looking ahead:

- IUSD is negotiating a program (for Colorado ski country!) with Ohio State University and Louisiana State University continuing education departments for early February.
- The IU departments of endodontics, periodontics, and operative dentistry will offer special limited-attendance mini-residencies in the spring and will invite special guests for single-day lectures. Guest speakers will be announced in the monthly mailings.
- A 12-part mini-residency on implantology is in the final stages of planning. Offered one day a week, this comprehensive lecture, laboratory and clinic course will be conducted by IU faculty members and guest lecturers.
 The scope of the course includes philosophy, indications, contraindications, types of implants, anatomy, physiology, principles of surgery, surgical techniques, and prosthetic management and delivery. The faculty will include such notables as Dr. Richard Guaccio, East

Chicago, president-elect of the American Academy of Implant Dentistry; Dr. W. Eugene Roberts, new chairman of the Indiana University School of Dentistry Department of Orthodontics; Dr. Charles L. Nelson, IU associate professor of oral and maxillofacial surgery; Dr. Charles E. Hutton, IU professor and chairman of oral and maxillofacial surgery and director of the internshipresidency program; Dr. Charles Goodacre; Dr. Paul Mentag, past president of the American Academy of Implant Dentistry and professor of prosthodontics, University of Detroit; Dr. Jack Lemons, professor of biomaterials, University of Alabama; Dr. Victor Sendax, associate professor of prosthodontics at Columbia University; Dr. Craig Cooper, Indianapolis, Midwest Implant Institute; Mr. Lawrence Sowinski, of Zionsville, Indiana, Somer Dental Ceramics; Dr. Daniel Patrick, vice president of research and education at Core-Vent Corporation and member of the professional staff at Harbour-UCLA Medical Center; and Dr. John Stone, Indianapolis, consultant to the IUSD continuing education committee on implantology.

Not only am I enthusiastic about the coming year, I am also pleased to announce that some of the finest speakers in the country—professionals such as Dr. Gordon Christensen, Dr. Ronald Jordan, Dr. Ronald Feinman, and Ms. Jennifer de St. Georges—have agreed to make course presentations at Indiana University during 1989-1990. Details on these individual programs will be sent throughout the year.

The University and Dean Gilmore have made a tremendous commitment in an effort to offer all dental professionals the opportunity to further their education and hone their skills. To succeed, these programs will also require the same kind of commitment from continuing education participants. I hope to see you at one or more of the courses being sponsored by Indiana University School of Dentistry in the months ahead! I appreciate the response I have been getting from the IU Alumni and once again invite your comments and suggestions. IUSD Students Offer Oral Health Screening for Senior Citizens

Readers of the Indianapolis Star were treated on March 18 to a photo spread showing Indiana University School of Dentistry students participating in an oral health screening at the Indianapolis Senior Citizens Center. Ms. Nancy A. Young, assistant professor of dental hygiene and one of the faculty members supervising "Senior Citizens Day," offered this account of program activities:

On St. Patrick's Day 55 senior citizens, many sporting a "touch o' the green," visited the Indianapolis Senior Citizens Center for a free oral health screening, offered by the Indiana University School of Dentistry. A team of dental and dental hygiene students spent the morning, under faculty supervision, screening these "patients" for dental decay, periodontal problems, and oral pathology, as well as teaching proper oral hygiene.

The program came about as a class project for 11 second year dental hygiene students enrolled in Community Dental Health. With Ms. Barbara Main, the Center's program director, they deter-

mined the interests and needs of the senior citizens and planned all phases of the project.

Dental hygiene students transported equipment and supplies to the Center and set up eight screening areas in a newly renovated activity room, which had been cheerfully decorated for St. Patrick's Day. Dental students performed the oral evaluations as dental hygiene students recorded findings. Another group of dental hygiene students kept busy cleaning dentures for the senior citizens. Others explained oral hygiene care and provided referral information as needed.

An important goal of the project was to enable students of dental hygiene and dentistry to work as a team in a community environment, thus preparing students for their roles after graduation. The experience also gave students a better understanding of the skills, education and expertise each member brings to the dental team.

Special credit goes to the following dental hygiene students for planning and implementing the project: Cassie Ayres, Stephanie Harlow, Jill Journay, Diane Kaufman, Julie Osborn, Jody Segraves, Julie Sipes, Brenda Taylor, Bridget Tilson, Michelle Yoder, and Anjie Ziegler. The dental students who

helped with the screening were Bonni Boone, Tom Dunn, Chris Faron, Kevin Hale, Jim Humphrey, Dennie Jenkins, Reed Johnson and Larry Weaver.

Faculty supervisors were Dr. Sybil Niemann, assistant professor and director of dental auxiliary education; Dr. Paul Zitterbart, assistant professor of dental diagnostic sciences; and Dr. Joe Macy, second year graduate student in prosthodontics. Mrs. Marsha Strong, IUSD instructor in dental hygiene and consultant in dental hygiene for the Indiana State Board of Health, helped the students identify supply needs, and the ISBH generously loaned us portable equipment and a display on periodontal disease, and donated pamphlets and other supplies. Senior Citizens Center staff members received the students warmly and conducted tours of the Center after screenings were completed.

It was clear from their smiles and chatter during the morning session that students and senior citizens both enjoyed the opportunity to interact. In addition to the obvious benefits derived from the oral health screening by both groups, there was a perception that the 'old and the young' shared many intangible gifts that morning. And there was the good feeling that comes from a job well done.

Dr. Standish Honored in Philadelphia

Alumni of the Indiana University oral pathology graduate program honored Dr. S. Miles Standish, professor of oral pathology, during the American Academy of Oral Pathology's annual meeting in Philadelphia in May. A total of 37 alumni and four current residents participated in this year's reunion, traveling from Canada, Mexico, Brazil, and from all around the country to attend.

After the traditional "Indiana Seminar," during which the former IU students presented difficult cases for discussion, the group dined at the Sheraton Society Hill Hotel and paid tribute to Dr. Standish, who retires from IUSD on June 30, 1988.

The organization presented Dr. Standish with a portrait of himself, painted by Dr. Rolando A. DeCastro, IU professor of oral anatomy and director of dental art and illustrations. Alumni members have also commissioned Dr. DeCastro to paint a large formal portrait of Dr. Standish, which will eventually hang in the William G. Shafer Seminar Room and Library at the dental school.

The evening included a goodnatured "roasting" of the honored guest by one of his good friends, Dr. Roy Eversole, of Gainesville, Florida, who is an IU oral pathology alumnus from the Class of '68.

1914

The March 7 issue of the ADA News included a tribute to Dr. Alvin D. Farver, a Miami Beach dentist and graduate of the Indiana Dental College who died February 7, 1988. In an editorial appearing under the View Point heading, Dr. Farver's death was called "a great loss to dentistry." The editorial said in part, "... Dr. Farver practiced the art and science of dentistry for 68 years. Some patients were with him for more than 50 years. And when he retired 5 years ago at the age of 89—at that time, the oldest practicing dentist in south Florida—many of his patients were reluctant to break ties with the man they considered the world's best dentist."

In an obituary appearing in the *Miami Herald*, staff writer Jeffrey L. Kleinman reported Dr. Farver's death. Exerpts follow:

. . . Dr. Farver moved to Miami Beach in 1927 after practicing in Middlebury, Indiana, for 13 years. He continued to treat patients until 1982.

In 1946, he and four other dentists established the Dade County Dental Research Clinic, a training ground still operating at Jackson Memorial Hospital for young dentists to treat the poor.

He was president of the clinic in 1952, when it was at the old Lindsey Hopkins building, and taught there for 40 years, specializing in restorative dentistry. He developed a gold inlay process still used today.

"He was a pioneer," said Dr. Robert Kaplan, a Miami Beach dentist who was a student of Dr. Farver's in 1946. "He had an illustrious career and was an influence in guiding many young dentists."

Local anesthetics were unheard of when Dr. Farver first asked his patients to open wide. Someone needing a tooth pulled would go to the nearby saloon and down a shot of whiskey.

"They'd have a couple of real good belts and then walk in ready for anything," Dr. Farver said in 1982, just after he retired.

Dr. Farver moved to Miami Beach from Indiana in 1927 to practice with his younger brother, Francis . . .

Dr. Farver was past president of the Florida Dental Association and the East Coast Dental Society and vice president of the American Dental Association.

"He was a perfectionist," said Patricia Lusk, one of his daughters and a frequent patient. "The dentist I go to now looks in my mouth and says it's the greatest work he's ever seen."

He is survived by his two daughters, Lusk of Fort Lauderdale, and Charlene Farley of Miami Beach; his sister Thelma Hout of Middlebury, Indiana; eight grandchildren and 12 great grandchildren. . . .

He is secretary-treasurer of the LaPorte County Broadcasting, Inc., and more recently treasurer of the Lakeshore Communications

1988 Jefferson Award, given this spring by the *Indianapolis Star* newspaper to individuals "who have contributed outstanding public service for the betterment of the state or their local communities."

Excerpts from the *Star's* write-up on Dr. DeJean follow:

Indianapolis resident Gary B. Martin nominated him. "His volunteer work has been effective in many areas," he said. "In the health field, he has worked to reduce alcohol and tobacco abuse. He has done extensive writing and speaking for the American Cancer Society.

"In education, he has served in many areas from the local school for the mentally retarded to continuing education for dentists and recently attended a seminar in Arizona to learn how he might help the people in his community increase their reading capabilities."

A graduate of Indiana University and its School of Dentistry, Dr. DeJean was in the Army dental corps in World War II. He returned to Salem in 1946 to establish a practice in general dentistry. He has specialized in oral surgery since 1962.

He was a member of the Salem School board in 1951-1966 and did work for the Noble School for the Mentally Retarded.

He has been a faculty member part time at the University of Louisville Dental School since 1962 and has been active in encouraging continuing education for dentists.

He wrote and distributed anti-smoking pamphlets, made speeches and served on the State Commission for Public Education for the American Cancer Society.

Arens, Indiana University School of Dentistry associate professor of endodontics and director of continuing education, was one of two endodontists interviewed by *New York Times* reporter Jane E. Brody for a feature article on root canal therapy appearing in the Health section of the *Times* last winter.

Fort Wayne periodontist and Allen County coroner Dr. Phillip E. O'Shaughnessy (MSD '62) was recently featured in the "People" section of the Fort Wayne *Journal-Gazette*. Excerpts from the article by People staff writer Dell Ford follow:

. . . O'Shaughnessy loves a challenge. He enjoys seeing how many right answers he can deliver on a difficult exam. He also relishes working crossword puzzles (he attempts to complete three a day), cryptograms or any puzzle with a step-by-step procedure that leads to a solution.

Love of tests and puzzles are two reasons he decided to carry a second business card with the job title Allen County Coroner.

Anatomy is a third reason he took on the job that often requires that he try to solve what is sometimes a puzzle: cause of death. Or, even more perplexing, the identity of the deceased.

"I love anatomy," he says in the same casual, offhand manner he uses to describe his

affection for puzzles and tests. "I always thought it was fascinating to know how the body—principally the head and neck—is arranged structurally."

The heart of the matter is rooted in science.

Born in Chicago, O'Shaughnessy moved to Fort Wayne with his family when he was 13. After graduation from South Side High School, he enrolled in the Indiana University School of Dentistry . . .

After four years of dental school, he spent two years studying for a master's degree in periodontics . . .

In 1974, O'Shaughnessy attended a oneweek Armed Forces Institute of Pathology course at Walter Reed Army Medical Center near Bethesda, Md. Shortly thereafter he met then-Allen County Coroner Dr. Roland C. "Bud" Ahlbrand, told him about the course and said he was available if the coroner ever could use his services.

"In about three days I got a certificate naming me a deputy coroner," he said, beaming at the memory. "I was so proud I had it framed. I've no doubt in my mind I'm coroner today because of Bud Ahlbrand. He used my ability and he taught me a lot." He was chief deputy under Ahlbrand in 1983 and 1984.

When Ahlbrand could not enter the race for coroner in 1984 because of the legal two-term limit, O'Shaughnessy ran and was elected.

No one is more pleased than Ahlbrand.

"It was a hard pill for me to swallow not to be coroner. Not only was I proud of Dr. O'Shaughnessy, but he made it easy for me not to be coroner.

"He's not only done the job," Ahlbrand said, "but he's been pro-active—seen problems down the line and tried to avoid them. He's the essence of diplomacy, and that's what the office of coroner absolutely must have."

Allen County Sheriff Daniel L. Figel says O'Shaughnessy has been an excellent coroner.

"He brings a new twist to the coroner's office. He's very interested in the forensic part of pathology—causes of death. He makes most of the homicide cases," Figel said, "and he's always present with his own camera to take pictures for evidence during autopsies."

This year O'Shaughnessy is running unopposed in the Republican primary for the nomination to run for a second term . . .

When he talks about the cases it is with the same story-telling intensity as an old salt spinning yarns about the sea.

Take, for instance, his "most famous" case: The Monroeville Torso.

A torso was discovered in April 1985 in a garbage bag behind an out building on a Monroeville farm.

"In the Monroeville torso case we wanted to know, was it male or female? How much did the person weigh? How old was he or she? How tall?"

Among the dozen experts he used on the case was IU anthropologist Della Cook.

With the evidence available—bones and decaying tissue—Cook was able to say (with a minimal plus or minus on all counts) the torso was of a black male, 30 years old, 5 feet 10 inches, 160 pounds.

"We gave this to the media," O'Shaughnessy said, "and then we got calls" from people saying it could be a missing brother, a missing son. The body was identified as Willie A. Cooper, of Fort Wayne. He had been dead since October 1984 . . .

The toughest cases, he believes, are suicides.

"No family wants to accept suicide because of the tremendous guilt feelings. Also, I don't always know the intent of the person. I have to make my best guess with the facts I have to work with."

O'Shaughnessy is on call seven to 10 days a month "for routine matters. I always go to the scene of a homicide, unless I'm out of town. We don't have to rush right there—the person's dead and is not going anywhere. The police process the scene before I go in. They take still and video photographs. It takes $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 hours. I've had to go and wait around. I'm a very patient person. I don't want to destroy any evidence."

He goes to the scene of many fatal accidents, too.

"I want to make sure things are done correctly. I think it's my job to be there to determine if a person died as a result of the accident or from natural causes, such as a heart attack, which then caused the accident. We've had a couple of those."

A coroner's case, he explained, is any unexpected death . . .

The man of few dislikes has many joys and they include:

- Teaching. He taught three years at the IU dental school in Indianapolis and has been on the faculty at Indiana-Purdue, Fort Wayne, since the school opened in 1964. For about seven years, he was director of dental auxiliary programs at IPFW but gave that up to return to teaching. Now he lectures to medical students only eight hours in the fall.
- His dental practice—because he enjoys working with people and he likes the challenge. "I teach the patient how to control the (gum) disease. Like diabetes, it can't be cured but it can be controlled. I feel like we've really done something if we can keep this controlled. It's not an 'I' thing, an ego thing. It's 'we.'
- Travel. He and his wife, Jean, are avid travelers and are going to the Soviet Union this summer. "We travel a lot," he said, lingering on the word "lot." "We bought a motor

home, and our goal was to take the children to all contiguous 48 states before they left home." The motor home, with its many memories, is gone now, and so are the children: Stephen, 30, of Columbia City, an engineer with Magnavox Government & Industrial Electronics Co.; Mark 28, a resident in internal medicine at IU; Patricia Atkins, 27, of Fort Wayne; Sandra, 26, of Fort Wayne, a North American Van Lines employee; Andrew, 26, a sophomore in IU med school and Susan, 21, a sophomore Spanish major at IPFW.

 Reading and woodworking. He reads a book a week. "A little bit of everything," he said of his preference. One week he read Danielle Steel's best-seller "Kaleidoscope," a fastmoving suspense novel, and re-read J.D. Salinger's "The Catcher in the Rye" for discussion at a book study club of which he's a member.

The woodworking centers around clocks and cradles. He built cradles for each of the O'Shaughnessy children and is doing the same for the grandchildren—one to a family. The clocks run the gamut, from small "easy" timepieces fashioned from oak and walnut scrap pieces to grandfather and school clocks.

Of all the O'Shaughnessy interests, however, it is being coroner that gives him the biggest charge . . .

Award for Minority Students Doubles in Size for 1988

For the fourth consecutive year a grant from the U.S. Department of Education has been awarded to Indiana University to support graduate studies for minority students of dentistry. Dr. LaForrest D. Garner, associate dean for minority student services, reports that the award, as part of the Patricia Roberts Harris Graduate and Professional Study Fellowship Program, has doubled in size to \$64,000 for the 1988-89 academic year.


