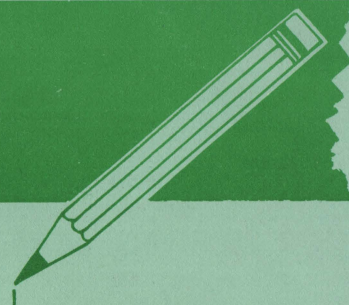

"SUNDAY SCHOOL"

While the male chauvinists are giving their weekend devotions to television's litany of football, some of their wives will be pursuing literary liberation in the Weekend College at IUPUI.

There will be football widows in the Weekend College meeting with Dr. Frances Dodson Rhome to study the roles of women as authors and heroines in literature.

Although the course, "Feminism and Literature," will meet on Sundays, and only four times, Dr. Rhome stresses that "it will be a very solid course handled in a traditional manner.

"The three-hour lectures will present a survey--from ancient Greek plays to 20th-Century fiction--of women, their concepts of, and as conceived by, their contemporary societies," says Dr. Rhome.

Individual study will be conducted by the students for the three required papers. "While someone may wish to make a comparison between heroines of a certain period and those of today, another person can do a study of a contemporary American poetess. Hopefully some papers of publishable quality will come out of the course."

To introduce a feminist approach to the traditional school of literature is the main objective of the course. But Dr. Rhome adds that it is primarily set up "to offer a less rushed, though intensive study program to those who have little or no time during the week to attend semester-length classes."

The first class meeting will be from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. on November 4 in Cavanaugh Hall. However, those interested in advance reservations may call Dr. James R. East, Ext. 4887, in the School of Liberal Arts.

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IUPUI ENROLLMENT UP 4.3 PCT.

Fall semester enrollments reached 17,666 at IUPUI, a 4.3 per cent increase from last year, according to official figures reported by IUPUI Registrar Neil Lantz.

Academic reorganizations, reassignments of programs, and similar administrative actions limit the validity of direct comparisons of enrollment figures for several IUPUI schools and divisions. The fall enrollment figures for the larger IUPUI units include:

Parking Adjustment -- Construction is scheduled to begin soon (early November) on the new Science-Engineering-Technology Building, southeast of the intersection of West Michigan and Blake Streets. The construction area will include the northern portion of the free parking lot immediately east of Blake Street, from West Michigan to New York Street. Alternate free spaces will be available east on New York and on the northeast and northwest corners of the Blake-West Michigan intersection.

Theater Grant -- IUPUI students in the Department of Speech and Theater will have a chance to present at least 15 theater performances throughout the state this year under a \$3,500 grant from Lilly Endowment. 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FLU-ING AROUND

The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices of the U.S. Public Health Service does not recommend wide-scale flu immunization because of difficulties inherent in predicting influenza epidemics and the variability in vaccine effectiveness.

However, the committee does recommend annual vaccination for persons of all ages who have such chronic conditions as heart disease of any etiology, chronic bronchopulmonary diseases and diabetes mellitus and other chronic metabolic disorders. Furthermore, annual vaccination is recommended for older persons.

The committee also says that annual vaccination may be advisable, when epidemic flu is forecast, for those groups providing essential community services and those who are exposed to high-risk situations. Epidemiologists, however predict that there will be no change in flu virus serotypes until the end of this decade.

Those persons, however, who want flu shots may get them at the Student Employee Health Service, one now and another two weeks later. There will be a \$2 charge for each immunization. Times are from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. Thursday and Friday in the Long Admitting Area.

(Persons having known sensitivity or allergy to eggs, chicken, chicken feathers or chicken dander should not get the shots and immunization should be deferred in the presence of any acute respiratory disease or active infection.)
