
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UNIVERSITY'S ROLE: REPORT FROM PITT

The University of Pittsburgh alumni organization has published results of a poll taken from 452 alumni on what the university ought to be doing and ought to stop doing. These are the returns on some of the questions which may indicate what alumni may think about the appropriate roles of a university:

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OCCUPATIONAL THERAPISTS TO MEET

The occupational therapy school will be host to a two-day meeting Friday and Saturday, according to Miss Carol Nathan, director and assistant professor of OT in the Division of Allied Health Sciences. An all-day seminar will be held jointly by the I.U. OT Clinical Affiliation Directors and the I.U. OT Advisory Committee in Ball Annex, Room 15, on Friday.

The advisory committee is composed of some 20 faculty members at the Medical Center. The affiliation directors represent some 40 occupational therapy departments in private, state, Federal, or rehabilitation clinics throughout the country which are psycho-social and physical dysfunction types of OT centers where the I.U. OT students intern during their fourth semester of I.U.'s four-year course.

The morning meeting on Friday will convey the philosophy and concepts of the educational program in occupational therapy at I.U. The afternoon will be devoted to tours and lectures in the clinical facilities.

Saturday, the seminar will be held in the lecture hall of IUPUI at the Downtown Campus auditorium building. Its theme will be "Community Involvement and the Role of Occupational Therapy in the Health Care Delivery System." Robert O. Yoho, H.S.D., assistant commissioner for administration, Indiana State Board of Health, will keynote the session.

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TALBOT STREET ART FAIR--Y'ALL COME DEPT.

Nearly 170 booths will be full of colorful wares Saturday when the 16th annual Talbot Street Art Fair opens at 10 a.m. The two-day fair, sponsored by the Indiana Artist-Craftsmen, Inc., will be the largest and most varied in its history, according to Joseph Lehman, general chairman for the event. (Lehman is editor for the IUPUI News Rireau.)

The fair will continue on Sunday. Times for both days are 10 a.m. to 7 p.m.

And the fair has returned to its former location between 14th and 15th streets on Talbot, between Delaware and Pennsylvania streets. (Last year the fair was held a few blocks north.)

More than 160 artists and craftsmen from throughout Indiana and points as far away as Texas and Quebec will be on hand with their work, exhibiting paintings, sculpture, prints, watercolors, pottery, drawings, jewelry, wood carvings, and other arts and crafts. Judges will award prizes for the best outdoor displays among the booths set up by the artists. The public is invited to examine original works of art that are for sale. There is no charge to the public.

Jim Gerard, WFBM-TV personality, will open the festivities Saturday morning.

On the entertainment agenda are the Roses and Thorns, popular vocal trio who are IUPUI students. They are Mark Curto, Ann Burkett and Doug Benge. Miss Blanche Hutto, popular Fort Wayne artist and teacher, will come with her handmade puppets to delight the young and not-so-young. Other entertainment will include two twosomes: Miss Jo Ann Spencer and Jim Martz and a duo called The NPA Experience composed of Bryan Boroughs and Robert Biggs, both of Indiana Central College.
