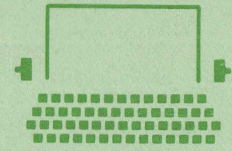

News or Not Material for the Green Sheet should interest a broad range of people on campus. Campus and university news is welcome and your "outside" activities can sometimes be printed. All information should be mailed to AO 139 and it should include the name and phone number of a contact person. If the information you send is not used the reasons can include: Inserted in calendar instead, too little space, too little time, too late or too old. Some material will be rewritten.

Deadline Publication dates for the Green Sheet are on this page. Deadline is 5 p.m. on the Tuesday before publication date. The earlier you send your information, the better.

Advertisements Generally, the Green Sheet does not print "for sale" or "for rent" ads, or any ads from profit-making organizations. However, the rule can be waived, especially if it will benefit faculty or staff.

Campus Calendar The Office of Publications handles all information for the Campus Calendar which is included in the Green Sheet approximately twice monthly. If you want your event noted, send "bare bones" information to Edna Dotson, AO 136. Occasionally some items that appeal to a limited audience will be sent by the Green Sheet editor to the Campus Calendar.

Inserts If you want to give your event special attention and your budget can afford it, you can arrange for an insert. It will be one page, back and front and it will cost \$90 for inserting only. Printing and duplication charges are extra. You must arrange for an insert well in advance. There can be only one insert per week and only when there is no Campus Calendar. Call for help.

Mailing List Changes in names and addresses are not automatic. Anyone who recently came to campus, married, or got unmarried, retired or changed campus locations must notify this office. Include an old label, if possible, name, new campus address, and a phone number. Send changes to Green Sheet Mailing List, AO 139.

The Green Sheet has a limited budget, and space is therefore limited. The editor regrets that these limitations often prevent some news from being printed.-chw
