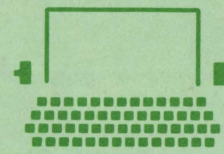

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## 300 BRAVE COLD AND SNOW TO CELEBRATE

The nearly 200 folks who braved the cold to hear Congressman Walter E. Fauntroy (D.-D.C.) were not disappointed with his rousing speech that included the line, "We may have all come here in different ships, but we're all in the same boat now." He was referring to the negative effects of racism on economics and politics. Also an ordained minister and no stranger to the lectern and microphone, the congressman also sings well. He burst into his own rendition of "The Impossible Dream" and interjected challenges for the cessation of civil rights violations all over the world. About the same number of people showed up at the Union Building for an afternoon of discussions and workshops on minorities in education. The Black Student Union, with help from Marie Brunsman and others on campus, hosted the 16th annual Martin Luther King Jr. dinner at the "new" Indiana Roof. Attorney Yvonne Braithwaite Burke, California's first black woman to be elected to Congress, topped off the fine dinner with her attention-getting speech to the 200 guests.

Elizabeth Choi, assistant professor of nursing and a project director for the March of Dimes Product Evaluation Div., last month was named one of the Ten Outstanding Young Women of American for 1986. A panel of judges comprised of presidents of many major women's organizations made the selection from among 10,000 nominated women. ## RIGHT TO PARK ANYWHERE THE ISSUE WITH STUDENTS

Remember late last summer the parking survey that asked how you felt about being able to buy any kind of parking permit you wanted? Well, the results from the Parking Advisory Committee are in and in the case of students, the right to select any parking permit, rather than the type, is what is important. Among the 1,297 students who said they favor the any-permit policy, 1,175 said they'd buy E permits. That is the kind they are offered now. Among the 1,899 faculty and staff members who responded, about half said they favor the any-permit policy, the other half did not. Results also show that among this group, 626 would buy an A permit; 781 a B permit; 132 would apparently like to save some money and walk a little more and prefer an E permit. Also, 229 want an evening permit; 19 want an E part-time permit; 60 want to buy a garage permit and 52 said they would buy a restricted permit. Of the 25,000 questionnaires sent out, 3,857 responded--1,958 were students, 1,899 were staff/faculty. The response rate was 15.43 percent in the survey that asked if you were in favor of the following policy: "That a parking permit is available to any member of the University who is willing to pay for the permit of their selection."

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## PROF. JEGEN'S TAX TIPS: 7,000 MORE AUDITORS

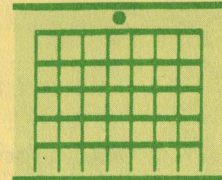
Careful as you go, is good advice for taxpayers in the next few years. Be careful now in filling out your W-4 forms, for if you do not have enough taxes taken out, there can be a penalty, and with 7,000 new auditors hired by the IRS, the chances of "sneaking by" are slimmer. Penalties are high for other infractions also, according to Lawrence A. Jegen, III, professor of law, School of Law: The penalty for not paying taxes at all (Sect. 6651) is 1% per month (not to exceed 25%) after the IRS notifies you that it intends to levy on your assets; effective now. Negligence or intentional disregard in regard to your federal taxes carries a higher penalty of 5% on all types of taxes.... Failure to pay because of fraud carries an even higher penalty. And for not filing a return at all, the IRS has the right under the new tax law to fine you up to \$100,000, and you can also be penalized \$5 for each item of wrong information you provide the IRS, up to \$20,000, or more if there is intentional disregard. All this is effective this year.
