NEW CENTER SEEING 2,000 STUDENTS

When it comes to IUPUI, unique is not a public relations term. It describes our University and a big share of our students, many of whom are older and are just starting or re-starting their higher education. We have always tried to meet the needs of this special group, but to do it better, we now have the Adult Education Coordinating Center in Cavanaugh Hall, lower level. Already, the center is serving about 2,000 students. A 1,000 or so are graduate non-degree, about 900 are non-degree undergraduate and about 100 are transients. The Center's threefold mission is to recruit adult students, ease their transition into higher education and conduct research on educating adults. The Center works closely with the Div. of Continuing Studies in providing academic counseling and help with testing, registration and as an advocate for adult interests. The staff is small and the Center needs volunteer peer counselors, says the Center's first director Patricia A. Boaz. 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
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
