LEGISLATIVE REPORTS I

Governor-Elect Otis Bowen delivered his first major address since the election to the annual meeting last week of the Indiana State Chamber of Commerce and listed these points for major emphasis in his program for the Indiana General Assembly:

On public employees' bargaining rights: " . . . It is a matter of highest public priority that essential public services be provided free of interruption. And I firmly believe that a soundly conceived and properly drafted public employees' bargaining bill can provide that assurance . . . and . . . provide that Indiana's many fine public employees can be fairly compensated and employed and that their vital services be rendered free of interruption."

On law enforcement and justice: "I intend to undertake major efforts to improve all facets of Indiana's system of criminal justice. I shall press for workable procedural and statutory changes within the structure of Indiana's criminal courts."

On drugs: "Because the major portion of crime . . . is committed in support of, or under the influence of drugs of abuse, I shall emphasize an effective program of a medicolegal approach to Indiana's drug/crime problem."

On governmental relations: " . . . Indiana state government (will) assume a more aggressive posture in its dealings and relationships with the Federal government and its gencies, while maintaining a more understanding and helpful attitude toward . . . local government."

"I shall seek . . . an aggressive Washington liaison office that will provide . . . strong ties and open communications between local needs and state and Federal programs." -- hju

SUBSTITUTE TEACHERS NEEDED

The Indianapolis Public Schools need substitute teachers, according to Mrs. Ethel Tilson, supervisor of substitute teachers for IPS.
