DR. GROSSMAN NAMED TO NURSING POST

The Indiana University Board of Trustees has approved the appointment of Dr. Elizabeth Grossman as dean-designate of the School of Nursing, effective September 1. A search and screen committee of 16 members reviewed more than 60 individuals before making their recommendations.

Dean Emily Holmquist will serve as dean until December 31, 1972. In the interim, Dr. Grossman will visit nursing schools throughout the country, interview faculty and administrators, and make long-range plans.

Dr. Grossman has been on the faculty of the School of Nursing since 1959, in the Division of Nursing Education in Bloomington and was named professor in 1970. She has been active in alumni affairs and is well known for her work in nursing education.

"I think Dean Grossman ideally combines a respect for the traditions of nursing with an unusual comprehension of the continual need for innovation in the changing environment of modern nursing," said Dean Holmquist.

Dr. Maynard K. Hine, chancellor of IUPUI, said: "This is a good appointment. Nursing is undergoing tremendous changes and these are reflected in new curricula in nursing education, increased emphasis on specialization, and greater responsibilities for patient care. Mrs. Grossman already has proved herself as an exceptional nursing educator who can continue the school's standards of excellence in education and service."

Dean Holmquist had asked several months ago to be relieved of the deanship. Dr. Hine commented Dean Holmquist deserves much credit for the excellent development of the program in nursing education at Indiana University, and is gratified that she has agreed to continue to serve as a special consultant in nursing education for Indiana University.

In other business during its August 19 meeting, the Board of Trustees took action on the following matters:

Reorganization of Board: Two new trustees, Dr. Joseph Black of Seymour and Richard B. Stoner of Columbus and two re-appointed trustees, Carl M. Gray of Petersburg and Robert E. Gates of Columbia City were officially seated. . . Re-elected board officers are Donald C. Danielson of New Castle, president; Gray, vice-president; Charles E. Harrell, secretary, and W. George Pinnell, treasurer. . . Executive Committee will be Dr. William G. Bannon, Terre Haute; Dr. Black; Jeanne S. Miller, New Haven, and Danielson.

Student Matters: Adopted codification of policy on student participation in trustee meetings, channeling students' problems through the chancellor's office on each campus. If not handled administratively at the particular campus, the student's problem is referred to the board's Committee on Student Affairs and, if necessary, on to the full board. . . IUPUI student activities fee eliminated.

Bynum, a change in title from assistant dean, University Division, and instructor in sociology, to associate dean and director of University Division and Instruction of Sociology, Downtown Campus. For Robert Samuels, professor of biology, the additional title of chairman of the Department of Biology, Downtown Campus. For Glen O. Sagraves, associate professor of oral diagnosis, the additional title of Director of Curriculum Development, School of Dentistry. For Ray K. Maesaka, assistant professor of fixed and removable partial prosthodontics and chairman of the Undergraduate Division of Fixed Partial Prosthodontics, the additional title of Director and Coordinator of Clinical Dentistry, School of Dentistry.

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STUDY THE SELF-STUDY

A detailed self-study of IUPUI has just been completed and copies are available in the Chancellor's Office. This study was prepared by nine faculty members, with Dr. James R. East, associate dean of the Downtown Campus serving as chairman, in preparation for a site visit by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools for the purpose of accreditation of the academic programs of IUPUI. Chancellor Hine reported that the study is a comprehensive one and those preparing the report deserve much credit for their efforts.

MOORE FACT COLLECTING

John D. Moore of Moore and Associates has been commissioned by Chancellor Hine to collect data regarding the possible uses of several of the buildings on the Medical Center Campus which are to be renovated or demolished in the next few years. Detailed studies are being made of the eventual use of Ball Residence when the new School of Nursing is opened and of Coleman Hospital, Long Hospital and the Clinical Building when the University Hospital is completed. Chancellor Hine is also hopeful that the Cottages and the Allied Health (Administration) Building can be torn down and replaced.

Moore will be interviewing many individuals on campus for the next month. He will carry a letter of introduction from Chancellor Hine.
