Primary care policy expert to speak at Family Medicine programs

Internationally known primary care physician, health services researcher and author Barbara Starfield, MD, MPH, will speak at IUSM Wednesday, April 8, and Thursday, April 9, as a guest of the IUSM Department of Family Medicine.

On April 8, Dr. Starfield will present "Primary Care: The Imperative for Health Care Reform" during the Family Medicine Grand Rounds from noon to 1 p.m. in the IU School of Nursing Building auditorium. In this talk, Dr. Starfield will present evidence indicating that countries oriented to primary care achieve better health at lower costs and with greater equity. All members of the IUSM and IUPUI community are invited to attend.

On April 9, she will speak with the Family Medicine Student Interest Group and other interested students in an open conversation from noon to 1 p.m. in the VanNuys Medical Science Building Daly Center, room 185. Lunch will be provided.

Dr. Starfield is a University Distinguished Professor in the Departments of Health Policy and Management and Pediatrics at the Johns Hopkins University Schools of Public Health and Medicine. She is the author of *Primary Care: Concept, Evaluation, and Policy* and *Primary Care: Balancing Health Needs, Services, and Technology*, which are recognized as seminal works in the field. Dr. Starfield is a member of the Institute of Medicine, and is a leading source of evidence that primary care produces better health outcomes, lowers overall costs and creates greater equity in health in the population. Einterz to deliver 'Last Lecture'

Robert Einterz, MD, associate dean for international programs and professor of clinical medicine at IUSM, will deliver the "Last Lecture" at 3 p.m. Friday, April 17, in the auditorium of the University Place Conference Center, preceding the Chancellor's Honors Convocation.

The Last Lecture offers the university community the opportunity to hear reflections on life's lessons and meaning from a retired or current IUPUI colleague of exceptional merit. The lecturer will be asked to share with students, staff, faculty and the general public the wisdom she or he gained through academic pursuits and life experiences – to distill a life of inquiry, reflection and service into important guidance for successive generations.

Einterz will draw upon his experiences in Indianapolis and Kenya to tell stories to illustrate many of the important lessons he has learned.

Einterz is co-founder of the Indiana University-Moi University (Kenya) exchange program that led to the creation of AMPATH (the Academic Model for the Prevention and Treatment of HIV/AIDS). AMPATH currently provides for more than 55,000 HIV-infected patients in Kenya and has reduced the rate of HIV infection significantly in that country by providing medical treatment and addressing the poverty that fuels the spread of the deadly virus.

The event is sponsored by the IUPUI Senior Academy, the offices of the Chancellor and the Dean of Faculties, IU Foundation, and 40th Anniversary. Einterz will receive a \$2,000 honorarium from the IU Foundation and a Bepko Medallion awarded to him by the Senior Academy.

The scientific symposium is in honor of the Dr. Harris, Distinguished Professor Emeritus and Showalter Professor Emeritus, who served as chair of the IUSM Department of Biochemistry and Molecular Biology from 1988 until 2004.

Also speaking will be IUSM Dean Craig Brater, MD, and Zhong-Yin Zhang, PhD, chair and Robert A. Harris Professor of Biochemistry and Molecular Biology. The program will be moderated by Anna DePaoli-Roach, PhD, professor of biochemistry and molecular biology.

Dr. Felitti will discuss the ACE Study (Adverse Childhood Experiences) and its relevance to the everyday practice of medicine and

mental health and the importance of prevention.

Dr. Felitti is a clinical professor at the University of California-San Diego. He is a graduate of Johns Hopkins Medical School and a physician in the Department of Preventive Medicine, Southern California Permanente Medical Group. He founded the Department of Preventive Medicine for Kaiser Permanente in San Diego, Calif., 28 years ago, and served as chief of preventive medicine until 2001.

Vaccines and autism topic of June conference at IUPUI

Paul Offit, MD, will be the keynote speaker at the seventh annual Conference on Health, Disability and the Law. The June 12 conference is hosted by the Riley Child Development Center and the IU School of Law. This year's topic will be autism and early childhood vaccines.

Dr. Offit is a pediatric infectious diseases specialist. He is an internationally known expert on vaccines, immunology and virology, and is a professor of pediatrics at the University of Pennsylvania, chief of the Division of Infectious Diseases, and director of the Vaccine Education Center at The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. Dr. Offit is also the author of the controversial book *Autism's False Prophets: Bad Science, Risky Medicine, and the Search for the Cure*.

While current thinking about potential causes for autism suggests an environmental component in conjunction with genetic links, carefully controlled studies have disproved a link between autism and childhood vaccines. This conference will provide a reasoned

presentation on the issues surrounding vaccination.
