Officials break ground on the new Wishard Hospital

An official groundbreaking ceremony for the new Wishard Hospital took place May 12 at the site of the new hospital, east of the Richard L. Roudebush V.A. Medical Center.

Indianapolis Mayor Ballard and leaders from across Central Indiana broke ground on the project using ceremonial shovels emblazoned with "The New Wishard" logo before a crowd of nearly 300 from across the Marion County community.

Joining Ballard to speak were IU President Michael McRobbie and IUSM Dean D. Craig Brater.

Also participating in the ceremony were state representatives Gregory Porter and Bill Crawford; Barbara Malone, city-county councilor; Matthew R. Gutwein, president and CEO of Health and Hospital Corporation of Marion County; Lisa Harris, CEO and medical director of Wishard Health Services; Virginia Caine, director of Marion County Health Department; and other invited guests.

The New Wishard construction project will create 4,400 jobs and transform the landscape of healthcare in Indianapolis. Facilities will include a 315-bed inpatient hospital, a 200-bed outpatient clinic, a 2,400-car parking garage, a 90-bed treatment room emergency department, a women's health clinic, a central energy plant and offices for faculty, research and administration functions. Construction is expected to complete at the end 2013.

Renowned cancer researcher to present Gladstein Lecture

The second annual Harry and Edith Gladstein Visiting Professor Lecture, "Genomic Variation and Cancer," will be presented at 1 p.m. Tuesday, May 25, in Walther Auditorium by Thomas J. Hudson, president and scientific director of the Ontario Institute for Cancer Research (OICR).

Internationally renowned for his work in genomics and human genome variation, Dr. Hudson's past positions include leadership roles as director of the McGill University and Genome Quebec Innovation Centre and assistant director of the Whitehead/MIT Center for Genome Research, where he led a team that generated physical and gene maps of the human and mouse genomes. He has been a founding member of the International Haplotype Map Consortium, the Public Population Project in Genomics (P3G) and the International Cancer Genome Consortium.

Dr. Hudson's laboratory at OICR is involved in the study of genome variation that affects cancer predisposition, progression, and response to therapy. His main project focuses on the genetic architecture of loci associated with risk for colorectal cancer.

Dr. Gopen has presented this workshop at IUSM for the past 3 years, and has changed participants' writing habits permanently, often resulting in improved grant writing success. Both junior investigators and experienced scholars/mentors will benefit from this program.

This weekend, May 15 and 16, *Sound Medicine* host Barbara Lewis and guests will discuss vaccinations, smallpox and changes to the categorization of autism disorders.

Anne Gershon, MD, professor of pediatrics and director of pediatric infectious disease at Columbia University Medical Center, will discuss the 2008 outbreak of measles in San Diego and what lessons were learned about vaccinations.

D.A. Henderson, MD, MPH, former director of the World Health Organization's global smallpox eradication campaign, will discuss his book, *Smallpox, the Death of a Disease: The Inside Story of Eradicating a Worldwide Killer*, which details how he led the effort.

The Dean's Office of Faculty Affairs and Professional Development (OFAPD) is seeking a clinician to join the faculty development team. Specifically, they are looking to identify a faculty member interested in helping other clinical faculty advance and be successful in their careers.

The assistant dean will work in collaboration with OFAPD, Graduate Medical Education, Medical Education and Curricular Affairs, Continuing Medical Education and the IUSM clinical departments to provide high quality professional development workshops, training and other opportunities for clinical faculty. Quality improvement, patient safety, scholarship of clinical service, balancing the demands faced by busy clinicians, leadership development and clinical education are all potential areas for faculty development efforts, plus any other needs identified by the IUSM clinical faculty in our vitality survey or other needs assessments. The position is 20 percent FTE and is available beginning in July.

While some faculty development experience would be a plus, it is not essential that someone have vast experience in faculty development.
