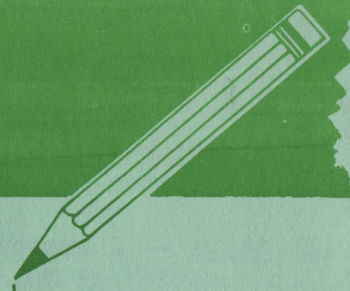

## JILL RUCKELSHAUS TO BE ON CAMPUS FOR LECTURE AND WOMEN'S CONFERENCE

Jill Ruckelshaus, director of organizational relations for the National Center for Voluntary Action in Washington, D.C., will deliver the Addison Locke Roache Lecture on Monday, November 3, at 8:30 p.m. in the Lecture Hall, Room 101.

Ms. Ruckelshaus, who was appointed to the position by President Gerald R. Ford, will chair the Commission on the Observance of International Women's Year and will preside at its first meeting in April at the Pan American Health Organization.

Ms. Ruckelshaus has received the "Who's Who Award" from the Indiana Society of Washington, D.C., and the "Woman of the Year" award by the Indiana Professional Chapter of Women in Communications, Inc. She is married to William D. Ruckelshaus, Washington attorney and former United States deputy attorney-general.

A graduate of Indiana University, Ms. Ruckelshaus has a master's degree from Harvard University and attended the I.U. School of Law. She is a trustee of Mount Vernon College in Washington and of Kenyon College in Gambier, Ohio. She also is on the advisory committee of the National Women's Political Caucus.

It is through her active involvement with women's interests that she also will be participating in the IUPUI Student Association-sponsored Women's Day Conference that day. Ms. Ruckelshaus will be the guest of honor at an open student reception at 4:15 p.m. in the faculty lounge (Room 507) of Cavanaugh Hall.

The reception will be one highlight in a day designed to highlight the varied interests of American women in the mid-1970s. The all-day program opens at 9 a.m. in Cavanaugh 119 with Mrs. Clay Ulen, director of the Indianapolis Women's Clinic who will discuss the clinic and legal aspects of abortion. A 10 a.m. session in Cavanaugh 139 will explain the IUPUI Continuing Education Center.

Lee Ellen Ford, who holds doctoral degrees in philosophy and jurisprudence and is executive assistant to Indiana Governor Otis R. Bowen, will reconvene the conference at noon in Lecture Hall 101 after an 11 a.m. lunch hour.

A panel discussion on women in the job market will be held at 1:30 p.m. in Cavanaugh 139. Participants will be Jean Kaufman, information writer for the Indiana State Employment Service; Mrs. Sandra Klang, personnel specialist with Meridian Insurance, and S.A. Barrett, past owner-manager of the Career Personnel Employment Agency. Also at 1:30 p.m., Donna Smith and Norma Bacon of the Indianapolis Police Department's Rape Team will be discussing their jobs.

Giving -- Vice-Chancellor John C. #### HONORS & ACCOLADES DEPT.

Barcelona, Spain, was the site for the recent fifth biannual meeting of the International Society for Neurochemistry, during which Dr. Morris H. Aprison, director of the Institute of Psychiatric Research, was elected the society's secretary.

Roland A. Sherrill, lecturer in English and religious studies, has been named to preside over the session on "The Theological Implications of Contemporary American Fiction" at the national meeting of the American Academy of Religion in Chicago this week.

Edward E. Harris, associate professor of sociology, has been selected for inclusion in the first edition of Who's Who Among Black Americans and in the 1976 edition of Who's Who in North America.

Dr. Peter J. Sehlinger, associate professor of history, has received a fellowship from the Organization of American States to carry out research on 19th-Century Chilean history while on sabbatical leave this academic year. He will be in Santiago, Chile, from November until April.

Elizabeth B. Solow, assistant professor of neurological surgery, has been elected secretary of the Indiana Conference of the American Association of University Professors at the organization's annual meeting this month at the Union Building.
