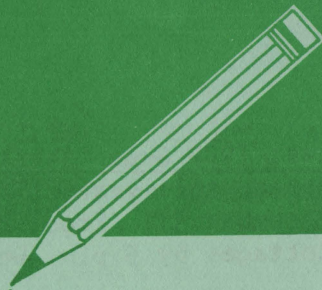

Yule Schedule -- The Credit Union will be open from 9 a.m. till noon on Friday (December 22) and from December 26-29. They'll be closed Christmas and New Year's Days.

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NEW COMPUTER

Chancellor Maynard K. Hine is extremely pleased to announce the acquisition of a new and advanced time-sharing computer system for IUPUI. It is the KA10 by the Digital Equipment Corporation, scheduled to become operational at the Research Computer Center in the Union Building on June 30, 1973.

"The need for more computing capability for IUPUI has been evident for quite some time," Chancellor Hine said. "With the development of the Regenstrief Institute, the Indianapolis Center for Advanced Research, growing biomedical engineering possibilities, and movement to computers by some academic disciplines that have not used them before, we need a much more versatile and more responsive system. Fortunately, we were able to acquire the DEC system at only a slight increase in cost."

Chancellor Hine praised all faculty and staff who were involved in the two-year study which led to the DEC system acquisition.

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BIT O' BUDGET

Although the State Budget Agency has recommended that the I.U. - Bloomington budget be increased from \$97.2 million during the current biennium to \$108.7 million for the 1973-75 biennium, much of the increase is more apparent than real. Approximately \$7 million of the agency's recommended increase represents Social Security and Public Employees Retirement Fund (PERF) expenditures for the I.U. system which had previously

been paid directly from the Indiana general fund and which will now be paid from the University general fund. In real terms, the I.U. - Bloomington budget recommendation is for an increase from the current \$97.2 million level to \$102.2 million in available operating funds for 1973-75.
