




I. U. School of Liberal Arts General Fund Accounts Total Revenue by Fiscal Year



I. U. School of Liberal Arts General Fund Accounts Expenses by Fiscal Year




IU School of Liberal Arts Expenditure (%'s) FY 16 General Fund Accounts








IU School of Liberal Arts FY 16 Compensation %'s




ENROLLMENTS

IU School of Liberal Arts Credit Hours Taught by Fiscal Year





Liberal Arts Majors Enrollment by class level



- 37% enrolled at 15 cr hrs or higher (banded tuition?)

Campus officials judge SLA on the award dollars received during a fiscal year.


In FY16, 21 SLA Project Directors received \$6,204,868 from 74 grants and contracts.


The award dollars almost doubled over FY15, when 22 project directors were awarded 92 grants and contracts.

 FY16 counts were the lowest of the four-year cycle, yet award dollars exceeded the previous high in FY13 and proposal dollars trended upward significantly.









FY16 Indirect Costs Awarded



PROGRESS TO GOAL FOR IU BICENTENNIAL CAMPAIGN

In fall 2015, Indiana University publically launched its first-ever university-wide philanthropic campaign, For All: The Indiana University Bicentennial Campaign, with a record goal of \$2.5 billion to be raised by 2020.


The School of Liberal Arts at IUPUI is ahead of schedule in its progress toward its \$20 million goal within the campaign. We have raised \$19,089,873 (as of 7/31/16) which includes current gifts, non-governmental grants, and certain planned gifts.





PHILANTHROPIC SUPPORT RECEIVED IN 2015






In addition to the \$471,572.06 raised in current gifts, the School of Liberal Arts received \$1,725,000 in estate commitments.
